Hineni, literally "here I am," is a deeply meaningful expression used in the Bible by in-

dividuals responding to God's call to take on a challenging or vital role at a crucial time. Hineni is exemplified by Seth's ideals and practice as he devoted himself to the temple and to the betterment of the larger community. Establishing the Hineni fund will offer a way to say "here we are" as individuals and as a community – to support Vassar Temple's all-important educational and youth programs, as well as to honor and celebrate Seth's dedication to our next generation. The campaign aims to support the Religious School as well as create a fund in Seth's memory to support the ongoing operation of the school and programs for children and teens.



The *Hineni* Fund will benefit from major and planned gifts solicited from the congregation, friends, and private foundations as well as more modest individual contributions. Over \$50,000 has been raised to date.

It will also include the proceeds of *Bright Lights and Miracles*, a gala event planned for Saturday, December 1st, 6:00 to 11:00 p.m., at the beautiful Locust Grove estate on Route 9 in Poughkeepsie. The honorees for *Bright Lights and Miracles* are Temple members Lou Lewis, Esq. and Dr. Arthur and Carol Menken, all truly bright lights in our congregation and community. Rabbi's Message: THOSE WHO CAN, TEACH



I have made a point over the past few years of devoting this month's article to appreciating members of the congregation

whose contributions to the life and function of Vassar Temple are not always fully acknowledged. In the past, and again in the future, I will have noted those who quietly provide aid to congregants in distress or need, who captain social action projects, or who are simply present when something needs to be done. This year, I would like to give a "shout-out" to the teachers.

Meredith Kaflowitz and Mar-

ris Abraskin have been teaching in the younger grades for a number of years. I am also grateful to the efforts of a former teacher, Laura Brundage, who has generously filled in with her daughters Emily and Dani, particularly in preserving Tiny Temple. And Rachel Erlebacher and Marissa Gally took over responsibility for Third Grade, and completed three years in that classroom before leaving for college. I must add a note of appreciation to **Melissa Erlebacher** and **Joyce Gally** who supported their daughters, especially in the years before they had drivers licenses.

Teaching Religious School is always demanding. Children 'have' to be there because their parents expect them to attend, but they know there are no sanctions or penalties regarding behavior or learning. All the teachers have done an extraordinary job of keeping the children's interest and nurturing the spirit of Jewish knowledge and identity.

Teaching adults presents a new demand. Adults come to Vassar Temple's offerings purely because they wish to learn. There are no attitude problems. They are, on the other hand, discerning and demanding. The material must be good and well presented, otherwise they will not return. In this context, I want to express my gratitude to members of the congregation who not only responded to a request to teach a class or course, but have returned to teach a number of times because they are respected and appreciated.

For the past four years, **Martin Char**wat has provided insights on the recent history and politics of Middle Eastern nations, and has untangled difficult societies with extraordinary clarity. **Sid Plotkin** has been generous with his time and expertise on American politics. His sharp observations over the past few years manage to reach the core of emotional issues without resorting to partisanship. And **Linda Cantor** has sustained Jewish Meditation, a nexus between West and East that is up to 3000 years-old.

A core function of the synagogue is to make the past (tradition, history) the foundation of the future; the personal (spirit, commitment) the basis of community; and the particular (our Jewish identity) impact on the universal. In a word, this is work of teaching, and I am personally grateful to those who have given time, expertise and energy and passion to making Vassar Temple a stronger institution.



I write this during the heat of summer, when part of my ritual once or twice a day includes checking the on-line weather forecast. How hot is it now? How hot will it be?

How likely is it that thunder storms will knock out my power? If you're like me, you've surely noticed that most weather sites offer three data points: the daily high, the daily low, and the current temperature. And, again if you're like me, you've also noticed something bizarre: Sometimes the current temperature is higher than the daily high or lower than the low. The forecast might call for, say, temperatures between 70 and 95, even though the current temperature is 97.

With millions of dollars of weatherrelated technology, you'd think they could fix the software to let the minimum and maximum temperatures reflect the current conditions. (This is only part of the reason for the old joke that weather forecasters have difficulty predicting the present. To take another example, how can the chance of rain be only 30% if it's raining? And everyone's has had the sad experience at least once of laboring to shovel a "chance of flurries.") The author Beth Kander suggests that there's something deeper here. If we're not careful, we all make the same kind of mistake as the weather software, she says. We have a plan and there are things we expect. But even when current conditions are incompatible with our expectations, we ignore the present and cling to our forecast. Such a strategy, she suggests, makes it hard to react appropriately to what's happening.

On a small scale, this might apply to a teacher teaching a class. The teacher may have planned what he or she thought would be a fun activity as a reward for a class that's done good work. But then the class reacts negatively to the "reward." What to do? The usual response, sticking to the plan and ignoring the evidence, is to chastise the students for not enjoying something fun. Unfortunately, students tend to misbehave when they're told how to feel, so next the teacher has to deal with discipline issues. What started as a reward ends up as a catalyst for punishment, all because the teacher couldn't abandon expectations.

On a larger scale, to live life is to deal with reality that falls outside our plans. I remember leading a 6th-grade weekend retreat some years ago, and one girl, who had been hugely enthusiastic about the weekend, complained the whole way through when it finally arrived.

"You couldn't wait to get here. What's going on?" I asked her. She lamented that "no one told me it was going to be like this." Isn't that a motto for life, I thought.

And it works in both directions. Sometimes we plan for a comfortable reality only to find it shattered by unexpected, even tragic, loss. Other times, we are surprised by the richness of life beyond what we ever dared to conceive. If we cling too tightly to our own mental forecast, we'll be unable to deal with the loss in the first case, and unable to enjoy life's bounty in the second.

So as we enjoy the lazy dog-days of summer, let's let the weather forecast do something positive for a change: it can serve as a model of "don't let this happen to you." Let's try to find time this summer to sit back, look around, and see where we really are. If nothing else, doing so will stand us in good stead as we get ready for the High Holidays, which --- in spite of our best plans to make the summer last forever --- are just around the corner.

Another Honor for Joe Bertolozzi


We at Vassar Temple are proud of our organist, Joe Bertolozzi, who has often been recognized for his musicianship and his compositions. Most recently, Joe has been the project manager of BMW of the Hudson Valley's BEACONS OF MU-SIC which has been awarded the 2012 Dutchess County Executive Arts Award for Art in Public Spaces.

Re-purposing the facade of an old, boarded up factory building into a public art gallery, BEACONS OF MUSIC features eighteen 7-foot tall portraits of musicians from all genres who make music in the city of Beacon. An interpretive sign on the sidewalk identifies each musician. The installation is located at 2 East Main Street in Beacon and is open to the public free of charge through August 26th.

Book Club to Discuss "Unbroken" on August 22nd

Vassar Temple Sisterhood's Book Club will discuss "Unbroken: A World War II Story of Survival, Resilience, and Redemption" by Laura Hillenbrand, the unforgettable odyssey of a man's journey into extremity, on Wednesday afternoon, August 22nd at 2:00 p.m. in the Community Room of Collegeview Tower, 141 Fulton Ave., Poughkeepsie.

After his plane was shot down over the Pacific in 1943, former juvenile delinquent and Olympic runner Louis Zamperini and his pilot managed to survive on a fragile raft. They traveled 2,000 miles, only to land in a series of Japanese prison camps, where, for the next two years, Zamperini underwent a whole new set of tortures. Called "one of the most extraordinary war stories of all" by the New



York Times, this testament to the resilience of the human mind, body, and spirit by the acclaimed author of "Seabiscuit" is available in paperback and from the local library system.
