This year, we can refer to October as "Jewish life after the holy days." With October 1st our fall festivals draw to a close with the observance

of *Shmini Atzeret/Simchat Torah*. We will celebrate the completion of another cycle of reading our sacred text, the Torah, and immediately begin again at the very start with the opening words of Genesis.

Each year we return to these wellknown stories with new eyes. The foundational stories of creation, of Noah, of our matriarchs and patriarchs, enable us to explore the joys and challenges of human relationships that we encounter in our daily lives. As we continue to grow, as our lives change, as the world around us continues to evolve, these ancient stories continue to gain new meaning. Indeed, it is another new beginning

reading. I invite you to join us Shabbat mornings at 9:00am for an hour of learning and engaging discussion as we study the weekly Torah portion. No prior knowledge of the Torah is necessary; all you need to bring is yourself and an open heart!

On October 10th, we will celebrate the second month of the Jewish year. Cheshvan. The month Cheshvan has the unusual distinction of being the only month in the calendar without a holiday in it. Thus, it earned the nickname Mar Chesvhan (mar means bitter). Certainly, for rabbis and cantors (and many synagogue leaders), Cheshvan is anything but *mar*. We rejoice in this simple month that lets us breathe a sigh of relief from Tishrei, a month that was overflowing with holy days of major import. During Cheshvan we get down to the basics of daily Jewish life. Without other holidays, we can appreciate more deeply the sweetness of Shabbat, our weekly holiday and day of rest. The children in our religious school will be able to delve into their core studies for the year on the themes of Torah, Avodah (prayer) and Gemilut Chassadim (Acts of loving kindness). We as a congregation will have a number of opportunities to perform acts of tzedakah in our own community: on Oct 7th we have our first LunchBox of the new year and the next, Sunday, Oct. 14th, is the annual CropWalk for Hunger. Please

join us for these and other activities as we begin another year in the life at Vassar Temple!

During this month we will also recognize another new beginning: our relationship as rabbi and congregation. Friday, Oct. 19th will be a very special Shabbat with my Service of Installation. The installation of a new religious leader is a practice common in churches which most synagogues have adopted, as well. It is a public ritual that formalizes the selection of this rabbi as leader of this congregation; even more so, it is an affirmation of the *brit*, the sacred covenant that exists between a rabbi and her congregation. I am so honored that my mentor, Rabbi Jerome K. Davidson, with whom I worked so closely both at Temple Beth-El of Great Neck and at the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion, will be here to serve as the installation speaker. I do hope that many of you will be able to attend as together we celebrate this new chapter in the history of Vassar Temple which I look forward to writing with you.

Seth A. Erlebacher Religious School News

Our religious school year began in the midst of the holy days and our students were actively engaged in celebrating the New Year, the fall harvest festival of Sukkot and our annual celebration of Torah, Simchat Torah. Now we turn our attention more fully to our core Jewish studies and Hebrew. Our Jewish studies curriculum is based on the Reform Movement's Chai Curriculum, designed to follow the teaching "The world stands on three things: On Torah, on Avodah (worship) and on Gemilut Chassadim (acts of loving kindness). Through grade appropriate lesson plans, the students will study

different Torah stories, basic concepts of prayer and principles of tzedakah that they will also be able to put into action. Once students have achieved basic Hebrew letter recognition, they move into the Reform movement's Mitkadem Hebrew program, designed to enable students to progress at their own pace under the guidance of our Hebrew teacher. Students' education will be enriched by learning contemporary Jewish songs with our music and by tefillah each week. I encourage parents to join us for tefillah at 11:30 each Sunday morning; of course, you are most welcome to come and visit anytime (please just let me know in advance).

Study Groups at Vassar Temple

"Torah Study," which examines passages from the week's torah portion or haftorah, will be led by the Temple's Rabbi Renni S. Altman, D.D., at 9:00am every Saturday. "The Talmud: Modern Ideas from an Ancient Text," taught by Senior Scholar Rabbi Paul Golomb, will be held the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month (Oct. 9 & Oct.23) at noon.

Shabbat Noach: Oct. 12th Endangered Species





Shabbat Noach, the sabbath when we read from the Torah about Noah's ark, will be observed here on Friday, Oct. 12th with a program featuring special guest, Pola Bari. Jewish ethics teach that we have a moral responsibility to provide for the welfare of animals, and Shabbat Noach provides the perfect opportunity to highlight the important role animals play on our planet.

Pola Bari is a local artist who draws her inspiration from felines, especially big cats, and is the founder of the Cheetah Conservation Fund NY Chapter and a trustee on the Cheetah Conservation Fund located in Namibia, Africa.

We will welcome shabbat with a 7:30pm service, and at 8:15pm, Ms. Bari will give a compelling presentation on the plight of endangered species and the implications for us all. She will share with us a unique holistic approach to conservation as the key to the future of any species...humans included. Plenty of time will be allotted for your questions and discussion, and our oneg will follow.

DCIC Award Gala: October 24th



Book Club to Discuss *The Women in the Castle* on October 18th

Vassar Temple's Sisterhood Book Club will discuss *The Women in the Castle*, an Amazon Best Book of April 2017 by Jessica Shattuck, set at the end of World War II, in a crumbling Bavarian castle that once played host to all of German high society. Three widows' lives and fates become intertwined amid the ashes of Nazi Germany's defeat in a dramatic yet nuanced portrait of war and its repercussions. Eventually, all three women must come to terms with the choices that have defined their lives before, during,

and after the war—each with their own unique share of challenges. Written with the devastating emotional power of *The Nightingale, Sarah's Key*, and *The Light Between Oceans*, Jessica Shattuck's evocative novel offers a fresh perspective on one of the most tumultuous periods in history, exploring what it means to survive, love, and, ultimately, to forgive in the wake of unimaginable hardship.
