Shabbat Service Time Back to 7:30 in March

Blowout Purim Celebration on March 10th

Vassar Temple will be celebrating Purim in high style again this year. Purim starts on Wednesday evening, March 7th when Rabbi Golomb will read the Megillah of Esther. But the big celebration will take place on Saturday evening, March 10th and will include a reprise of Rabbi's traditional wacky Megillah reading.

Begin by bringing your family to the pasta dinner sponsored by the Men's Club at 5:45 on March 10th. (See article on this page for details and make your reservation.)

Our service will begin at 7:00, and will feature a costume parade for children and a special Purim *spiel* called "Purim in a Galaxy Far, Far Away," written and produced by our own Art Menken. You are sure to laugh at the dialogue, be amazed at the costumes and special effects created by our congregants, and be impressed by the acting of talented temple members of all ages.

The evening will conclude with the sharing of hamantaschen and other goodies. Adults as well as children are encouraged to come in costume. Don't forget to bring a box of Purim Pasta to shake during the Megillah reading whenever Haman's name is mentioned! (See article on this page about Purim Pasta.)

The annual Wind Chill Fund campaign, which culminates this month, benefits Hillcrest overnight shelter for the homeless in the Town of Poughkeepsie. Hudson River Housing hopes to celebrate its 30th anniversary by raising \$30,000 for Hillcrest during the campaign.

The Jewish tradition of hospitality, symbolized by our patriarch and matriarch Abraham and Sarah's open tent, continues today in our support of shelters such as Hillcrest. I am struck by the significance of the amount it costs to house one male or female guest there for one night – \$36 or, as that special number is known in Jewish tradition, "double chai." Wouldn't it be wonderful if as many of us as possible could donate double chai to the fund?

But be assured that any and all donations will be put to good use, providing

transportation to and from the shelter, a clean, comfortable and safe place to sleep, a hot shower, dinner and breakfast, and referral and advocacy services, to 40-60 of our homeless neighbors each day. Donations may be placed in the tzedakah box near the staircase or brought or mailed to the Temple office. Donations by check can be made out to Vassar Temple with "Wind Chill Fund" on the memo line. Thanks to all of you for your vital support of this life-sustaining community resource.

From Our Religious School Director:



The Jewish month of Adar, which coincides roughly with March this year, is known for joy and happiness, primarily because of Purim. We will bake hamantaschen, dress

up in costume, and read the Book of Esther ("The Megillah") in celebration. According to verse 9:26 of that very book, we get the name "Purim" from the *pur* that was cast: "Therefore, they called these days 'Purim' after 'pur." But while purim is the Hebrew plural of pur, pur itself is not a Hebrew word. For this reason, twice before in Esther, when pur is mentioned, we are told, "...pur, that is, the goral." So a pur is a goral, but what is a goral?

In all likelihood, *goral* originally referred to of a bunch of small pebbles or similar objects used to make decisions by chance. They would be cast down on the ground or put in a vessel of some sort, from which one would be drawn at random. (A similar practice, in which stones were placed in a helmet, is clearly documented from Homeric Greece. The Greek verb for casting these objects was *ballein*, from which we get our English word "ballot.")

For example, in Leviticus 16, Aaron takes "two goats," "a *goral* for God" and a "*goral* for Azazel." Then the goat that

God's goral lands on is God's goat, and the goat that Azazel's goral lands on is Azazel's goat. This latter goat is sent "to Azazel" in atonement. (Based on an ancient misunderstanding of the Hebrew "to Azazel," a 1530 translation reads "to scape" instead of "to Azazel," giving us the English word "scapegoat.") Goral later progressed to mean not only the item which was cast, but also that which determined the victor. (And because real estate was so often allocated by goral, goral also meant "real estate.") In the meantime, presumably on the assumption that destiny or fate had something to do with who won, goral began to mean "destiny" as well.

The English word "lot" followed exactly the same path, meaning at first a small (usually wooden) object used to make random decisions (as in "draw lots") and then both what one received (for example, a "lot of land") and what one is destined to receive (as in one's "lot in life.") Up to this point in the story a Hebrew *goral* is exactly an English "lot."

But the authors of the Dead Sea scrolls frequently mention *goral*, using it to mean "group of people" or "followers." In "The Rule of the Community," a document (technically referred to as

"1QS") that describes all aspects of life in the Qumran sect, God has a *goral* and Belial (God's Qumranic foe) has a *goral*. The priests bless those in God's *goral* with a version of the priestly benediction, whereas the Levites curse those in Belial's *goral* (1QS 2:2-5). The War Scroll ("1QM"), which describes the final battle between the forces of good ("light") and the forces of evil ("darkness") before the "end of days," begins with the prediction that the first attack by the sons of light will be against the *goral* of the sons of darkness. If this usage of *goral* is akin to the English expression "to throw one's lot in with," God's *goral* are the people who chose God, not the people that God chose.

Returning to *pur*, the word probably comes from Akkadian, which has a root *pur*, "real estate lot," and a similar-sounding root meaning "vessel." Perhaps Akkadian real estate lots, too, were allocated by drawing lots. (About 1,000 years ago, the famous commentator Ibn Ezra thought the word might be Persian, but while Persian has a word *pur*, it means "son.").

By curious chance, the word *pur*, if it were Hebrew, would have to have come from the Hebrew root p.r.r, which means "to break into crumbs." So in addition to reflecting our choice in God and our ancient good fortune, our early-spring holiday's name indirectly reflects the hamantaschen we use to celebrate it. Which, in the case of Purim, is just the way the cookie crumbles. Happy Purim!

Vassar Temple and Temple Beth-El to Hold Joint Shabbaton, March 2-3

The annual Joint Shabbaton sponsored by Vassar Temple and Temple Beth-El will take place during the weekend of March 2-3. The guest speaker for the Shabbaton will be Rabbi Elyse Goldstein who has been the Rabbinic Director of the Kolel Adult Centre for Liberal Jewish Learning in Toronto for the past 20 years. An accomplished academic, Rabbi Goldstein is an articulate and passionate teacher with a nation-wide reputation. During the five years she served as Rabbi of Temple Beth David in Canton, Massachusetts, the congregation grew from 80 families to over 200 families.

The Shabbaton will begin with a joint Shabbat service at Vassar Temple on Friday, March 2nd at 7:30 p.m. during which Rabbi Goldstein will speak about "Growing the 21st Century Synagogue: Lessons from Success." A special oneg Shabbat will follow the service.

The 10:00 a.m. joint Shabbat morning service at Temple Beth-El on Saturday, March 3rd will be followed at noon by a Kiddush Luncheon and a talk by Rabbi Goldstein called "Women are from Genesis, Men are from Leviticus: Do Men and Women Read the Torah Differently?" The author of ReVisions: Seeing Torah through a Feminist Lens and The Women's Torah Commentary, The Women's Haftarah Commentary and New Jewish Feminism (chosen as finalist for the National Jewish Book Award), Rabbi Goldstein is the recipient of numerous awards, including the most prestigious award in Jewish education, the internationally recognized Covenant Award for Exceptional Jewish Educators in 2005.

She is also the author of a self-guided adult study textbook on Women and Judaism called Seek Her Out, published by the URJ Press. She is currently creating a new Reform congregation in downtown Toronto which will be up and running by the High Holy Days of 2012.


Lou Lewis Assumes Role as Federation President



"The Art of The Haggadah" on March 27th

On Tuesday, March 27th at 7:00 p.m. our adult education committee will host an illustrated presentation on "Art, Narrative and Religious Imagination in the Passover Haggadah" by Vassar College professor Marc Michael Epstein.

The Passover Seder would be unimaginable without the haggadah, and the haggadah would be incomplete without its illustrations. Join Prof. Epstein in an exploration of the ways in which the illustrated haggadah became the ultimate way of fulfilling the mandate of envisioning oneself as if one had personally come out of Egypt on the night of the Seder. Discover one of the most beautiful, yet most enigmatic, haggadot ever created, the Golden Haggadah, and delve into its mysteries: for whom was it made, and what is its secret message?

An historian of Jewish art and culture, Marc Michael Epstein has been teaching at Vassar since 1992. He is a graduate of Oberlin College, received his PhD from Yale University, and did much of his graduate research at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He has written on various aspects of visual and material

culture produced by, for, and about Jews. His most recent book, The Medieval Haggadah: Art, Narrative, and Religious Imagination (Yale, 2011) was selected by the London Times Literary Supplement as one of the best books published last year.

"Gates of the Seasons"

B. PESACH

B-1 The mitzvah of observing Pesach

It is a *mitzvah* to observe Pesach for seven days, beginning on the eve of the fifteenth of Nisan. As the Torah says, "in the first month, from the fourteenth day of the month at evening, (142) you shall eat unleavened bread until the twenty-first day of the month at evening" (Exodus 12:18).

B-2 The mitzvah of removing leaven (Chametz)

It is a *mitzvah* to remove leaven from one's home prior to the beginning of Pesach. Leaven refers to products made from wheat, barley, rye, oats, and spelt, which have been permitted to leaven. Ashkenazi custom adds rice, millet, corn, and legumes (like peas, beans, etc.). The removal of leaven is based on the Biblical injunction found in Exodus 12:15: "On the very first day you shall remove leaven from your house." If one does not actually remove all the leaven from one's home, one should place it in a closet or cabinet appropriately marked so that it will not be used during Pesach. (144)

Searching for leaven (Bedikat Chametz) on the night before the first Seder is a Pesach custom that has special appeal for children. (145) After the house has been cleaned for Pesach, a symbolic search for the last remains of leaven is made. At various places in the home, pieces of leaven are hidden. Then children, with flashlights or other illumination, search them out in the dark. The bread is gathered in a bag and burned or disposed of the next morning with the following blessing:

Ba-ruch a-ta, A-do-nai E-lo-hei-nu, me-lech ha-o-lam, a-sher ki-de-sha-nu be-mitz-vo-tav ve-tsi-va-nu al bi-ur cha-metz.

Blessed are you, O Lord our God, Ruler of the Universe Who hallows us with Mitzvot and commands us to burn Chametz.

Since leaven has been removed, one should not eat bread after breakfast on the day before the *Seder*. To heighten the appetite for *Matzah* at the *Seder* itself, *Matzah* is not eaten at least a full day before the *Seder*. (146)

B-3 The mitzvah of abstaining from eating leaven (Chametz)

It is a *mitzvah* to abstain from eating leaven (Chametz) during the entire seven days of Pesach. As the Torah states, "You shall eat nothing leavened..." (Exodus 12:20). Among Reform Jews, abstaining from leaven may take many forms – from not eating those foods which obviously contain leaven, such as bread or cake, to the more stringent avoidance and examination of all ingredients in a particular foodstuff. By consciously making a choice to abstain during the whole week of Pesach, one is constantly aware of the Festival and one's identity as a Jew.

B-4 The mitzvah of preparing a Seder

It is a *mitzvah* for everyone to participate in the preparations for the *Seder*—cooking, cleaning, and setting the festive table. (147) The leader of the *Seder* has the special obligation to review the *Haggadah* in advance and decide

which passages will be included. The experience of the *Seder* is enhanced when all the participants are provided with the same *Haggadah*. In addition, the tradition encourages the use of beautiful ritual items to increase our enjoyment of the *mitzvot* (see "*Hidur Mitzvah*: The Aesthetics of *Mitzvot*," pages 162-164).

Although Reform Jews do not celebrate the second day of Pesach as a holiday, many people have a second *Seder*. Sometimes they join in a communal *Seder* or gather with in-laws or relatives and friends who attended other first night *Sedarim*. The second *Seder* may follow the same pattern as the first or many have another focus, such as the liberation of specific oppressed Jewish communities. A second *Seder* may provide the opportunity to add passages omitted on the first night.

B-5 The *mitzvah* of hospitality (*Hachnasat Orechim*)

It is a *mitzvah* to invite guests to join in the *Seder*. So important is it that the invitation is included in the text of the *Haggadah*, "Let all who are hungry come and eat, let all who are in want share the hope of Passover." (148) Arrangements should be made to see that no one has to celebrate Passover alone. Many communities make special arrangements for those who are alone, including the elderly, widows, widowers, and college students who are away from home.

B-6 The mitzvah of Tzedakah

It is a *mitzvah* to give *Tzedakah* before the beginning of Passover. (149) Tradition encourages the solicitation of special funds (*Me-ot Chitin*) to provide a proper *Seder* for the poor. (150)

Blessed is our God through whose goodness we have been brought to the privilege of sharing our nourishment.
