Vassar Temple's 7th First Night Passover Seder Friday, March 30th at 5:30pm

The seventh annual first night Passover Seder, held in Vassar Temple's Social Hall, is lay-organized and lay-led, with a short seder service using a user-friendly Haggadah and activities to make the evening fun and meaningful for children.

From the Rabbi's Desk: The Incredible, Edible Passover Egg



Of all the ritual foods we eat on Passover, the most mysterious one is the egg. While each

traditional food has several layers of meaning, the egg has so many layers it might as well have been an onion!

Like many Jewish traditions, the egg started out as a compromise. In Exodus 12:8 (from the Priestly author, if you pay attention to such things), God commands us to bring a pesach offering-a roasted lamb or goat. In Deuteronomy 16:2 (from one of the Deuteronomist authors), God tells us to make an offering from our "flocks or our herds"—meaning cattle are also an option. To reconcile these two options, in II Chronicles 35:13 the priests make two offerings: a roasted offering and a boiled offering. elsewhere called hagigah or "festival offering."

The hagigah probably didn't start out as an egg. In the Talmud, the rabbis establish that two cooked foods are served at the seder, in honor of these two sacrifices. The second cooked food is eaten at the beginning of the festive meal, so that we can enjoy the roasted pesach lamb slowly, not in a state of crazed hunger (Pesachim 70a). There is little consensus on what the second food should be: beets and rice—an affordable, vegetarian option—two kinds of meat, meat and

gravy—another cost-cutting measure—or fish and egg, similar to our modern day hard-boiled eggs and gefilte fish! (Pesachim 114b).

How did the egg, in Hebrew *beitzah*, become the *hagigah* of choice? Perhaps, following the destruction of the Temple, the egg was chosen because it is a mourner's food. Eggs were served in houses of mourning because the mourner, like the egg, "has no mouth," and thus is not required to speak while in mourning. The egg's roundness also serves as a reminder of the cycles of life.

On the flip side, some saw the egg as a symbol of hope for redemption. 10th century scholar Sherira Gaon suggests that the egg was not one of two cooked foods, but one of three, symbolizing the heroism of Moses, Aaron, and Miriam, as well as the three types of animal we will feast on in the world to come: the Leviathan (a giant fish), the Wild Ox, and the Ziz (a giant bird).

In many cultures, the egg symbolizes springtime and rebirth. This would explain their place in the Christian celebration of Easter, though we probably both borrowed it from some ancient pagan springtime rite.

Because it represents a sacrificial offering, some people still roast their egg. However, remember to boil it first, or it will explode in your oven!

At this time of year, I like to focus on the egg's nature *and* its preparation. A hard-boiled egg, to me, is a symbol of resilience, of growing stronger in hot water. An egg is also a symbol of possibility, as described in Rabbi Susan Schnur's "Ode to the Passover Egg" a section of which appears here: (I encourage

you to read the whole thing at the site below!):


"Who would guess that inside your smooth temple worlds queue up, chafing to be born through generations, to be birthed and birthed again? Who would guess that worlds queue up inside of me,too. Egg, for I am like you — inside, the life in me teems, unborn universes mutely jostling and pulsing; like you. Egg, I am pregnant with what might-be. Consider this hand that cradles me — it is yours. This palm in which I wait, winking: it is all within, it is all within. Acknowledge me," you tell me. Egg, 'birth me. Birth your worlds."

May this season be one of resilience, rebirth, and renewed possibility for all of us. Hag Sameach!

From the Religious School Director



According to some, the Passover Seder is the ritual most observed and attended out of all the Jewish Holidays. This makes sense in a lot of ways because it can be

easy to get yourself invited to your cousin's seder or to drop in to a community seder at a JCC or a local synagogue. It is a distinctly Jewish holiday with traditional foods and scripted readings. And sometimes we even get a little creative and it becomes an experiential experience.

The word Seder means order. There is a specific order to the ritual meal, blessings and readings. But, upon reflection, I believe the meaning can be expanded. For those who kosher their homes for Passover the observance of the holiday begins right after Purim. Once that holiday is over, the family has a mission to clean out any *chametz* (food not kosher for Passover) from the cupboards. For example, those cookies you had hidden so your teenager wouldn't

gobble them up... it's time to make sure they are gobbled.

About a week or so before the holiday, the cleaning begins in earnest. Some keep this to the kitchen and others will make sure there are no crumbs in the pockets of any clothing. Each space you clean is to be covered and made out of bounds. Counters are covered with foil or plastic and others will use a blowtorch to make sure it is certifiably *chametz-less*. Food that was not able to be used is "sold" to someone who is not Jewish. The car is taken to be vacuumed. And the night before the 1st seder, there is a ritual called *B'dikat Chametz* which involves a wooden spoon, a feather and the last couple of remaining crumbs in your sparkling household and fire.

There was a time when I would spend hours following these customs and at the same time I would begin cooking for the seder and preparing a creative seder experience for my guests. Passover,, which I so loved as a kid, became overwhelming during those years. Admittedly I

did not sleep much in the weeks between Purim and Passover. Although, I still do a modified cleaning and sometimes will cook and lead a Seder, I have also learned to accept invitations, making the holiday special for me once again.

However, I learned something from the frenzy of cleaning, cooking and creating. I learned how important it is to create order out of the chaos. Just like the Israelites who are emerging from a time and place where they were enslaved, we are also emerging from our long winter. This is the time of year when our neighbors are also creating order with their spring cleaning. It is time for transformation and to begin again. Like our vearly transformation, the Israelites who left Egypt were transformed from being slaves into a self-determined people on a journey to become worthy of entering the promised land. Chag Sameach!
