#### Rabbi's Message: Pesach, Omer, Regalim, Hallel, Yizkor: Vocabulary of the Jewish Calendar



As we put away our Purim playthings, the Jewish calendar adopts a more serious tone. We

ready our homes for Passover guests and our hearts for a celebration of freedom. We eat unleavened bread for seven days, in solidarity with our fleeing ancestors and all who are not yet free. But even after we have eaten our last matzah ball, our journey is only beginning.

The Hebrew name of Passover, Pesach, refers to the paschal lamb, the sacrifice that bound us into a covenant with God. But the fulfillment of that covenant does not happen until 50 days AFTER our release from Egypt, when we receive the Torah at the foot of Mount Sinai, a moment commemorated on Shavuot.

While these holidays are seven weeks apart, they are connected by an observance called *counting the Omer*. Most likely the 49 days of counting originally applied to counting sheaves during the grain harvest. Today this ritual reenacts our ancestors' waiting to receive the Torah. The Omer is a time of austerity and reflection, during which there is a custom of studying *Pirke Avot*, a book of our rabbis' ethical teachings.

Along with Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot comprise our three pilgrimage festivals, or *regalim*, in which Jews were encouraged to travel to the Temple and make sacrifices. Today we elevate these holidays by reciting *Hallel*, a series of psalms of praise, and *Yizkor*, a prayer in memory of our lost loved ones, particularly if we have lost a parent, sibling, spouse, or child.

*Yizkor* prayers originated in the Yom Kippur service, where they encouraged the community to honor their loved ones' memories with gifts to *tzedaka*. This practice later expanded to include the *regalim*, giving us more regular opportunities to remember our loved ones, in words and in deeds. **Our Passover Yizkor Services will be held at 10:00am on Friday, April 29<sup>th</sup>.**

#### President's Message: Any Given Sunday

On Friday and Saturday we pray together and schmooze at the Oneg. But on any given Sunday, you will see Vassar Temple

doing MUCH MORE than teaching our children. You'll see that there are a whole bunch of other Mitzvahs going on. And it is the synergy and value that we derive individually and as a community from the buzz of activities taking place from 9 to noon on a Sunday that brings a great deal of life to our Temple.

On a given Sunday, you might find one or more of the following happening: a prospective member checking us out; a committee meeting; the Men's club or Sisterhood involved in a Temple activity; a volunteer promoting scrip or Judaica to help support the Temple; Tiny Temple; folks dropping off or picking up Lunch Box food; Rabbi speaking with a family; members kibitzing about the Temple, their family, or life in general. Sunday at VT is like a mini shtetl - a Jewish village. We are a microcosm of Jewish life in our mostly non-Jewish community. The more each of us gets to see and be with one another, the better. The more our children see their parents and other adults engaged in the life of the Temple, the better. The more opportunities children have to interact and be part of this life in our little Jewish village, the better. The more people there are around and engaged in one activity or another, the better. This is exactly what a healthy Jewish congregation looks like.

Being in this environment goes a long way to help young people form their Jewish identify. And, it helps all of us to maintain our own Jewish identity. Each of us can contribute to the environment as well as draw joy from it.

So, if you're dropping your child off for religious school, please come in and stay a little while. Consider carving out time on occasional Sundays to pick up scrip. Or come in and check out our beautiful Judaica selection as lovely gifts for loved ones. Strike up a conversation with someone you recognize or introduce yourself to others. The sanctuary is a perfect spot to take a moment for a little meditation or to read a bit of scripture. Have a look at our bulletin boards for information on various activities and news. Maybe even drop a donation into the Tzedakah box to help out the month's good cause.

Being part of a village, especially your own Jewish Village - this place we call Vassar Temple - is all the more special when you are engaged in it. When you're a part of the Temple, the Temple is a part of you and your Jewish identity! The image I've described happens as a result of the choices we each make to create room in our lives for our little *Jewish Village* right here in Dutchess County – Vassar Temple – on any given Sunday.

In the middle of the 16<sup>th</sup> century, a British explorer and seafarer named William Borough wrote a

treatise about the unreliability of navigational charts that ignored magnetic north. He called his work, "A Discourse of the Variation of the Compass, or Magnetical North." His point was that only by following the compass carefully can one successfully navigate unknown areas. That's part one.

Part Two is this: In the decades leading up to the founding of the modern state of Israel, a Hebrew maven and all around maverick named David Yellin invented a modern Hebrew word for "compass." His choice was *matzpen*, related to the word *tzafon*, which means "north." For Yellin, the compass was that which pointed north.

The ancient word *tzafon*, which actually means both "north" and "north wind," comes from the root Tz.P.N. Also from that root is *tzafun*, which means "hidden." (After all, who knows what lies to the north?) We find *tzafun* in the order of the Passover Seder coming up later this month. The afikomen is *tzafun*, which is why we have to look for it.

The root Tz.P.N also gives us the word *Matzpun*. In antiquity it may have meant "hidden treasure." In Modern Hebrew, it means "conscience."

# From Our Religious School Director: Finding Our Moral Compass

In this roundabout way, the Hebrew words for "compass" and "conscience" end up sounding nearly identical --*matzpen* and *matzpun* --- underscoring an inherent connection between the two concepts, and practically begging us to ask how a compass is like a conscience. Perhaps a compass helps us literally find our way in the world while our conscience is the moral equivalent. The compass tells us which way is north and our conscience tells us which way is correct.

Or perhaps the connection is that both the right literal path and the right moral path are hidden, and our task is to find them...or perhaps both.

English also emphasizes the connection between morality and literal navigation with the phrase "moral compass" and, in particular, with the notion that one can lose one's moral compass. The idea is that our day to day existence can take one of two forms. We can be like the captain of a ship on its correct path, guided by a compass, knowing that we will reach our intended destination even though we cannot see it. Or we can be like the captain of a ship who ignores the compass and ends up lost at sea, never to end up where we want.

For that matter, even the phrase "lost at sea" has both literal and moral interpretations.

All of which brings us back to Passover, a holiday, after all, dubbed "the Time of Our Freedom," during which we celebrate our freedom from Egypt, and, more generally, our ongoing freedom. With that freedom, we know, comes the ability to choose good paths or bad ones. And it turns out that we sometimes have a natural predilection to ignore what we know is right. After all, our first major project as a free people out of Egypt was to build and worship an idol in the form of the Golden Calf.

This is why every spring we both rejoice in our freedom, with Passover, and begin a moral accounting, with the counting of the Omer --- that seven-week period of time from Passover (and freedom) to Shavuot (and Torah).

This year should be no different. So let's once again start with the Afikomen --the surprise that is *tzafun*, hidden --- and with it renew our attention to the tools we have for finding our way: the compass in all of its surprising complexity, and even more, our conscience. Ignore them, as we so often tend to do, and we face unforeseen peril. Heed them and we can look forward, as the Omer promises, to a rich life of Torah.

# Summer Veggies on the Way!

Do you love fresh local veggies? Do you want to support local farmers and also contribute to an important community initiative? If so...here's a great opportunity for you and your family!

Pri HaEmek, now into its fourth year, is a not-for-profit Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) initiative that is grounded in Jewish values concerning the environment. Pri HaEmek is Hebrew for Bounty of the Valley. A CSA is a cooperative agreement between a farmer and a group of people who agree to pre-purchase a share of the farmer's produce for an entire season. The CSA gives members access to fresh, local, sustainably grown produce at competitive prices, while helping to preserve farmland and building community. Pri HaEmek is partnering with Lineage Farm in Hudson. Each week shareholders will choose from a wide variety of seasonal vegetables, freshly harvested and delivered by our farmers, including: lettuce, arugula, salad turnips, kale, Swiss chard, broccoli rabe, garlic and garlic scapes, cabbage, tomatoes, onions, summer & winter squash, carrots, cucumbers, herbs, beans, beets, and radishes.

Besides the great veggies, it's really fun to participate and share food ideas and recipes with the group. Several Vassar Temple families are already members. And, as an added bonus....there is not a huge work requirement to join; only 4-6 hours over the entire season which runs from early June through October. The distribution is held weekly at the Hudson Valley Community Center.

Membership is open to anyone, regardless of religious background. A \$36 membership fee is required from each family which enables us to offer *tzedakah* shares to those in need and provide programming for our members.

Based on real historical figures, Dara Horn's novel has been described by critics as "multilayered, page-turning storytelling at its best," the mix of love and loyalty played out in a divided America.
