Rabbi's Message: Gesher: A Bridge to Becoming a Jewish Adult



"If you wish for your children to study Torah, study it in their presence. They will follow your example. Otherwise, they will not study Torah; they will only instruct their children to do so." (Rabbi Men-

achem Mendel of Kotzk)

This is my favorite quote about Jewish learning. While I often use it to nudge parents to engage in family learning programs, it also speaks to a great challenge of Jewish education: the Inoculation Model.

We may believe that by sending our children to Religious School until b'nai mitzvah, we are vaccinating them against forgetting their Jewish heritage. "You're officially a Jewish adult," we say, "My job is done." The Kotzker Rebbe suggests that this model doesn't create Jewish adults, but rather another generation that feels obligated to send their children to Religious School through b'nai mitzvah. The Inoculation Model doesn't create "healthy" Jewish adults; it only barely keeps us alive as a people.

What we need is a Well-

ness Model: regular Jewish engagement throughout the life-cycle, so that it becomes an integral, beloved part of who we are. Much of this we can do at home: celebrating Shabbat and holidays, talking about Jewish faith and values, and committing ourselves to social justice.

Another part of the Wellness Model is engaging in Jewish learning AFTER b'nai mitzvah. This is when many students—and their parents—make their exit from Jewish education. However, after b'nai mitzvah is when Jewish learning gets particularly interesting! Freed from the burden of preparing for b'nai mitzvah—which sometimes feels like "teaching to the test"—we can explore what it means to live Jewishly. What can our tradition teach us about the issues we face in modern life? And how can we add our voices to the millennia-long conversation that is the Jewish tradition?

As you know, we are in the midst of re-imagining our Religious School. One of the most exciting changes is that our 8th-12th graders will be joining Gesher, a community-wide Jewish high school, that includes students from Temple Beth El, Shir Chadash, and now, Vassar Temple!

By combining forces, our high schoolers will have more choices as to how they

wish to continue their exploration of Judaism. When I visited Gesher, some students discussed a film about Jews in India, while others engaged in a heated debate over medical marijuana. Students explored their creativity through visual art and storytelling. Classes change on a trimester schedule to keep things interesting.

The word "Gesher" means "bridge," and through Gesher, we also provide our teens with the opportunity to make connections to a larger group of Jewish teens. We also give them access to the diverse group of clergy and laypeople in this community. Rabbis Hyman, Victor, Polish, and I are designing an 18-month service-learning class that we teach together, culminating in a week-long community-service trip. That is something that no synagogue in our community could do on its own!

In order to make the transition into Gesher, our current 7th through 11th graders (remember, our teen program starts in 8th grade!) will come to Temple Beth El on Wednesday, May 18th, at 6:30 p.m., to meet our new classmates and choose our classes for the fall. Dinner will be served. DON'T MISS IT!

President's Message: Good Is Not Enough



Vassar Temple is a good temple! We have a wonderful rabbi, a dedicated board of trustees, a well-run office, good relations with the com-

munity, active committees producing attractive programming and ritual experiences and broad Jewish education options for children and adults. We've increased our reach into the community through social media, *Torah to Go*, social action activities and many other ways. Our physical environment is in the best shape it's been in decades. There is a lot to be proud about Vassar Temple. And yet, it's not enough.

It's not enough to be a good temple these days. There are trends and forces which have as much impact on our Temple's success as any of the things we're doing to be a good temple. This is to say, our sustainability depends as much as anything on being in the right place at the right time.

Membership is the key. Although I believe we need to broaden our concept to a more expanded term, *affiliations*, we need to recognize while membership is the greatest level of commitment, there are other

relationship levels essential to building a strong temple community. Many affiliations will grow into memberships; but affiliates, at all levels, provide mutual value.

As a child growing up in the 60s and early 70s, I remember Vassar Temple's membership was booming! So much so, we needed to hold both early and late sessions for religious school as well as for High Holy Day services. Those were the days when Poughkeepsie was home to iconic American businesses like the Smith Brothers of cough drop fame and a booming IBM. It is also about the time Poughkeepsie began to slide. An article in the NY Times in 1998 entitled, "Poughkeepsie, in a Long Tailspin, Now Copes with Clouded Image" describes fairly well the mess Poughkeepsie found itself in.

When I accepted the position as Vice President, which put me on the track to be president after two years, I knew what I was getting myself into. I have always maintained no matter how good we were as a temple, ultimately, the biggest factor that would determine our success with member-

ship was going to be the demographics and trends in the Poughkeepsie area. Poughkeepsie needed to have a great resurgence in order for our Temple to do the same. All I could hope for during my term was to get Vassar Temple ready for that day and pray it would come soon!

I believe that day is coming! To quote the new Mayor of Poughkeepsie, Rob Rolison, "I believe in Poughkeepsie and I think the Buzz Is Back!" I lack the space in this article to offer all the supporting reasons and the only test that matters is what we all can read about in the news. But if Mayor Rolison is right, and I do believe he is, better days are ahead for the Poughkeepsie area and Vassar Temple. So I say, from Mayor Rolison's mouth to God's ears...as well as to the ears of everyone in government, our schools and business that need to make it happen! A rising tide does lift all boats and heaven knows there are a lot of other non-profit organizations, small business owners, and households that could all use the lift!

From the Religious School Director: The Things I've Seen



With all of the advance planning, hard work, and theoretical underpinnings that religious school demands, it's easy to lose sight of the individual, day-to-day results. Here, then, in no particular order, are some of the things I saw at school this week.

On Wednesday, with the help of a generous grant we obtained from the Ann and Abe Effron Fund, we began a unique four-week course on grappling with Israel. Facilitated by a pioneer of modern Israel education who herself has spent time in Israel working in coexistence programs, the sessions help students explore their relationship to Israel in a way that ensures a lasting and meaningful engagement with the Holy Land.

The first question set the stage: "Do you think Jews have an automatic connection to Israel?" The conversation that ensued was insightful, intelligent, and authentic. No wonder some parents wished they could attend the class, too.

Earlier that Wednesday, in what has become a familiar element of Hebrew school, a student asked me for dark chocolate in Hebrew. In my office I have a stash of Israeli chocolate (shokolad), both milk chocolate (shokolad chalav) and dark chocolate (shokolad marir). Older students who petition correctly in Hebrew have a pretty good chance of getting a small and delicious Israeli snack in return.

We started the practice last year, when the students learned the words for "I'd like,"

"chocolate," "milk," etc.

On the one hand, this is just a gimmick for reinforcing some Hebrew vocabulary. On the other hand, though, some of that vocabulary goes back 3,000 years to the very foundation of our people. The "chalav" of "milk chocolate" is the same word we find in Exodus, where Israel is described as a "land flowing with milk [chalav] and honey." We are continuing a conversation begun 3,000 years ago.

It was also 3,000 years ago that the Hebrew alphabet was established to help ensure the continuity of Judaism. "Write these things down," commands Deuteronomy, and "teach them to your children." For 100 generations we have honored this obligation, teaching both the content and the letters. This tiny Hebrew exchange was emblematic of our commitment to bring one more generation into the chain of tradition.

And speaking of the chain of tradition, one holiday more than any other demands that attention be given to the next generation. And that is Passover, with its slogan "tell your children."

This morning I saw many of our religious school teachers teaching about Passover. The youngest students learned the plagues, in order, if they were able, and created a matching art project. Older students got more advanced material. Watching it play out, I saw more than just 7 and 10-year-olds learning the ancient texts. I saw teenagers teaching them. Just a few years ago, these teens publicly accepted the obligations

of bar and bat mitzvah.

Today they are putting their promise into action. In such a context, it was hardly a surprise when a 2nd grader raised her hand enthusiastically in pride, eager to share what she had just learned about Passover.

Our tradition speaks of *hiddur mitzvah*, the merit of adorning the commandments when we perform them. We are required to teach about Passover. But once we're at it --- and this is *hiddur mitzvah* --- wouldn't it be great if we did it with the kind of flair that prompted children to jump out of their seats with joy. And we did.

A more general form of *hiddur mitzvah* is music, and I saw and heard that this morning, too. We sang a variety of songs, led by a college student who herself learned to teach music at Vassar Temple. We sang "mitzvah gorereit mitzvah" (one mitzvah leads to another) giving voice to words that are nearly 2,000 years old. We sang a passage from Y'did Nefesh, the first truly egalitarian text to make its way into our canon. We sang about the plagues and the gift of Shabbat that God has bequeathed us.

Music and visual art. Modern Hebrew conversation and ancient Hebrew vocabulary. Conceptual Israel and political Israel. The language of our people and our people's history. The texts of yesterday and the promise of tomorrow.

It's all here. And I get to see it.
