Vassar Temple Members Come Through Again!

When Hurricane Harvey hit Texas, the URJ informed its member congregations that several Jewish communities had suffered greatly and were in need of support. It was suggested that monies raised could be converted to gift cards for stores in the Houston area where victims could purchase items necessary to start rebuilding their lives, piece by piece.

Of course, gift card sales have long profited Vassar Temple, so this was a perfect opportunity to help our brothers and sisters in Texas while also benefiting our temple. We reached out to you, our members, for donations. You were generous; we received \$1,525.00 with which cards to Walmart, Target, Home Depot and Lowe's were purchased. Thank you!

After speaking with the affected congregations, it was clear that the best way to get these cards to those most desperately in need was through the Houston Jewish Federation which had taken on the responsibility of organizing the distribution of relief aid. Their administrator asked that a message of gratitude be conveyed to those families who have been so kind to help. She went on to say, that in the midst of all the stress and angst, "... hearing from people around the U.S. and around the world has been so comforting and reassuring..."

Performing deeds of loving kindness.... it's what we, at Vassar Temple, continue to do!

From the Rabbi's Desk: Toledot Means "Generations"

November begins another season of families coming together, whether it is for Thanksgiving, Channukah, winter vacations, or the secular New Year. The winter holidays, with all of their family gatherings, can be times of great joy and high drama. It is fitting that, in the Torah portions we read this month, we find the seeds of parental favoritism and sibling rivalry.

In the middle chapters of Genesis, we read about various sets of siblings who, with their parents' encouragement, became bitter rivals: Isaac and Ishmael, Jacob and Esau, Leah and Rachel. The climax of these early stories is the rivalry between Jacob and Esau, who lie, cheat, and manipulate one another, and their parents, in order to secure what they believe is rightfully theirs: the birthright and the blessing.

It is interesting that Jacob and Esau were so contentious with one another, when they were literally as close as brothers could be, sharing the womb as twins! Some say that their troubles started in utero, causing Rebecca a lot of discomfort; others say that it took a while for the rivalry to come to a head. In Genesis Rabbah, the rabbis say that Jacob and Esau were, "like a myrtle and a wild rose-bush growing side-by-side; as they grew to maturity, one yielded its fragrance and the other its thorns." Jacob, they say, turned to Torah study, and Esau to idol worship (Gen. Rabbah 63:10).

The rabbis read these stories in a very black and white way: Esau must be evil in order to justify Jacob usurping Esau's birthright and blessing (though Jacob's name, Yaakov or "heel," also means, "to supplant," so in some ways his name was his destiny). Nowadays, we know that individual personalities and family relationships are much more complex than that. Like the myrtle and the rose, Jacob and Esau each had their own strengths and weaknesses, and might have become a powerful team, had their rivalry, in part due to their parents' favoritism, not torn them apart.

The *parasha* in which Jacob and Esau's story appears is called *Toledot*, "Generations," because it lists the generations that spring from Abraham and Sarah. There must be something oppositional in their genes, because each generation features family members fighting and trying to overpower one another. However, in time, each generation of siblings also learns to work together with the other, and forgive one another, for the sake of their families, and because they have the vision of future generations in mind.

With our own generations of Vassar Temple in mind, we are going to try something new this month. On Saturday, November 18th, at 9:00am, our Religious School will come to learn with our Torah Study group. This is a great opportunity for all of our generations to come together to wrestle with these rivalry stories together, particularly the story of Jacob and Esau, who are featured in that week's Torah portion.

Even if you are not a regular participant in Torah Study, or involved in our Religious School, we hope that you will join us for an interactive, intergenerational study of our Torah portion, followed by a Shabbat morning service led with help from our Religious School students and teachers.

Wishing you all a happy—and peaceful—Thanksgiving!



From the Religious School Director

This month we celebrate the holiday of Thanksgiving. I have always loved Thanksgiving. I love the Fall when the air turns crisp and cool. I love having a reason to gather my loved ones together to share in the celebration. And I love to cook and bake and make yummy foods. But most of all, I love the fact that everyone I know - whether Christian or Jew, Muslim, or Hindu- is celebrating this holiday. It crosses religious lines and blurs our differences while we celebrate the things we are blessed with.

But I want to make sure you realize that Thanksgiving, an interfaith holiday, can be looked at through Jewish lenses. The Hebrew prayer, Modim Anachnu Lach, is a prayer of Thanksgiving that is said daily; in fact, many say this three times a day. We are reminded three times daily that we must count our blessings. MODIM ANACHNU LACH.

The text of this prayer makes us aware

that we have much to be grateful for and that we must thank God for these blessings. In our world we take much for granted. We expect to have running water when we turn on our faucet or electricity when we turn on a light. Food is found in the aisles of the grocery and even those who are struggling to make ends meet have resources at their disposal to help them find food and shelter. And yes, I recognize that there are many in our community that are finding life difficult; but for most of us, we see our blessings as privileges.

How many of our children take a moment to think of their blessings before putting food in their mouths? Judaism is ripe with opportunities for us and our families to create awareness of our blessings. The Vassar Temple Hebrew students can tell you that one of the first units of the Mitkadem Hebrew program is dedicated to blessings over food and holiday celebrations. But learning the blessings can only go so far. If they do not see the connection between the blessings and how to make them relevant to their own lives, then we are not taking the next step in our children's Jewish Education. As a teen, I attended Jewish summer camp and many Youth Group events. One of the most memorable things about those experiences was the singing of Birkat HaMazon after each meal. This series of blessings that is sung far and wide by campers, youth group members and many Jewish families in their own homes makes us pause for a moment to remember that we have been blessed with so much.

This year at your Thanksgiving holiday table, I urge you to find a way to incorporate some Hebrew or Jewish blessings into your feast. Help our children connect giving thanks and counting our blessings with being Jewish. If you need some help in finding the right blessing or want help with the Hebrew words, please let me know. I am very happy to help you make this a year filled with blessings of thanks!
