Shabbat Noach Dinner and Visiting Animals: Friday, Nov. 4th

Shabbat Noach, the sabbath when we read about Noah's ark in the Torah, will be observed Friday evening Nov. 4th. Jewish ethics teach that we have a moral responsibility to provide for the welfare of animals, and Shabbat Noach provides the perfect opportunity to highlight the important role animals play in our own lives.

During this family friendly shabbat service that starts at 7:30pm, special guest speaker Neil Abramson will speak about *'The Lamed Vav, Animals and a Just Life.'* Mr. Abramson is an attorney and author who does pro bono work for animal rights. Special guests at the oneg shabbat following the service will be representatives of the Dutchess County SPCA and some furry DCSPCA alum who have been adopted into forever homes.

Prior to the service, at 6:15pm, the Sisterhood is sponsoring a shabbat dinner featuring a variety of vegetarian pasta dishes accompanied by a special salad, challah, and beverages.

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Dr. Miriam Cohen to Speak at Shabbaton: Nov. 12th

Vassar Temple will hold a special shabbat Saturday, Nov. 12th. Torah study with Rabbi Berkowitz will begin at 9:00am, followed by a torah service at 10:00am.

Miriam Cohen, PhD, the Evalyn Clark Professor of History at Vassar College, author, and outstanding speaker, will give a talk on the history of immigration law during the Shabbat service. Following the service, the Ritual Committee will provide a light kiddush lunch for everyone's enjoyment.

Dr. Cohen's professional specialties include twentieth-century social history, the history of American women,



and the history of social welfare. Her first book, *Workshop to Office: Two Generations of Italian Women in New York City*, was published

by Cornell University Press in 1993. Her latest book, *Julia Lathrop: Social Service and Progressive Government*, forthcoming in spring 2017, is about the first woman to head a federal agency (Lathrop was appointed Chief of the newly created U.S. Children's Bureau in 1912).

Rabbi's Message: You Are What You Eat

"When I started to consider kashrut, I asked everyone I knew who kept kosher why they did so. Most answered, 'Because it's tradition.' This didn't work for me. The tradition I grew up with placed no value on dietary restrictions; boneless spare ribs were a favorite Shabbat meal. A batch of cookies changed my mind. I realized that my observant friends couldn't eat the hamantaschen I'd prepared in my non-kosher kitchen. I began to move toward keeping kosher so that all Jews could eat in my home. This dream may never become a reality. There are ways I cannot bend and ways other people cannot bend, there are always new restrictions to consider. But whether it's cooking vegetarian, shopping locally, or working around food allergies, my goal is still the same: a table that welcomes all people, a kitchen where I can express my love for friends and family with a home-cooked meal."

It's been over five years since I wrote this "kashrut manifesto." Kashrut wasn't a part of my upbringing, but by the time I'd finished college, I had decided that it was important for me to consider Jewish values when I ate. Some rules I adopted were a personal spiritual discipline: I wanted to think about what I put into my body, where it came from, and how it was prepared. I



also wanted everyone to be able to eat in my house.

Fast forward to 2016. In my immediate family alone, I now have a vegetarian, two vegans (one of which is macrobiotic), a pre-diabetic, four people with high cholesterol and one with high blood pressure—not to mention that most of us are also lactose intolerant. This is to say nothing of the revolving door of nut- and gluten- allergic friends at my table, or countless items I've added to, or eliminated from, my own diet to improve my health and well-being.

Since I wrote this, I've learned that there is very little that I could do to make an Orthodox Jew comfortable eating in my home. I once went several rounds with a Conservative friend over whether I really purchased only kosher meat, while in one apartment my adherence

to kashrut was canceled out by my Shabbat-violating electronic door buzzer. Rather than give up altogether, I've expanded my goal of welcoming others to my table to include all people, not just all Jews.

The passing years have only added to the factors I consider when making decisions about food. I face not only questions of what my dinner companions and I can both digest and enjoy, but also whether the food was produced under ethical circumstances, both for the living things we consume and the human beings who prepare them. What is the environmental impact of how this food is prepared, packaged, and shipped? How do I stay true to my own principles while eating as a guest at someone else's home? And how does eating, or not eating a certain food enhance my life as a Jew?

With all of these questions still swirling around in my mind, it is an excellent time to revisit ***The Sacred Table: Creating a Jewish Food Ethic***. This anthology—which you can find in our synagogue and public libraries—addresses many different factors that Reform Jews take into consideration when we eat. We will have the opportunity to speak with the book's editor, my colleague Rabbi Mary Zamore, on November 16th at 7:00pm at the Adriance Library. Please join us at our table!

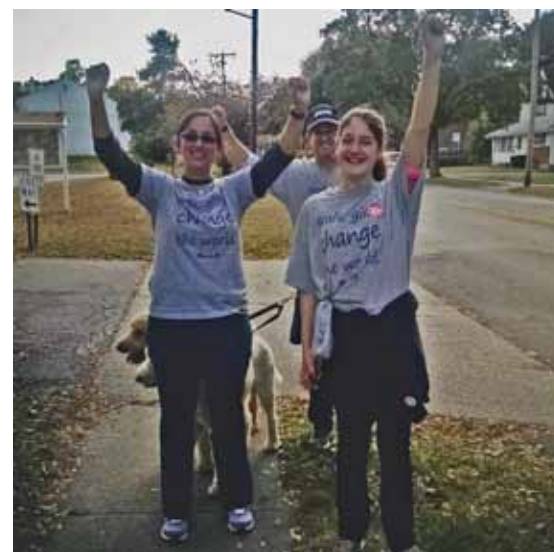

From the Religious School Director

In less than a week, I will be celebrating Rosh HaShana followed a week later by Yom Kippur; you will

be reading this as our High Holiday season has been completed. The high holiday season or Days of Awe never fail to leave me with something to think about or internalize. Sometimes it's an awareness of blessings and joy I find from sharing the holidays with family that I only get a chance to see once in a while. Sometimes it is finding a new perspective from the sermon. Sometimes it's a prayer that I suddenly find especially meaningful. No matter what, the holidays always change me in some way.

This year at the Seth A. Erlebacher Religious School and the Vassar Temple Hebrew School, we are also growing and changing. Currently we are experiencing a transition into a school with a new vision. One of the first steps toward this

transition has been to introduce a new Hebrew Curriculum, Mitkadem, that allows students to work independently while still in a classroom setting. The teacher is able to spend one-on-one time with each student throughout the class as well as track students as they work their way through the lessons. One of the most attractive things about the curriculum is that students do not have to wait for others to move forward and those who need extra help or who have missed some sessions can jump in wherever they left off. In the few sessions we have had, I am impressed with the way the students have embraced the curriculum.

Our Religious School curriculum is also beginning to take shape. I am working with the teachers to determine what will work best for each class level. We are so blessed with such caring and dedicated teachers who have taken the challenge of educating our students very seriously.

One of my missions this year is to create a community of learners, teachers, parents and others in the congregation. On

Sukkot we worked towards this mission by participating in the Social Action and Ritual Committee's *Socks for Sukkot* collection. In addition, families also brought vegetables, symbolically representing Sukkot of ancient times when families would make a pilgrimage to the temple in Jerusalem to bring a donation of some of their harvest. Our families, with the help of some amazing volunteers, turned their harvest donations into a yummy soup for our congregation to enjoy together later that day at the dinner held prior to our festive Simchat Torah service.

In my mind, building community through this kind of programming that integrates teachable moments with ritual celebrations that include all generations is paramount to our children's education. We are told *V'shinantam L'vanecha* in our daily recitation of the *V'Ahavta* pray. The translation of this is "**You shall teach your children.**" This imperative is not directed solely at parents but at all of us!

FUND FACTS: The Grandmother's Fund

Remembering Nana and PopPop

The last Shabbat in September, Steve and I went to Temple to recite Kaddish for three members of our family, who, coincidentally, all passed away the last week of September (fortunately not all in the same year, but still in the same week): my Grandmother, Selma Lipson, and Sam and Ali's grandparents, Steve's Mom, Frances Gray Conrad Dahnert and my Father, Bob Sachs.
