Rabbi's Message: TURNING IT OVER AND OVER AGAIN



In college, I used to attend an informal lunch-bag seminar on religion and science. The word "cybernetics" came up, and a fellow student admitted he had never heard the word before. (This was the late 1960s.) The student,

who was working on a graduate degree in English Literature, then announced: if the word is not in Shakespeare or the Bible, it does not exist!

My colleague was exaggerating, of course, but only just a little. Shakespeare produced so many new words in his plays that he can fairly be called the creator of modern English. The Bible, on the other hand, is something else. As a sacred book its ideas and themes are fundamentally timeless. A rabbinic sage with the odd name of Ben Bag Bag advised that one need only "turn it (the pages of Scripture) over and over again, and find everything in it."

Consider, therefore, the biblical Book of Ruth. It is really only a short story – less than 100 sentences in length – but nonetheless full of intriguing issues. The Book defines the Festival of Shavuot. Shavuot is principally the celebration of the revelation at Mt. Sinai – the giving of the Ten Commandments. The Book of Ruth moves the observation into deeper territory. Consider:

At the beginning of the story a famine hits the land of Israel and one family picks up and leaves for Moab. Two thoughts come to my mind: the Okies who left the Dust Bowl in the late 1920s, early 30s, mostly for California (as in Steinbeck's **Grapes of Wrath**), and the classic Kenny Rogers song: *Know when to hold 'em; know when to fold 'em, when to walk away, when to run*. When does adversity lead you to quit, and when does it stiffen your resolve and cause you to hold out longer in hope and expectation that things will turn around?

Sometime later the one surviving member of the family decides to return to Israel. The act echoes earlier decisions made by Abraham when famine pushed him into Egypt, and Jacob who had fled to Aram. Why return? What is the attraction of home, even after everyone is gone? Jews have historically been "light on their feet;" picking up relatively easily from one place and moving elsewhere – sometimes thousands of miles away. What is home to the people Israel?

Finally, Ruth the Moabite chooses to return with her mother-in-law to an unknown land. Again, there is an echo of God's call to Abraham to leave his father's land and go "to a place that I will show you." Ruth, however, was not moved by God, but by something else. What was it? What impels someone to set aside their personal past and commit

themselves to a wholly different future? Ruth, the great-grandmother of King David, committed herself to the Jewish people. What does such a commitment mean to each of us, whether we were born in a Jewish home or not?

While Shavuot formally focuses on God's revealing of the divine *mitzvot* (commandments) from the top of the mountain, the Book of Ruth redirects that focus on the people who received them. Needless to say, that people is us!

Please join me on Tuesday, May 14 at 8pm, at Temple Beth-El for the annual study with Rabbis Loevinger, Polish and myself, in observance of Shavuot. We will hold a service and *yizkor* at Vassar Temple on Wednesday, May 15 at 10am.

Also mark your calendars for Sunday, June 2 at 10am when, as a congregation, we celebrate a Confirmation Service to recognize an important milestone in our students' Jewish education at Vassar Temple as Danielle Brundage, Noah Carbo, Wayne Hartman, Rachel Marcus, and Kiley Quackenbush are confirmed.

From the Religious School Director



I write this as we begin the transformative period known as the Omer --- that 49-day journey from Passover to Shavuot, from slavery in Egypt to acceptance of To-

rah at Sinai. As I explained last year, "if Passover is a flamboyant celebration of possibility, Shavuot is an understated celebration of reality. The Omer is the time when we move from one to the other."

At this time of reflection it seems appropriate to ask how we're doing in terms of education at Vassar Temple, and where we're going. Here are a few of my thoughts.

Perhaps most exciting, we're planning a brand new, in-house Hebrew program during the week to complement Religious School on Sunday. This will replace the Community Hebrew School at the JCC. While the Community Hebrew School had a great many benefits, in recent years it suffered from declining attendance (fewer than half of current Vassar Temple children who are eligible attend) and, therefore, decreasing effectiveness for Vassar Temple.

Details will be announced as they're finalized, but the core idea is to ramp up the level of Hebrew education at Vassar Temple while also making it more efficient and engaging. And this new program will help us integrate religious and Hebrew education, as well as better incorporate bar/bat mitzvah preparation.

We also started a new Sunday-morning program this semester: the Sababa Center. It gets its name from a slang Hebrew word for "great" (pronounced sa-BA-ba), and it reflects the center's goal of offering great Jewish learning in an alternative format. The center augments our current classroom-based model by providing small-group and individualized experiences to the entire student body. So far it's been a huge hit.

We're experimenting with different worship-service formats on Sunday morning. In addition to giving the students a little more variety, we hope that Sundays can serve as a laboratory for new Fridaynight and Saturday-morning possibilities. So if you're in the area on a Sunday morning at 11:30, stop by. Then let us know what you think.

Our other main new initiative, a joint high school program with Temple Beth-

El, is off to a rocky start. In spite of near universal agreement that the program is in principle a great idea, in practice it has been hindered by a series of missteps and false starts. We'll keep trying to achieve the goals of the program while also being attentive to the wishes of the current students.

If I had to pick one area that most needs attention, it would be attendance on Sunday mornings. My perception, shared by the teachers, is that most students enjoy their time on Sunday and leave with a feeling that their time was well spent. And the new Sababa Center promises to help the few students who don't yet feel this way. (But we can't do anything about the natural and widespread tendency for kids who are asked about what they did to answer "nothing" and when asked how it was to respond with a curt if discouraging "fine.")

Nonetheless, we seem to have two populations: one group attends most of the time, but the other attends only sporadically. Surely there are some good reasons for poor attendance (and some families have spoken directly with me), but I wonder if there's anything else we should be doing.

So that's how I see things. As always, I'll look forward to hearing your observations and suggestions.

URJ Hurricane Sandy Relief

Thank you to all who donated to the URJ Hurricane Sandy Relief Fund, which has now reached about \$782,800. The URJ is directly advising individual congregations that were impacted by the hurricane, and is financially supporting relief organizations that have been on the scene in Queens, Brooklyn, Long Island, Westchester, and at Monmouth and Ocean Counties in New Jersey.

In order to provide the long-term support that is needed, the funds collected by the URJ are being dispersed in phases. Initially support was given to groups organizing volunteers, providing meals, obtaining and distributing supplies, and addressing housing issues. Free legal assistance and help with making insurance claims were made available to hurricane victims.

Tools were obtained, work teams were organized, and cleanup and rebuilding in many effected communities are still being addressed. Housing needs of families and individuals still displaced continue to be dealt with. A community center that hosts after school and teen activities in Queens is being rebuilt. \$142,000 was given thus far to several Reform temples that suffered serious structural and interior damage. A special fund has even been set aside to help teens from effected families attend NFTY camps this summer.

As you can see, there is much rebuilding and rehabilitation yet to be done. Interfaith Music Festival on June 9th



80 Gathered at Vassar Temple's 2nd Annual 1st Night Seder

A shortened presentation captured the essentials of the Seder story; it was presented in a thoughtful, interactive and, occasionally, silly way. Everyone received a personalized boarding passthat identified the "slave" as a 1st class passenger on "Canaan Airlines". The evening opened with a recorded message from the pilot who introduced the Pesach story in a humorous manner.

Children of all ages were engaged in the typical ways: for the asking and answering of the four questions and for the finding of the afikomen. But, perhaps for the first time in Dutchess County, there was an additional event incorporated into the evening: a pyramid building contest. The young architects and engineers were evenly matched in two teams, then given 20 boxes of matzo each. With only 5 minutes to plan and construct their pyramids these young people did a tremendous job. Our judges, Michelle Brenner and Eleanor Pupko, had a tough time determining which the winning team was; it ended in a tie. All participants were rewarded with a \$5 B & N gift card!

There was a lot of singing before and after the meal with active conversation over dinner, occasionally focused on the contents of the Hagaddah. Once again this year, we used the Hagaddah that the

Seder Committee developed last year.

Sandra Mamis relayed a conversation she had with Leslie Maserjian, z"l, at the conclusion of last year's event. Leslie, who had come with the extended family, asked to be the first contacted this year so that she could help on the committee. The experience had been so rewarding, she said, that she wanted to make sure she could be a part of the planning in 2013. As we know, a short time after, we lost Leslie so unexpectedly. This year's Seder was dedicated to her memory.
