On Friday, March 7th, Vassar Temple's Friday evening services will resume at the **7:30 pm** time.

Third Annual VT First Night Seder: Pesach 2014/5776

On Monday evening, April 14, 2014 at 5:30pm, a lay-organized and led Passover Seder will take place in the Vassar Temple Social Hall.

Complementing the traditional ritual foods, a delicious 4-course dinner will be served. The menu includes: matzo ball soup, gefilte fish, entrée of either herbed roasted chicken/beef brisket and/ or vegetarian loaf in mushroom sauce, vegetables, potatoes and selected Pesach dessert sweets. Chopped chicken liver with 'mock' alternative and crudités will be available for nibbling. Ritual wine, tea and soft drinks will be provided.

After the dinner, the first ever Passover Triathlon will be held with prizes for all the winners!

To cover expenses, the cost is \$30pp [adult]; \$10pp [6 - 13 yrs old]; under 6 are free. Maximum of \$70 per nuclear family [parents & children]

Rabbi's Message: PURIM....SERIOUSLY Let the wild rumpus begin!



The late Maurice Sendak employed that exhortation in his classic *Where the Wild Things Are* to introduce a few pages of illustrations depicting Max (the *vilde khaya* – a Yiddish endearment for an overly energetic child)

dancing with his Wild Things [vilde khayas] before returning to his room and finding that his dinner was still warm. Sendak had created a love note to a childhood's imagination and enthusiasm. Occasionally it would go over the top, require a "time out," but never violate that fundamental love parents have for their children.

Purim is the child Israel's wild rumpus before the parent God. It is imaginative, enthusiastic, and a bit transgressive; but in the end, the dinner is still warm.

The Megilla's tale of Esther, Mordechai and the wicked Haman is filled with deception. Everyone is trying to hide something from someone else. Mordechai, his relationship to Esther; Esther, her Jewish identity; Haman, his real ambitions; even Ahasuarus conceals his ultimate powerlessness. And God hides as well, never even being mentioned once throughout the story. Jewish tradition established that from sunrise to sunset on the day before Purim, one is supposed to fast, indeed should refrain from eating until the Megillah is read. It is as if God had sent us up to our rooms with no dinner, but then, as a loving parent, relents, and we stuff ourselves with strong drink and sweets (hamentashen).

So, Purim does not merely permit, it virtually *invites* silliness, inanity and impiety. Vassar Temple's annual Purim Spiel – thank you Art Menken and the mighty Vassar Temple Art Players – should not be experienced as an entertainment, but rather as an invitation to jump in. You, too, can be a star!

Purim is also a fairy tale. Bruno Bettelheim, a noted psychologist in the last century, observed that fairy tales, as a rule, described children or young adults having to confront a mortal danger, but surviving, even triumphing in the end. Thus, in the Purim story, the Jews are in danger of annihilation, but due to the plucky bravery of Esther (our young heroine!), the danger is averted.

We are reminded by Purim that life can be hostile and dangerous. Yet we do not give in to its grimness; instead we laugh in its face. But Purim is not the ten days of repentance, the week of Sukkot, eight days of Hannukah or the week of Passover. It is just one day; a brief opportunity to let off some steam before we go back to the serious task of living.

Toward the end of the biblical Book of Esther we read: [The Jews] were to observe it as a day of feasting and merrymaking, and as an occasion for sending gifts to one another, and presents to the poor (9:22). Silliness gives way to sobriety. Our joy is turned into providing joy for those who do not have the wherewithal to do it for themselves.

I look forward to seeing you on Purim eve (March 15), fully prepared to join me making absolute fools of ourselves. (For some of us it is easier than for others!) And don't forget to come to the Temple with boxes of pasta or other non-perishable food – our presents to the poor.

From the Religious School Director: Purim Is on Its Way



Our yearly festival of frivolity highlights silliness and masquerading, so it's easy to think of the holiday as trivial. For many people, Purim is only for children, or only

for having fun.

But the mystics who gave us Kabbalah insist that Purim is so central that it is in the same category as Yom Kippur. Those two holidays alone will continue to be celebrated after the Messiah comes. Furthermore, the mystics teach, Purim and Yom Kippur are two sides of the same coin. For one thing, the letters of the full Hebrew name of Yom Kippur --- Yom Ha-Kippurim --- also spell Yom Ha-K'Purim, which means, "the day that is like Purim." In this sense Yom Kippur and Purim are literally similar.

In addition, both deal with food, but in opposite ways. On Yom Kippur we fast, while on Purim we feast. Both deal with dressing up, but in opposite ways. On Yom Kippur we try to face our unmasked selves as we come to terms with who we really are, while on Purim we purposely hide behind masks and costumes, pretending to be who we are not.

Both deal with reality, but in opposite ways. In Yom Kippur's studious and straightforward narrative, there are only two characters, "God" and "me." Purim's main text is a fanciful farce where no one is who they appear to be. King Ahashuerus is a decidedly un-kinglike buffoon. Vashti, who stands up for her rights, is but a bit player. The heroine is Esther, a seemingly shallow beauty queen who sleeps her way to the top. Her leading man is her cousin, Mordecai. Both of them are named after Pagan gods, of all things, Ishtar for Esther and Marduk for Mordecai. God doesn't even have a role, or, at least, no speaking part.

Yom Kippur is full of dread, while Purim is so happy that its joy flavors all of Adar, the Jewish month in which it falls. "We are extra-happy once Adar begins," goes the traditional saying.

Yom Kippur and Purim: two sides of the same coin, two ways of looking at life, two extremes that set the boundaries between which our daily life is lived.
