From the Rabbi's Desk



On the Shabbat immediately preceding Purim, known as *Shabbat Zachor* (Remember), we read an additional Torah passage from Deuteronomy (26:17-19):

Remember what Amalek did to you on your journey, after you left Egypt—how, undeterred by fear of God, he surprised you on the march, when you were famished and weary, and cut down all the stragglers in your rear. Therefore, when the Eternal your God grants you safety from all your enemies around you, in the land that the Eternal your God is giving you as a hereditary portion, you shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget!

On Purim we fulfill this seemingly contradictory obligation by drowning out the name of Haman, a descendant of Amalek. Once each year, it is guaranteed that good will vanquish evil. Haman is the quintessential anti-Semite and, in trying to convince King Ahasuerus to let him annihilate the Jews, he espouses a classic anti-Semite trope:

There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your Majesty's interest to tolerate them. (Esther 3:8)

Through Mordecai's initiative and Esther's heroism, the Jews are saved and actually given permission to wreak vengeance upon their foes. This fantastical story and the topsy-turvy holiday it spawned are an expression of our fervent hope, the ultimate fantasy dream, that we can actually wipe out our enemies — forever!

Purim feels a little bit different this year in the shadows of Pittsburgh and Charlottesville. Neo-Nazi protests and a depraved gunman are just two examples where festering anti-Semitism has been brought from the shadows into the open. Even as anti-Semitic incidents have increased in the past two years, so, too, have we seen charges of anti-Semitism where we have least expected it, such as among the organizers of a march that should have united women across races, religions, and socio-economic classes. Unlike Haman who wore his anti-Semitism proudly, it has become more much difficult to identify anti-Semitism today. Can we partner with individuals or organizations in a common cause if they do not disassociate from someone who preaches anti-Semitism, even if they themselves do not? The challenges become even more com-

plex when it comes to geo-political issues around Israel where questions of anti-Semitism encircle lawmakers in Washington.

Yes, we must be vigilant and call out anti-Semitism whenever and wherever we see it; at the same time, we must be discerning, avoid jumping to conclusions, and careful in judgment. We will have the opportunity to discuss this great challenge during our Community Shabbaton at the end of the month when our scholar-in-residence will be Jane Eisner. As the editor-in-chief of *The Forward* for the past decade, Eisner has had a unique vantage point on this and other important issues of Jewish life. (See p.3 for more details).

I look forward to putting such concerns aside for our 'Rock n' Roll Purim' as we follow this age old tradition of being silly and irreverent – because we can! In truth, it is a sign of strength. And when we shake our pasta boxes to 'blot out' the name Haman, let us remember that it is not by attacking our enemies that we blot them out; rather, it is by joining hands with all who support the persecuted, who speak up for those who are singled out because 'they are different' and who work together to educate against hate.

Religious School Update

With the arrival of the month Adar II on March 8th, our joy increases as we plan for Purim on March 20th (14th Adar II). Students will be learning all about Purim in their classrooms and then religious school families will join Sisterhood in baking Hamantaschen on March 3rd.

On Sunday, March 17th, Vassar Temple will join with our neighboring synagogues and Federation for the annual community Purim Carnival, to take place at Temple Beth El, 118 S. Grand Ave. from 10:00am. – 12:30pm. Our teens will be running one of the booths and there will be live entertainment, games, bounce houses – fun for all ages!

Our celebration of Purim will take place at Vassar Temple on Wednesday,

March 20th beginning with the annual pasta dinner sponsored by the Men's Club followed by the Purim service and Megillah reading at 7:00pm. All (adults and children) are encouraged to come in costume and participate in the annual Costume Parade. Our musical parody theme this year will be the 60s (you are welcome to plan costumes accordingly – of course Purim characters are always welcome, or any kind of costume!).

Hebrew School is cancelled on March 20th to enable families to attend the Purim festivities.

When the holiday of Purim was established, three observances were codified: feasting and merry making in celebration of our people's survival; giving gifts to one another (known

as *Shelach manot*); and giving presents to the poor. While we give tzedakah at all times, it is most appropriate to give tzedakah on this day of celebration and joy. We express our gratitude best for the blessings in our lives by giving to those who are less fortunate. While we collect tzedakah each week in religious school, I would encourage parents to fulfill this *mitzvah* of giving tzedakah on (or around) Purim and model it for their children by involving them in this act as well. As its tzedakah project for March, Vassar Temple is collecting funds for The Emergency Fund for Jewish Families.

Noted journalist Jane Eisner will be our distinguished, guest speaker at the annual Community Shabbaton, March 29-31, 2019. Eisner will be speaking on the following dates on a variety of current issues of importance to us as members of today's Jewish community:

Friday, March 29 at Congregation Shir Chadash, 7:30pm sabbath evening service; "*The Relationship between American Jews & Israel*"

Saturday, March 30 at Temple Beth El, sabbath services that start at 9:30am and at a kiddush lunch to follow, "*Responses to the New Anti-Semitism*"

Sunday, March 31 at Vassar Temple during a 10:00a.m. brunch, "*A Lifetime As a Journalist*" and Q&A

Everyone in the community is warmly invited to attend any or all of the events of the weekend.

Eisner, truly a pioneer in journalism, served as editor-in-chief of the Forward for ten years starting in 2008, the first woman to hold the position at the influential Jewish national news organization. Before joining the Forward, she held executive editorial and news positions at the Philadelphia Inquirer for 25 years. Eisner's editorials have won numerous national and regional awards, she is a frequent commentator on radio and television, and she served for six years as the host of "The Salon," the first-ever women's program produced by The Jewish Channel. Eisner also has deep roots in academia, and is author of the book, *Taking Back the Vote: Getting American Youth Involved in our Democracy*.

Make Your Shekel Count March Tzedakah: Emergency Fund for Jewish Families

Traditionally, on behalf of one's self and one's children, just before Purim a Jew gave three coins to those in need. This was done in remembrance of the half shekel that was donated at the temple in ancient times. As Purim approaches, in the spirit of this tradition, we invite you to donate your 'half shekel' to the Emergency Fund for Jewish Families. This Fund constitutes a last resort lifeline for local Jewish families who have absolutely no where else to turn when they are unable to pay for rent, utilities, medicine, job search expenses, or other necessities in times of temporary financial hardship. Recipients are often desperately struggling with long term illness or unemployment and are not expected to repay the grant they receive from this fund.

The Emergency Fund was established by Jewish Family Services of Dutchess County and depends solely on public donations made specifically to this fund. Money collected in our tzedakah box during March will benefit the Emergency Fund, or you can make a donation by check made out to Vassar Temple with 'Emergency Fund' on the memo line. Many choose to donate \$18 'Chai.' Donations of any amount, great or small, are all welcomed and very much appreciated. To provide me with background for this month's article, my featured Hero shared a copy of the High Holy Day remarks she delivered to the congregation in 2013. In all the best ways, those remarks could be sub-titled, "How to Engage with Vassar Temple in a Meaningful Way." Indeed, the steady involvement our Hero has pursued with the Temple and the community for decades is a text-book example! I am talking about the mercifully omnipresent, Susan Karnes Hecht!

Thirty years ago, Susan and her husband, David, were seeking a congregation they might join to meet people and engage

with the community. Rabbi Arnold's beautiful naming ceremony for Susan and David's first child, even though they hadn't yet joined the Temple, sealed their happy fate, and they have been "hooked" on the Temple ever since.

As their family grew up, Susan assumed various roles at the Temple that paralleled their progressive involvements – Cradle Roll, Community Hebrew School Board, family dinner organizer, Hamantaschen Baking Day organizer, Youth Group Liaison – and then after the kids were up and out, Torah study, adult B'nai Mitzvah, Sisterhood, Social Action, Temple publicity, Reyut, and increasing responsibilities on the Temple Board, ultimately now serving as First Vice President. Lucky for VT, Susan is blessed with uncommon energy!

The core Jewish values that drive Susan's commitment to the Temple also drive her simi-

larly meaningful ties to the wider community. Whether it is the Citizens' Climate Lobby focused on carbon reduction legislation, the Town of Poughkeepsie Conservation Advisory Commission and Climate Smart Task Force, or her 32-year career working with hundreds of special needs children through St. Francis Hospital (now MidHudson Regional), Susan's life is one of great impact and care for her community. Oh, and did I mention that her family is now planning two weddings (Samantha in 2019 and Max in 2020)? If ever there was a Hero Among Us, it is Susan Karnes Hecht. Susan, **we** value **you** to our core, a core that is stronger because of you! Thank you for all you do.
