Vassar-Beth El Joint Shabbaton: March 11-12

Noted author, scholar and spiritual leader, Rabbi Dr. Jay Michaelson, will be the featured scholar-in-residence at the 2016 Shabbaton, jointly organized by Vassar Temple and Temple Beth El.

Author of six books and a columnist for *The Daily Beast* and *The Forward*, Dr. Michaelson has appeared on NPR, CBS and MSNBC. He speaks on many contemporary issues, including, but not limited to, religion, law and LGBT. Dr. Michaelson received a JD degree from Yale Law School and is most known for his work on LGBT issues. Ordained as a non-denominational Rabbi, Dr. Michaelson is also a scholar of Jewish mysticism and serves on the faculty of Chicago Theological Seminary. Dr. Michaelson's book credits include Lambda Award winner *God Versus Gay: The Religious Case For Equality*, *Everything is God*, *Evolving Dharma*, and most recently, *Gate of Tears*.

Dr. Michaelson will be speaking at Vassar Temple on Friday evening, March 11th and at Temple Beth El on Saturday morning, March 12th. He will also lead a meditation session at Temple Beth El on Saturday morning, prior to services and will speak following lunch that afternoon.

This special visit has been made possible through a grant from the Bertha Effron Fund of the Community Foundation of the Hudson Valley. We are very fortunate to have Dr. Michaelson with us for the weekend; please save the date and plan to attend.

Rabbi's Message: Purim: An "Inside Out" Holiday



The first movie I saw after I moved to Poughkeepsie was Pixar's "*Inside Out*." I love all Pixar movies, but

this storyline was particularly close to my heart. "*Inside Out*" follows an eleven-year-old girl, Riley, as she adjusts to life in a new city. I spent much of the film simultaneously crying and laughing, which is, actually, the whole point of the movie.

Riley's story is told from the point of view of her five emotions: Joy, Sadness, Anger, Fear, and Disgust. For much of the film, Joy and Sadness are at odds. Joy is the head of the emotional household, and she thinks her purpose is to keep Sadness from ruining everything. After a long journey together, Joy realizes that Sadness, too, has a place at the table. Without Sadness, we wouldn't actually know how to be happy.

This is why I chose "*Inside Out*" as the theme of this year's Purimshpiel.

The Jewish calendar is an emotional roller-coaster. At Passover, we throw off the shackles of our winter hibernation and celebrate the feeling of libera-

tion that marks the onset of spring. On the High Holy Days, we watch the leaves change and contemplate our own potential for transformation. In the depths of winter, we kindle the lights of Chanukah, a symbol of hope even in our darkest nights.

What emotion, then, is Purim?

Purim arrives on the cusp of winter and spring. We've had enough snow; we're simultaneously sluggish and stir-crazy. Any hint of warmth, or the scent of flowers piercing the winter air, is enough to make our hearts flutter with excitement. It is in this moment of spring fever that we celebrate Purim. Purim is an opportunity for us to come together after a long winter and shake our sillies out. We wear costumes, wigs, masks, and makeup. We make up silly songs, stomp our feet on the floor, and shake our noisemakers—in the middle of services!

Underneath the silliness lie more serious emotions: In the Purim story, our heroes experience their own fear, anger, sadness, and disgust, as they look within themselves for the courage to be their true selves, and to stand up to the ultimate

bully, Haman. Purim brings all of these emotions to the surface. By leading us through this emotional thrill ride, Purim reminds us to make space for all emotions in our lives. Even as we celebrate a victory, we are vigilant against prejudice and persecution. Even as we struggle to find our place in the world, we make time to be playful and sing out in joy.

I encourage everyone to watch "*Inside Out*" before our Purimshpiel (**Wednesday, March 23rd at 7:00pm**). This year we will be combining the megillah reading with the Purimshpiel, so that we can fulfill Purim's charge to mix the silly with the serious, the sadness with the joy. Come in costume, and bring boxed rice and pasta so that we can make some joyful noise (and donate it to the Morse Magnet School Food Pantry afterwards)!

As we prepare for Purim, I hope you will join me on **March 15th at 7:00pm** for a text study on gender roles in the Purim story: "*The Feminine and the Feminist in the Book of Esther*," which will feature midrashim on the Purim story, as well as artistic representations of Esther and Vashti!

President's Message: The Next Phase



Over the last few years, the Officers and Trustees of Vassar Temple have made strides in reducing our operating costs. Through capital improvements we have improved our systems in order to significantly lower the cost of utilities. We've also reduced monthly maintenance expenses even as we've improved the Temple's appearance. Frankly, there is hardly any operating cost that we can reduce at this point without there being a significant change to our program. The next phase is the Growth Phase. We need to grow the spirit of Vassar Temple.

Membership seems to have stabilized at about 185 households, give or take. We have held the line on dues for the last couple of years, and it is my plan to do so again as we go into our budgeting process. The answer is not higher dues! The answer is that we need more members. Put another way, we need more people in the pews!

But before membership can happen, we need to grow the spirit of Vassar Temple... the team spirit... the family spirit... the spirit of friendship... the spirit of learning... the spirit of Jewish traditions and Jewish values.

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It will come as no surprise to you that demographic trends, and trends with respect to involvement in organized religion, are not helping matters. It is somewhat like trying to paddle against the current. But we live on the mighty Hudson River, and as you probably know, one of the things that makes our magnificent river special is that it has a tidal current; when the tide changes, the river current flows the other way.

I believe the tide is turning for the City of Poughkeepsie, Judaism, and Vassar Temple. Mayor Rob Rolison, our newly elected City of Poughkeepsie Mayor, ran with the campaign slogan "Believe in Poughkeepsie." Is he right? To begin with, "belief" can be a self-fulfilling prophecy. (Pun intended.) For another thing, we have seen what can happen when a city "get's its mojo back," as well as its act together. Look at Beacon: the resurgence is having a tremendous positive impact on businesses and non-profits there, including Beacon's temple. The same can happen in Poughkeepsie! "A rising tide lifts all boats!"

Here are three things that I am asking you to do:

1. **Start by going to temple.** Attend a service once or so a month. Take part in

more holidays. Enjoy the experience of being a Jew! Watch our Bulletin and emails for upcoming events and set aside time. You'll find it enriches your life and brings you joy! If you have children, that's even better. This is how Judaism is handed down from generation to generation. This is what keeps Judaism alive; one household at a time. Jewish pride!!

2. **Tell Others.** Word of mouth is the most effective and economical means to draw new friends to our temple. Do NOT, I repeat, DO NOT use the word "membership." That is like talking about a marriage even before the first date! It may take a couple of years before someone is ready to make a membership commitment. We have to start with just simply getting to know one another. That can begin with you sharing stories about your experiences and inviting people to join you for something at the Temple. It could be for a service or holiday, a social activity, or an adult education topic. And, when you do enjoy yourself at our beloved Temple, share your experience on social media. Getting the word out is crucial because the people we want to reach are not in the Temple; they are outside, in the community!

From Our Religious School Director: Numbers and Names



We live in a society practically obsessed with numbers: social-security numbers, phone numbers, population counts, Dow-Jones industrial

averages, batting averages, test scores, dates, ages, and myriad varieties of statistics. Fill out an application for something, and you're likely to need more numbers than letters. Try to understand a new situation, and you'll probably get more numbers than letters.

Numbers have their place. We have a whole book of the Torah called "Numbers" in English, after all, and it starts with a prolonged census discussion. But Exodus in Hebrew is called "Names" (SH'MOT), because even though it tallies the number of people born to Jacob, the book starts with their names.

Genesis, too, contains numbers, but it's about names. What we know about Adam is his name, just like what we know about Eve is her name. And Adam relates to the animals not by counting them but by naming them --- a tradition that continues today when people give their pets names.

Moses even demands to know God's name before he's willing to work in earnest to do God's work.

Names and numbers represent two different ways of understanding people.

I know what it's like to have 20 6th-graders in a room, and I know that it's different than having 20 2nd-graders or 20 parents. And just as clearly, a group of 20 6th-graders is entirely different than a group of 200. But that doesn't mean that each 6th grader is the same, any more than each parent is the same. People are not interchangeable, no matter their age. Yet I frequently hear people suggest that they know what a person or class is like because they know some statistics. "Oh, I've worked with middle schoolers," people tell me. Or, "you let a high-school student do that?" Or, "that's a smart answer for someone only in 3rd grade."

These comments --- and many more like them --- are both well meaning and, frequently, based in reality. But not unlike other stereotypes, they push us in the direction of forgetting that each person is unique and, similarly, wrongly encourage us to concentrate on numbers to the exclusion of

names.

We invest considerable energy in making our school a poignant antidote to this widespread pattern.

We do keep track of numbers, of course, as various signs of the health of the school: 8% year-over-year growth, for instance, and 75% retention beyond bar/bat mitzvah. And we plan different activities for 2nd graders than we do for 8th graders.

But much more, we keep track of people.

We know that a student who attends 50% of the time may be showing up every opportunity he has if a shared custody arrangement prohibits him from attending half of the time. We know that some students thrive best with older or younger peers. We know that some teachers mesh better with certain kinds of learners.

We know that numbers are only the first step in focusing on what really matters: the individually named people that make up our holy community.
