Rabbi's Berkowitz' Installation

We are delighted to be installing Rabbi Leah Rachel Berkowitz as the 29th Rabbi of Vassar Temple during shabbat services Friday night, February 5th, 2016. The eminent Rabbi Aaron D. Panken, current President of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, who is a former professor of Rabbi Berkowitz, as well as Cantor Patrice Kaplan, Rabbi Berkowitz's childhood musical inspiration and mentor, will both be present and participating. The service begins at 7:00pm and will be followed by a festive oneg.

In the brief time since her arrival, Rabbi Berkowitz has launched a new initiative for bar/bat mitzvah students and their families and is fashioning a monthly family Shabbat program. She developed a series of Vassar Temple podcasts for YouTube. She has established herself as a role model participating in social justice activities such as CROPWalk, Lunch Box, and interfaith community events. She taught a popular adult education series on bringing the Torah alive through writing midrash and this winter

is the main presenter at three programs on diverse Jewish topics, in partnership with the Mid-Hudson Library system. In all her actions and interactions, Rabbi Berkowitz has made many small changes with large impact to Vassar Temple already.

Prior to the service, at 5:30pm, Rabbi Berkowitz will be feted at a shabbat dinner in the social hall. The cost for the dinner is \$18 per adult, \$10 per children under 13. Free babysitting is available.

Dinner tickets may also be purchased at higher sponsorship levels for which recognition will be given. Funds from the sponsorships will not only go toward a leaf on the Tree of Life in our lobby to honor and welcome our new rabbi, they will help support the new programs that Rabbi Berkowitz is striving to institute as well as fund other much needed improvements to the Temple. For the highest level of sponsorship you will even receive your own leaf on the Tree of Life to be used at any time of your choice when you wish to honor the living or commemorate a joyous event. At the moment I am writing this, it is 14 degrees outside, and not much warmer in my office. I'm

wearing a scarf, fingerless gloves, and two pairs of pants. And yet, I'm thinking of summer.

I just received my faculty assignment for this summer at URJ Crane Lake Camp in West Stockbridge, MA, one of three sleepaway camp programs that the Reform movement offers in the Northeast. I'll be serving as a rabbi there for the very first week of camp: June 26th to July 3rd.

This will be the fourth URJ Camp I've worked with, and I'm continually surprised by how different these spiritually-connected camps are. At Harlam, where I grew up, song session involves dancing and banging on the tables. At OS-RUI, where I worked as faculty, campers sit cross-legged on the floor, waving their arms wildly in time to the music. One could write a doctoral dissertation on the variations in the "Announcements" song from camp to camp, which is sung whenever a careless person

says the offending word. Harlam's ended with a demand that announcements be recited in rhyme; Eisner's ended with an attempt to throw the guilty party in the lake!

Every camp has its own culture and style, and yet, they share many common threads that make them amazing places to spend our summers. Inviting rabbis, cantors and educators from area Reform synagogues to spend time at camp each summer is one thing that makes camp great.

What do rabbis do at camp? We create Jewish learning experiences—which in some camps are a scheduled part of the day and at others are woven into the regular camp activities. We guide campers and staff as they create meaningful weekday and Shabbat prayer moments. But the most important thing we do is hang out with our kids outside of the walls of the synagogue. We high-five them when they score a goal. We are inspired by the art projects (or science experiments) they are working on. We bring them hugs from home and see their bewildered faces when they see us in shorts and t-shirts for the first

time. And we watch THEM lead Shabbat services for a change!

I am really hoping that you will join me this summer, at Crane Lake or at one of our neighbors, Eisner Camp and 6-Points Sci-Tech Academy, both of which I will likely also visit. Together, we can experience everything that's different from camp to camp, and everything that's the same.

There are still spots at all three camps for campers entering grades 3 through 10 (as well as some URJ summer programs for teens). Be sure to visit <http://eisner-cranelake.urjcamp.org/>! Our theater folks might be interested to know that the URJ is, for the first time ever, offering a theater program in New York City for middle and high schoolers! Check out <http://justactnyc.org/>!

February may seem early to think about camp, but cabins fill up quickly. DON'T WAIT to register your children! An amazing summer awaits them!

From Our Religious School Director: Unique Gifts



This month's Torah portions detail the building of the great Tabernacle, which in many ways is the spiritual precedent for our modern-day synagogues. In particular, we read about the various ways people contributed to this most central undertaking.

In the portion from the middle of the month, we are told that people are all supposed to donate "whatever their heart prompts." A passage at the end of the month demands an assessment of one-half shekel from each person. And right after that section, the text tells us about Betzalel, a man of unique creative and artistic talent.

These three themes have proven so central that their vocabulary endures to this day. For example, the Hebrew word for "tabernacle" is MISHKAN, and that's the first word of the name of our Reform prayer book, "Mishkan T'fillah," that is, a "tabernacle of prayer." The shekel as a monetary unit is in use again today in the modern state of Israel. And Israel's most prestigious art academy is named Betzalel.

In addition, these three different approaches suggest three different ways of contributing to our sacred Vassar Temple projects, both in the school and beyond.

One way, based on the first passage, is that people offer what moves them. For some, this might be a donation honoring or recognizing someone. For others, it might be volunteering in some particularly meaningful fashion.

Countering this first way is the second: Everyone gives something, even if it's only a token half-shekel.

Thirdly, we have the category of expertise. Betzalel was an uncommonly gifted artist --- "filled with the spirit of God, with wisdom, with understanding, with knowledge, and with all kinds of skills" with which to fashion art. For this reason, Betzalel and a helper named Ohaliab were tasked with creating the detailed and exquisite furnishings of the Tabernacle.

When all three of these models co-exist properly, we get a double reward. The people in the community feel valued, and the community itself benefits from all that its members have to

offer: joint pride in building something together, an opportunity to feel good about contributing, and a chance to provide niche skills.

But we pay a doubly severe price when we confuse the models --- by asking too much of people without regard to whether they feel moved to provide what we ask, or by confusing good will with expertise so that experts feel ignored and amateurs feel unduly burdened, or by ignoring what people can contribute, and so on.

It's a tricky balance, but an important one, because at its core it reflects the key observation that no two people are the same.

Equally, each of us --- regardless of age or station, of background or training, of experience or skill --- has a unique to gift to offer. When we provide a forum to receive and value those gifts --- when we recognize the individuality of each individual --- our community, like its model thousands of years ago, thrives in marvelous and unexpected ways.

Book Club to Discuss *Little Failure* on February 17th

Vassar Temple's Sisterhood's Book Club will discuss "Little Failure" by Gary Shteyngart, a memoir described by critics as finding the delicate balance between sidesplitting humor and heartbreak. The meeting will take place on Wednesday, February 17th at 2:00pm in the Community Room of Collegeview Tower, 141 Fulton Avenue, Poughkeepsie.

Little Failure is the true story of a Russian immigrant family, as told by a lifelong misfit who finally finds a place for himself through books and words. In 1979, a little boy, "schlepping" an enormous fur hat and an oversize coat, slips off the plane at JFK and into his new American life. His troubles are just beginning. Careening between his Soviet home life and his American aspirations, he finds himself living in two contradictory worlds, wishing for a real home in one. He becomes so strange to his parents that his mother coins the nickname to her once promising son, "failurchka," or "little failure." From the terrors of Hebrew School, to a crash course in first love, and a return visit to the homeland that is no longer home, Gary Shteyngart has crafted a brave and funny memoir of searching for every kind of love – family love, romantic love, and most of all, love of self.

This inspiring memoir is available in paperback and through the local library system. Myrna Rubenstein will lead the discussion to which everyone is welcome. GREAT GRANT NEWS!

Vassar Temple has been awarded two grants totaling \$5,000 through the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley!!!

The first is \$2,500 from the Bertha Effron Fund to support a Shabbaton in collaboration with other local congregations featuring noted author and internationally renowned scholar, Dr. Jay Michaelson. Dr. Michaelson is the author of six books and more than three hundred articles on religion, sexuality, law and contemplative practice, topics that will be prominent themes throughout his visit. The second grant, also for \$2,500, came from the Ann and Abe Effron Donor Advised Fund in support of the Vassar Temple Religious School. One portion of the funding will underwrite expenses associated with Hebrew Education in the Religious School and another will enable the school to offer a special series this spring on Israel Education.

We are indebted to the members of the Effron Family and the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley whose thoughtful generosity is providing these wonderful enrichment opportunities to our community. Special thanks to Jen Dahnert for pursuing and writing these grants. Such funding is key to the vitality and sustainability of Vassar Temple.

Rabbi Regina Jonas: Auschwitz Rabbi

The fall of the Berlin Wall in the 1990s brought to light much hitherto unknown information, including the inspiring true story of the first ordained female rabbi, a German woman named Regina Jonas. Born in 1902, devoutly Orthodox in her upbringing, and a gifted scholar and teacher, Regina was denied a place in the rabbinate by the Orthodox movement, finally becoming ordained by a liberal rabbi in her native Germany in 1935. Tragically, just seven years later, Rabbi Jonas was sent to the Nazi camps, where she served the spiritual needs of the captives to the best of her ability until she was murdered in Auschwitz in 1944 at the age of 42.

In celebration of the 80th anniversary of her ordination, Rabbi Jonas's life will be commemorated **Sunday, Feb. 21st** at 2:30pm in Poughkeepsie at the Adriance Memorial Library, with the showing of the movie *Regina*, followed by a discussion led by Rabbi Berkowitz.

The community is invited to come and learn about this remarkable Jewish figure; refreshments will be served. This program is co-sponsored by the area Sisterhoods and Jewish women's organizations, and supported by the Mid-Hudson Library system. HAMANTASCHEN DOUGH RECIPE

4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla

4 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup butter, softened*
2 eggs
4 tablespoons milk or orange juice

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar, add egg and vanilla and beat well. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk or juice, mixing until well-blended. Refrigerate. The dough may seem a bit sticky, but chilling will solidify it, so don't add too much extra flour. This dough freezes well and can be made ahead of Hamantaschen Baking Day. Leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight before baking day.
