Rabbi's Message: How Jewish Camp Changed My Life



It's hard for me to remember life BC: Before Camp. I was twelve years old and painfully shy. I cried every

night for a year leading up to my first summer at URJ Camp Harlam. Don't get me wrong; I really wanted to try overnight camp. But I was scared that I wouldn't fit in.

My fears were unfounded. Before we had even unloaded the car, I had a new best friend. When my parents picked me up at the end of each summer, I chattered for the entire two-hour car ride home about how awesome camp was and then collapsed into bed and woke up with no voice at all!

Twenty-one years have passed since that first fateful summer, and I'm still chattering about how awesome camp is. It is still very much a part of my life and who I am today.

A Jewish summer camp experience has a different impact on each child—which is why the URJ provides a variety of summer experiences—but there are a few things that are sure to happen when you send your child to Jewish summer camp:

Lifelong friendships: I made friends in an instant, but I also built friendships that

lasted a lifetime. We wrote letters, attended b'nai mitzvah and sweet sixteens, visited each other at college, and even traveled abroad together. I've stood under the *chuppah* with them; their children call me "auntie." We ended up in the same college or rabbinical school, and, every time I join a new congregation, there's always somebody who knows somebody I went to camp with!

Important life skills: I may have cried before leaving for camp, but college was a breeze. I already knew about being on my own and sharing with a roommate (though 13 are easier than one!). We weren't allowed to call home when I was a camper, so whatever challenges I faced, I had to work them out myself. I learned how to be self-reliant, how to be part of a team, and how to be a leader.

Role models: My counselors introduced me to my favorite bands, new trends in clothing, and even the college I would one day attend. Just as cool as the college kids who took care of me were the rabbis, cantors, and educators who came to camp as faculty. Jewish professionals were no longer unapproachable adults, but mentors who valued us and our opinions.

Making Judaism our own: Not everyone who goes to Jewish camp becomes a rabbi. But everyone at camp learns that Judaism isn't something we do in the synagogue on weekends at our parents' insistence. Judaism was a part of our everyday lives. We could build upon it with our own energy and creativity. We led our own services, not only learning the prayers but also inventing our own interpretations. And we brought our Jewish learning into other things we were doing: sports, art, music and dance.

Fun! A friend and I were trying to remember specifically what was so much fun about camp, but nothing made sense out of context. There were lip-syncs and shoe-golf, long hikes through the mud and scaling the climbing tower blindfolded. Doing any one of those things is not guaranteed to be amazing or transformative. But going to camp is. You just have to experience it for yourself!

Join us on Friday, November 20th at 7:30 pm for our first annual "Camp Shabbat!" Our services will be a taste of camp *tefillah*, and a representative from our three regional URJ Camps (Eisner, Crane Lake, and 6-Points Sci-Tech) will be here to tell us about all of the incredible summer experiences the Reform movement has to offer! 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Religious School Director: From Holy to Ordinary and Back Again



I write this during the holiday of Sukkot, in the Jewish month of Tishrei.

Sukkot, according to the Rabbis, isn't just any holiday.

It is The Holiday --- the holiday par excellence, we might now say. It comes just a few days after Yom Kippur, the Sabbath par excellence, and two weeks after Rosh Hashanah, the new year, which, along with Yom Kippur, earns the name "high holidays." This is a special time of year, marked by our most celebratory, our most solemn, and our most holiday-like days. What a month. That's Tishrei.

By the time you read this, we will be in the Jewish month of Cheshvan, whose Jewish holidays number exactly zero. Except for Shabbat, every day of Cheshvan is just like any other --- an ordinary, common, run-of-the-mill, nothing-to-write-about period of darkness followed by daylight.

It's easy to celebrate the centrality of Judaism when our calendar is full of high ceremony and public gatherings. It's much harder when the encroaching darkness of winter underscores the lack of anything clear to celebrate. But Judaism has always celebrated ordinary time as much as holy time.

We mark the beginning of Shabbat --- our holiest of times --- with candles and celebration. Yet we also mark the end of Shabbat --- in a ceremony called Havdalah --- with a candle and celebration. Similarly, tradition dictates a short blessing before each meal, as well as a longer set of blessings for when the meal is over.

There is a time for everything, we might say, quoting the wisdom of Ecclesiastes --- perhaps not by coincidence the book we read on Sukkot. If Tishrei is the time for celebrating the glory of Judaism, Cheshvan is when we do the hard work of living up to its ideals.

In Tishrei, we declare the grandeur of a new year. In Cheshvan, we grapple with the daily reality of that year. In Tishrei, we stop to examine the nature of our lives. In Cheshvan, we set about actually trying to do better. In Tishrei we joyously accept Torah. In Cheshvan, we strive to live by its teachings. In Tishrei we take time out from the world. In Cheshvan we go back to repairing the world. For that matter, in Tishrei we rejoice in the millennial continuity of our tradition. In Cheshvan we focus on teaching it to one more generation --- in my case, with the daily and weekly labor of love that we call religious school.

I like Tishrei more than Cheshvan, just as I like the copious daylight of summer more than the gloomy darkness of winter. (And let's remember that rare is the child who's afraid of the light.) I also like Shabbat more than the workweek, or, to put it in general and secular terms, the weekend is the highlight of the week. But without the week, there would, of course, be no week to end. Without the hard work of the everyday days, we would have nothing to celebrate on our holy holidays.

So it's back to work, day-in, day-out. But just as each workweek is both a memory of one Shabbat and a precursor to the next, the daily travail of living our lives is imbued with subtle holiness, in the form of memory, in the form of purpose, and in the form of hope. And if we're lucky, each mundane building block we lay starting in Cheshvan forms a stronger foundation to support what we value most.

An Inner Birthright Trip: Mining our Rich Spiritual Resources for Deeper Meaning

Many of us grow up with a strong Jewish identity, a sense that being Jewish stands for something important and gives meaning to our life. Some of us belong to synagogues and enjoy being part of a community and going to services. Fewer of us, though, feel we have a Jewish spiritual practice that helps us remain grateful, open-hearted, compassionate, hopeful and resilient in the face of difficulties. Few of us feel we have been given the tools to unlock our inner spirit through Judaism. We need to travel inward to find our core with a Judaism that is rich with teachings, insights and practices that can help us find deeper importance and significance in our lives.

Rabbi Rachel Cowan, formerly the Executive Director of the Institute for Jewish Spirituality and consultant to the Institute's Wise Aging program, will share her own spiritual journey and offer opportunities for us to think about our journeys.

Rabbi Cowan was named by Newsweek Magazine in 2007 and 2010 as one of the 50 leading rabbis in the United States, by the Forward in 2010 as one of the 50 leading women rabbis, and featured in the PBS series *The Jewish Americans*. She received her ordination from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1989. From 1990-2003 she was Program Director for Life and Values at the Nathan Cummings Foundation. Her work has been included in Moment and Sh'ma as well as in several anthologies and *The Torah: A Women's Commentary*. She is the author, with her late husband Paul Cowan, of *Mixed Blessings: Untangling the Knots in an Interfaith Marriage*. This winter, our Temple was ravaged by the consequences of snow and ice accumulation that ultimately did significant damage to our building. Thanks to resources in the Capital Fund (and a few hard workers!), we were able to address the situation, and we now have downstairs classrooms that are renovated and better than ever. In addition, the upstairs classrooms have gotten a facelift with new carpet and paint, the balcony has been renovated, the Rabbi's office has new paint and clean carpet, the boiler has been replaced, and we aspire to renovate the Temple administrative office. We have been taking good care of our home, largely because of funds provided by members of the Temple to support projects of this nature.

But even with all of this work completed, more must be done to keep our beautiful 60+ year old building in the best possible condition. Challenges persist with water seepage during heavy precipitation and that situation needs to be explored and rectified. The carpet in the sanctuary is badly stained in places and needs replacement. The Social Hall requires updating, and the HVAC system needs attention as well.

The Capital Fund is a perfect way for members of the congregation to support the upkeep of our spiritual home. Because of the many urgent projects undertaken this past year, the fund is nearly depleted, and in order to proceed with other muchneeded work, it must be replenished.
