Dr. Mihai Grunfeld to Speak at Vassar Temple Shabbat: Dec. 10th

Vassar Temple will observe Human Rights Shabbat with special programming Saturday, Dec.10th, and everyone is invited to join in any or all of the events of the day. Torah study with Rabbi Berkowitz will begin at 9:00am, followed by a torah service at 10:00am.

During the shabbat event, Dr. Mihai Grunfeld will speak on the topic of "Leaving," the story of his escape from Romania as a teenager in 1969 and the fascinating journey which took him through many countries and across several continents before he found a home in the West. He went on to earn a PhD at University of California Berkeley and has been a professor of Spanish and Latin American Literature at Vassar College since 1987. 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Refugee Resettlement Project Update

Earlier this year, the Vassar Temple Board voted to join Vassar College Refugee Solidarity Project, a Dutchess County collaborative, refugee resettlement project with Vassar College and local faith-based institutions, including Vassar Temple, Christ Episcopal Church, the Mid-Hudson Islamic Association, along with Duchess Community College, SUNY New Paltz, Marist College and Mount St. Mary College.

This project is moving forward! Church World Service (CWS) received approval from the U.S. State Department to receive and relocate refugee families to the Hudson Valley, all of whom have been screened and extensively vetted through the offices of the US State Department and Homeland Security. As sponsors, Vassar Temple will work with CWS to assist the designated families with resettlement through financial support and guidance with housing, schools, medical care and employment.

A Community Meeting, held at Vassar College on November 6th with representatives from CWS, addressed questions about the resettlement process. Rabbi Berkowitz and clergy from other faith-based sponsor groups offered prayers and blessings for this project. Representatives from the different sponsor groups were also in attendance to express their support and work on committee assignments. We are especially proud to note that Vassar Temple was the first to make this very important commitment, setting a fine example of leadership for other congrega-

tions and fellowships in our region.

As many of us have watched the current refugee crisis unfold, we have felt helpless in our ability to take a concrete action to make a difference. With this project, we can do more than advocacy and fundraising; we can welcome a family to our community and demonstrate our commitment to addressing the worldwide refugee crisis.

Rabbi's Message: Introducing Laura Stein, Cantorial Student!

Music is an essential part of Jewish worship. Music gives shape to our sacred texts, both our prayers and the words of the Bible. In the days before moveable type and audio-visual systems, music helped us not only to pray together, but also to make our prayers resonate, and to help us to preserve and remember important values and ideas. Case in point, everyone, from the disaffected Hebrew school dropout to the 90-year-old dementia patient, will sing along to a melody they learned as a child, no matter how much time has passed. Music is *hiddur mitzvah*—the beautification of a mitzvah. Music gives voice to emotions that we cannot express in words and often reaches us right in our kishkes, in a way that mere words cannot.

When I came to Vassar Temple, I was extremely impressed with the value that this community places on music. I have served many congregations that had no professional musical leadership, or who knew only one melody for each of the prayers in the service. Vassar Temple's musicians—and congregants—have a diverse repertoire of Jewish songs and an openness to new tunes, and new instruments, when we introduce them. Over the past year, our community has expressed a strong desire to build on the rich musical tradition we already have. We have added piano, percussion, and new melodies to enhance our worship experience, and much of this has caught on so quickly that it is already "tradition"!



With this vision of a beautiful, participatory prayer experience in mind, we have established a connection with the nearby Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. The School of Sacred Music prepares men and women to become ordained cantors, trained not only in Jewish repertoire, but also in the meaning of our sacred texts, and in how to convey the essential ideas of Judaism through music. Training at the School of Sacred Music includes internships at synagogues all over the country, which gives congregations like ours the opportunity to be a part of training the next generation of Jewish leaders!

This year, we will welcome cantorial student Laura Stein to our community for five Shabbatot, during which she will lead the music for our worship services and

teach us new melodies. Laura's expertise in Jewish music, both traditional and modern, will give us a chance to experience a wider range of Jewish melodies and modes. She also brings to our community a wealth of knowledge about the prayers themselves and how to teach them. Here is what Laura has to say about herself: "I grew up in Scarsdale, New York and attended Westchester Reform Temple where my family still belongs. I studied Spanish Literature at Washington University in St. Louis and have lived in Chile. Peru. Iceland, Tanzania and Israel! Currently in my 4th year of Cantorial School at Hebrew Union College, I am passionate about pastoral care and the role of music in healing and prayer. In addition to my cantorial work, I am also interested in traveling to different parts of the world and learning about their musical cultures. I can't wait to sing with the Vassar Temple community and to spend 5777 learning and praying together!"

Laura joined us for the first time at our Family Service on November 11th, and we are delighted to welcome her back on December 16th for our 6:00pm Shabbat Evening Service! Please join me in making Laura feel welcome, and in singing along with her beautiful melodies!

As I write this Bulletin article, I feel the chill in the air and I am contemplating what winter will bring. Will we have many snow

days? Will the roads be difficult for my son, a new driver, to navigate? Will my winter boots hold up for another season? Winter brings lots of great things as well: family time reading and relaxing around the fireplace, skiing, sledding and other winter sports. My biggest difficulty with winter and late fall is how dark it gets so early in the day. I always get excited as the days lengthen when spring approaches.

The Jewish holiday of Chanukah is all about light, which is appropriate for the time of year it falls. Most of us have heard the Chanukah story of the oil lasting longer than expected to provide the Israelites with 8 nights of light in the temple. But this is only part of the story. The Maccabees and their followers were fighting for religious freedom, for the right to be able to study, learn and engage in the words of

the Torah. This Chanukah story is about enlightenment, our desire and right to learn and understand how the world works from a Jewish perspective.

One of the most interesting things I learned about Chanukah was why Chanukah lasts for 8 days and nights. It is about the re-dedication of the 2nd temple in Jerusalem after it was desecrated by the forces of Antiochus IV Epiphanes. The reason that Chanukah is 8 days and nights was to reenact the celebration of Sukkot, one of the three pilgrimage holidays we celebrate. The lights were an afterthought. There were always menorahs alit in the Temple. The lighting of them was part of the rededication.

So this year, we find ourselves celebrating Chanukah when it is in the deep darkness of our winter. In addition, this year our celebration coincides with the celebration of the holiday of Christmas; in fact, the first night is Christmas Eve.

Now I will be the first to make jokes about eating Chinese Food with a side of latkes (which actually sounds rather

yummy), but for many this overlap poses some questions. For example, how do interfaith families celebrate in a way that will enhance the message of Chanukah and Christmas so that their children will come away with a clear understanding that each holiday's message is understood? I am not sure about the answer to this question, except that it should not mean that the kids get double the gifts!

As a Jewish Educator, I would be happy to help you find books, rituals, and ideas for discussion to help your family understand the message of religious freedom in the holiday of Chanukah. I can't really give you good advice on teaching about Christmas, but I am sure that there are many Christian educators that can help you, as well.

I wish your family a winter filled with light and joy and time to cuddle by the fire!

Book Club to Discuss The Gilded Years: December 21st

Vassar Temple's Sisterhood Book Club will discuss The Gilded Years by Karin Tanabe – an emotionally compelling story about the first African American student to

secretly attend Vassar College, at a time when her race would have banned her from admission.

In 1897, Anita Hemmings graduated from Vassar, concealing a truth: she was the School's first black student, passing for white. This fictionalized take on Hem-

ming's real life story animates her struggle to straddle two worlds, each with its own definition of freedom. Set against the vibrant background of the Gilded Age, an era when old money traditions collided with modern times, the author raises questions about how race, gender, and class can both advance and limit opportunities.

This thought provoking historical novel is available in paperback and through the local library system. Muriel Lampell will lead the discussion to which everyone is

welcome.
