From the Rabbi's Desk



I write these words while admiring the beauty of the fall foliage, knowing full well that they will be read when the trees will be bare and the skies will darken early in day. Against that darkness, we will kindle the

lights of Chanukah. How powerful this ancient story is to us this year with the memories of the shooting in Pittsburgh so fresh in our hearts. Over 2,000 years ago, the Assyrian King Antiochus tried to quash the Jewish soul but the Maccabees bravely rose up to defend their nation and the right of the Jews to worship in accordance with their faith. Miraculously, they were victorious; this paltry band of fighters defeated the great Assyrian army. Miraculously, the Jewish people has survived numerous enemies who have risen up against us – from Pharaoh to Nebuchadnezzar to Hitler to the neo-Nazis of our day. Each year we proudly display our *Chanukiot* in windows to fulfill the mitzvah of *pirsum hanes*, publicizing the miracle.

The vigil in Poughkeepsie and those in cities throughout this nation remind us that we do not kindle lights in the darkness alone. The night of the vigil, I thought back to an incident that took place in Billings, Montana in 1993. Hate groups had become increasingly active, attacking Jews and other minority groups. But when someone threw a brick through the window of a 5 year old's room in a Jewish home where the *Chanukiah* was set, the town took action. A member of a local church heard that the police chief had suggested to the parents that they not put up Jewish symbols anymore. Recalling the actions of the Danes during World War II who, led by their King, chose to wear yellow stars in solidarity with their Jewish neighbors rather than give them up to the Nazis, this one woman started a campaign to get everyone to put menorahs in their windows. They didn't have enough real ones, so they made paper menorahs. Some say that 3,000-4,000 homes in Billings had menorahs; others say 10,000. Sadly, it didn't stop the acts of hatred completely, but it did have some impact upon them. And the small Jewish community of Billings was uplifted

by everyone who supported them and stood up to those motivated by hate.

We pray that the Jewish community of Pittsburgh will be uplifted during these dark days by those who join them in kindling lights against the darkness of hatred. May they and we be sustained by recalling the promise of religious freedom articulated by George Washington to the Jews of Newport, RI in 1790, that “... *the Government of the United States... gives bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance...*” May his blessing to that congregation sustain us as well: “*May the children of the stock of Abraham, who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other inhabitants; while every one shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree, and there shall be none to make him afraid.*”

May the lights of Chanukah burn brightly with joy, hope and peace for you, your loved ones and our beloved country.

it does not matter how you spell it, as it universally means the same thing. I prefer Hanukkah spelled this way but you can decide for yourself. The Festival of Lights is a really fantastic holiday especially if you are a kid, or a kid at heart, so enjoy!

The tradition at Vassar Temple when we light all of the hanukiot on the back table just warms my heart. Our Hanukkah tradition has such a strong connection to Judaism and community for many of us, that when I see in

articles or on the internet that Hanukkah does not rank as a really important holiday to the Jewish people, I beg to differ. It seems wrong to rank a holiday. Why not just embrace each holiday with the energy and passion it deserves? The oil that fueled the Hanukkah that lasted eight days was a miracle that should be celebrated, though more importantly that we came out victorious over a tyrant king.

To most people that are not connected to the Jewish people, Hanukkah stands out as one of the most recognizable holidays. I am hoping that all of you shine your hanukiot in the windows of your home brightly (safely please) because more than ever we need to show our solidarity to each other and the greater community that we are here, and we are always going to be here. The Jewish people must be profoundly protective of their God given right to pray as they see fit without being ridiculed and having their temples or people hurt or defaced.

There is a huge difference between being scared and afraid. Being scared means that we are smart, we pay attention to the changes in the world, and we respond to it progressively to protect our people. Being afraid means we are weak, that we cower to the reality of current anti-Semitism. We are not weak; we are Jews which defines us as strong and resilient. Embrace the Festival of Lights, show and receive love, and embrace your temple passionately and enjoy Hanukkah. We owe this to ourselves and our people.

HEROES AMONG US: A Force in Music Education and the Arts, Beyond Measure

For nearly all of my 28 years in the Hudson Valley, I have known about several organizations whose names are synonymous with high quality arts programs for youth. These programs prosper from well-earned reputations as some of the best programs of their kind – anywhere. Stringendo, Mill Street Loft, Spark Media (formerly the Children's Media Project). . . you know them. But it was not until my interview with this month's "Hero Among Us" that I realized she and her family are key figures in all of them.

Indeed, Lisa Rubenstein, who has been on the Stringendo Board since 2008 and served as its President for the past six years, is one of the forces behind that decades-old non-profit organization that provides vital music education programs in the Hudson Valley including the Saturday Orchestra Program, Strawberry Hill Fiddlers and Summer Strings. These programs have provided opportunities for area youth to explore the wonders, virtues, lessons and gifts of musical study and performance that otherwise would not be available to them. Lisa's many years and countless hours of passionate work to build and strengthen these programs have had an impact beyond measure (no pun intended) for the nearly 250 children who participate in them every year. If ever there was a person who could be termed a "hero" in music education in our area, it is Lisa.

And the rest of the family, mentioned earlier? Lisa's husband, Rick DuVall, is an a stalwart volunteer for the Mill Street Loft, having served on that powerhouse of an arts organization's Board for more than 15 years, filling various roles including Treasurer at the present time. And many of you will recall that the Rubenstein/DuVall daughters were fixtures in Stringendo/The Strawberry Hill Fiddlers for many years. Most recently, Becky DuVall was involved in one of the projects that inspired the formation of the Spark Media Project (formerly the Children's Media Project), which recently merged with the Mill Street Loft to form The Art Effect, one of the newest, most exciting non-profit arts organizations in the Hudson Valley (if you don't know about it, check it out: <https://feelthearteffect.org/about-us/history/>). Suffice it to say that arts in various forms are more abundant and thriving around here because of Lisa Rubenstein and her family. Being "heroes among us" is simply in the DNA of this family. Thank you all for giving as you do and enhancing the quality of life as we know it in the Hudson Valley!

Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, in so many ways is really our Festival of Children. As we celebrate this holiday that celebrates religious freedom and our ancestors' victory against a tyrant, we rejoice as each new generation lights the Chanukiah symbolizing the continuity and strength of the Jewish people.

Chanukah is a time of joy and brightness at the darkest time of the year, an opportunity for families to come together and enjoy the holiday treats and festivities. With the ever increasing commercialization of the winter holidays, however, we can lose sight of the real meaning behind our holiday and its lights. We encourage you to deepen the meaning of Chanukah by enriching your home observances by incorporating lessons of *gemilut chassadim* that we celebrate our blessings best by sharing with others. Some ways to do this might be to:

- dedicate one of the nights to giving a gift of tzedakah instead of receiving a gift.

 - take your child/ren shopping for a toy or book to donate. (Suggestions for donations: 'Toys for Tots' in the box outside the armed forces recruitment center at 2020 South Road; Vassar Brothers Hospital's pediatric unit: children's books -- board books to elementary age, picture books or story books.)
- December will be a busy month in The Seth A. Erlebacher Re-

ligious School! The children will be making their own creative chanukiot, under the guidance of our madrichim. On December 9th we will celebrate together with the Tiny Temple families and enjoy Chanukah songs, games and treats.

On Wednesday, December 5th, Vassar Temple will host the Chanukah party for Gesher, the community program for Post-B'nei Mitzvah students held in conjunction with Temple Beth-El and Congregation Shir Chadash. The memorial tablets in our sanctuary provide us with the means to honor and remember loved ones, not only when their names are graced by lights on their yahrzeits and on Yom Kippur, but also throughout the year as permanent reminders of our personal and congregational histories.

While we prefer that the tablets be filled as slowly as possible, the reality is that we are now in need of additional space. Although donations for the individual plaques repay the cost of the board over a long time period, the significant initial expense is prohibitive.

Therefore, the Board of Trustees wishes to acknowledge a generous gift from Sandra Mamis which has made this purchase possible and, in turn, secured a stream of future donations as individual plaques are added. These donations go into the Temple's Sustaining Fund to support our operating costs. Sandra is donating the new board in memory of her beloved husband Harry Mamis, MD, z'l, and it will be inscribed accordingly.

Book Club to Discuss *The Hate U Give* on December 19th

Vassar Temple's Sisterhood Book Club will discuss *The Hate U Give* by Angie Thomas, the authentic depiction of a teenage girl, her loving family, and her attempts to reconcile what she knows to be true about their lives with the way those lives are depicted, and completely undervalued, by society at large.

Sixteen year old Starr Carter moves between two worlds: the poor neighborhood where she lives and the fancy suburban prep school she attends. The uneasy balance between these worlds is shattered when Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her childhood friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer. Khalil was unarmed.

Soon afterward, his death is a national headline. Protesters are taking to the streets in defense of Khalil's name. Some police and the local drug lord try to intimidate Starr and her family. What



everyone wants to know is what really went down that night? And the only person who can answer that is Starr. But what Starr does or does not say could upend her community, as well as endanger her life.

Beautifully written in Starr's authentic first person voice, this timely and profoundly moving novel is available through the local library system.
