Spring Rummage Sale Success

When I took over the Rummage sales from Joan Reifler, I thought it would be fun, as well as good, for Vassar Temple. Well, now it is years later and I am running the sales with co-chairs, Ann Lerman, and Lisa-Sue Quackenbush.

What would we do without Emily Himelstein, Joan Reifler, Nadine Zaritsky, Susan Needelman, Linda Babas, Ann Harmuth, and now Jasmaine Russo? Much thanks, also, to our intrepid Rummage Crew which includes: Judy Rosenfeld, Michelle Sinn, Joyce Gally, Howard Himelstein, Sue Barbash, Perla Kaufman, Wendy Giangrasso, Lisa Rubenstein, Nancy Sampson, and others who help when they can. The office support from Sherrie and set-up/take-down services provided by Alvin also give us essential help in hosting these sales. Our crew and support people spend approximately two weeks for each sale preparing, selling and then clearing the social hall. It is a feat of wonder that we take the social hall from clear before sale day to full of Rummage and back again in less than two weeks!

Sales generate over \$3,000 per year for Sisterhood which translates into events and programs, while providing funds for Temple projects. One project has been the upgrade of the kitchen which continues this summer with new cabinets.

We have many customers who are in need and we provide a necessary source for clothes and household items that would not otherwise be affordable to them. Our donations come from mostly Temple members, but now are also coming from Temple friends. Many people are downsizing these days and see the Rummage sales as a convenient way to donate items and clear their homes. We always look for new members for the Rummage Crew. If you'd like to join us, just let us know.

Rabbi's Message: Service



The building that is Vassar Temple was built with rather permanent walls. Actually, this is an ongoing problem. The walls are so permanent that it is very

difficult to run new wiring or pipes through them. Buildings that house synagogues should be sturdy, true enough; but one would like them to be more flexible.

The Temple is constructed with rigid materials, but the congregation is built from something more dynamic and fluid. The two intertwine. At especially busy times, such as Sunday mornings, Friday evenings, and the numerous days and nights when programs are taking place, the walls literally hum with sounds, both voices and music. On quieter occasions, the numerous photos and plaques adorning the building's walls visually reflect names and faces of individuals who have become part of the very fabric of the synagogue. Inanimate walls transform into a living entity, a thriving congregation with a long history, a lively present and a hopeful future

For the last few years I have made a point of devoting my summer Bulletin column to acknowledging and expressing personal thanks to individuals who breathe life into the walls of the synagogue. Vassar Temple is uncommonly rich in the level of volunteer service provided by members.

I would like, however, to begin with the

small paid staff: Maria Munzo, the kitchen manager whenever we have an Oneg Shabbat, Kiddush, or dinner; Alvin Rosen, the Temple's custodian; Sherrie Geisler, office manager, and; Joel Hoffman, Religious School Director. These vital members of our Temple community do not merely show up and execute their tasks, they exhibit care and concern for the congregation that includes actions and activities that go beyond the remuneration they receive. Maria, Alvin and Sherrie began their duties this year, and all have had to deal with the steep learning curve that must be navigated when dealing with new systems and circumstances. They have not only taken to their responsibilities but also have done so with good humor, calm demeanors and overall warmth to congregants with whom they have come in contact.

Joel Hoffman is a nationally-renown speaker, author and consultant. Indeed, he is capable of receiving generous compensation for appearances before congregations (Jewish and Christian) and organizations around the country. He has, however, freely given of his scholarship and erudition to Vassar Temple as a part of the congregation itself.

Every summer, Debbie and I make a point of attending the plays, workshops and readings presented by Vassar College's Powerhouse Theater. This annual festival is principally designed to give playwrights an opportunity to develop works for production

on New York City stages or elsewhere. One of the overall producers will usually address the audience before a presentation. In addition to the usual caution about turning off your cell phones, she will tell us how important our presence is to the creative process. And we thought we were there just to experience a play!

Organist Joe Bertolozzi and Soloist Elisa Dugatkin have enhanced and inspired worship at Vassar Temple for over a decade. They bring talent and expertise, to be sure, but more than that, they bring their very souls toward making services moving and meaningful. They are "on stage," so to speak.

I would personally like to acknowledge and thank the "Jews in the pews," the Shabbat evening regulars who are as important to the quality of Vassar Temple worship as the audience is to Powerhouse Theater productions. President's Message: Choice

One of the privileges of having a regular column in the VT Bulletin is that it offers a special means for the president to share his/her opinions. In this issue I'd like express my personal thoughts relating to interfaith marriage, but in the broader sense, choice.

Love may not be choice, but entering into an interfaith marriage is. Do any of us want the choice to marry a non-Jew to mean that Vassar Temple is not a place for them? Of course not! But by not welcoming interfaith couples, who have chosen to create a Jewish home together, to marry at Vassar Temple, are we pushing those individuals away from Vassar Temple? The Rabbi Search Committee has heard a clear message from the congregation on the need for welcoming interfaith couples at the time of marriage.

With all the attention given to lineage in the Jewish tradition, it should not be overlooked how much significance choice plays in becoming a Jew. by Jews and non-Jews. Several years ago, I was on the treadmill at the gym next to a Jewish acquaintance from Vassar Temple. This individual asked, "How are vou raising your children since they're not Jewish?" I said, "What do you mean they're not Jewish?" I was told, "Your wife, their mother, is not Jewish, so your children are not Jewish." Besides hurting my feelings, this person illustrated a misperception and a stigma faced by interfaith families.

Our children were raised Jewish and they are Jewish but that was a choice my wife and I made as parents. Now our children are adults, and as adults, they each have a personal choice to make: do they wish to practice as a Jew or not?

It's fair to say that the exodus from Egypt is the quintessential defining moment of Jewish choice, beginning with the choice of freedom over slavery, and ultimately, the choice to accept the Torah. This choice made thousands of years ago, defines Jews today. This may be the most significant choice in Jewish history, and it was made by a "mixed multitude," meaning Jews and many non-Jews.

Religion is an individual choice. Our hereditary background sets us on a course. But through our lives, we step on, and walk off, paths set before us. Consciously or subconsciously we are making choices. At times in our life we need to affirm and reaffirm who we are, choosing who we wish to be. When something is not right for us, it takes courage to make a big change. Or when we may have lost our way and

New Paths Service will be held Saturday, Sept. 13th at 10:00am in the East Chapel. The focus is on letting the service get through you, rather than on getting through the service. The atmosphere has been described by participants as spiritual, uplifting, and thought provoking. The moving liturgy of the New Paths prayer book includes both traditional and contemporary writings, and participants may bring supplemental materials to share. Each New Paths service, whether lay-led or rabbi-led, provides a unique and thoughtful shabbat morning experience. A brief informal kiddush follows. The community is invited to join us. The Saturday before Rosh Hashana, we meet for a s'lichot program in order to begin to spiritually prepare for the coming High Holy Days. At 7:30pm on Saturday, Sept. 20th, we will join together in the social hall for a dessert reception and the presentation of the Arnold Award to Joel Kelson. Following the lovely ritual of havdalah to usher out the sabbath, we will move upstairs for brief and moving commentaries from two of our congregants, one from the sciences and one from the humanities, on the topic, "This I Believe," to encourage us all to reflect on our own guiding values as the New Year begins. The s'lichot service (penitential prayers) will begin at approximately 10pm. The lateness of the hour adds to the mood of quiet and introspection that is central to this observance.

Rabbi Golomb provides us with this

teaching on s'lichot. Jewish tradition, which appreciates tasks well done, has a special genius for setting up opportunities for preparation. These occasions are usually given the Hebrew name, *tikkunim*. The term, *tikkun* is especially clever for it connotes two meanings. First, there is "preparation." The second meaning, however, is "reparation," "making whole." For the Jewish mystics, *tikkun* referred to a collective act of worship, study and the doing of good deeds that would repair the vessels of Creation and usher in the age of Redemption. *S'lichot* is one of the *tikkunim*.

The *s'lichot* service is devoted to a reaffirmation of our personal and collective resources that permit us to regret our errors and turn us toward the ideals we hold for ourselves and our community. Please join us in this powerful and moving act of preparation for the days that will follow.

From the Religious School Director



One of Judaism's earliest and most long-lasting contributions to the world was the radical suggestion 3,000 years ago that all people have inherent rights:

rich and poor, land-owners and servants, men and women, Jews and pagans. This simple message was encoded in theological language. While other nations made the populace serve royalty, we insisted that king and subject alike serve God.

Not surprisingly, it took some time for us to work out the details. We've recognized that slavery is incompatible with our mission, for instance. And to this day there are large swaths of the world that haven't read the memo, as it were, places where people's destinies are purposefully limited by the circumstances of their birth.

But we haven't given up on the ideal that every human being should be treated as no less than a creature of God. Indeed, we have worked tirelessly to realize it, which is why Jews helped lead the antislavery movements of last century, and why Rabbi Stephen Wise helped establish the NAACP. It's also why the State of Israel was founded with the principles of universal suffrage and equal rights written directly into its declaration of independence.

Among the most important rights that accompany this nearly divine status is an invitation to help shape society, whether in the form of voting, speaking, writing, or acting. These necessarily entail an almost unbelievable burden, because, left to their own devices, who knows what people will do?

The fact that we have empowered each individual to change the world is one of the primary driving forces behind our Jewish devotion to learning: If we're going to give people power --- and we have already committed to do so --- we have an obligation to give them the tools they need to decide well: education, compassion, and a sense of the divine. Or, in Hebrew, Torah ("education"), Avodah ("service to God"), and G'milut Chasadim ("acts of kindness"), a trio from the Talmud now immortalized in song.

And this is why we have a school at the Temple.

It's not just that our children have to learn Bible stories or ceremonial rituals or religious history or Hebrew letters, though all of those are valuable. We have a more fundamental and pressing reason. We'll soon be handing the next generation the very keys to God's realm.

On a small scale, it's in our own personal interest to make sure they handle the responsibility well, for most of us will live to see them running things. On a larger scale, we have a responsibility to the Jewish people, not just to the future, but also to our ancestors who bequeathed this glorious tradition to us and our children. And on a larger scale yet, we have long recognized our ongoing responsibility to all of God's creatures, wherever and whenever they may live.


I write this in summer, a perfect time for such lofty matters as these. Yet, this morning I also finished proofing the school calendar (so yes, it's my fault if there's a typo). Soon the year will begin, the carefree days of summer dreams will yield to cold winter nights of practicality. From experience I know that as the summer ends, the vision tends more and more to hide behind the details of its implementation.

So even though I know I'll fail, I, for one, will try not to let the daily grind detract from the divine glory of fulfilling a promise to ancestors past and building for millennia hence.

I hope you'll join me.

Montag never questions the destruction and ruin his actions produce until he meets Clarisse, an eccentric, young neighbor who introduces him to a past where people didn't live in fear and to a present where one sees the world through the ideas in books instead of the mindless chatter of television. He begins to hide books in his home; and when his

pilfering is discovered, the fireman finds himself running for his life.

wandered off a path which was meaningful to us, we may choose to find our way back and reclaim it. For others who are not Jewish, those who are searching, if given the right exposure, the richness of Judaism can be a discovery.

Judaism is a choice. And people knowingly put themselves on its path, just as others wander off. Judaism doesn't see proselytizing the same way as other religions do. According to the Talmud, righteous gentiles have a place in the World to Come (Sanhedrin 105a). As a result, there's less of an incentive for Jews to encourage conversion, and for non-Jews to join up. But that doesn't mean we can't rejoice when people make the choice of Judaism. And why not make that choice? After all, a very large percentage of Jews who are not practicing Jews still identify themselves, proudly I believe, with being Jewish. And, a more recent study by the Pew Research organization found that Judaism is a highly-liked religion by people of all religious beliefs.

At Vassar Temple, we have very active Jews-by-choice. They are regulars at services, teach in our religious school, perform vital committee functions, attend adult education, and serve as trustees who shape the direction of our Temple. Their passions for Judaism inspire everyone. Jews-by-choice are a reminder to Jews-by-birth how magnificent the gift of Torah and the traditions of Judaism really are. In every interfaith marriage there is potential for choice. In every heart & mind, there is the potential for that choice, too. Inclusion at Vassar Temples also applies to the LGBTO community.

For everyone seeking a spiritual path there is the potential for choice. What happens to the potential for choosing Judaism if from the start of a marriage or when considering whether to become a Jew, that individual or family feels welcome or unwelcome at Vassar Temple?

I do have leisure, you might say, but what should I study? Vassar Temple's Lifelong Jewish Learning is an answer. The 2014-15 program is among the broadest and most varied ever. Classes and sessions will be held on Sundays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, some in the morning or midday, and some in the evening. Some programs will involve classic Jewish texts (in translation), some informed presentations, and some interactive, an opportunity to learn from each other. Some will be more basic and general and some will be more specific in subject matter. I encourage you to take advantage of the offerings. Rabbi Search Committee: Update

The Rabbi Search Committee has been working actively over the summer. The first phase of our effort – collecting input from our congregants – was completed by June. We received a good deal of guidance from your collective comments; these will, of course, provide the basis of the competencies we will be looking for in the candidates.

As of July 20th: initial resumes have been received. One of the rabbis did sign a contract with another synagogue subsequent to submitting his application to us. Each of the rabbis was contacted by telephone giving both the candidate and the Committee an opportunity to: engage in a casual conversation related to the individual's interest in Vassar Temple; discuss some of the needs of the Temple, and; touch on general information about the community. It is important that a rabbi

who ultimately accepts an offer to serve our Temple has his or her professional aspirations met and knows that his/her family will be suited to living in the Hudson Valley which, thankfully, has a great deal to offer, as we all know! All of these conversations were well received by the rabbis who clearly appreciated a chance to 'schmooze.'

The next step in our process will be to have more formal interactions with the viable candidates utilizing visual electronic media. In depth questions regarding worship style, engagement with members, scholarly endeavors and outreach are but a few of the topics that will be on the table.

The intensity of the Committee's work in September and October will

depend, in part, on the outcome of our summer activity and on the availability of candidates to interact with us, especially as some who currently have a pulpit must attend to the obligations of High Holy Days in their current temples during the early Fall.

The Rabbi Search Committee remains committed to identifying and recommending to the Trustees that individual who will help make Vassar Temple an inviting place of spirituality, learning, social consciousness and extended family wholeness to keep Vassar Temple the place "Where You Belong."


- 1. Double headstones will no longer be allowed precise recording of burials are kept by the Cemetery Committee and Behan Bros. cemetery maintenance.
