Community Seder at Vassar Temple: April 19th

Vassar Temple's 8th Annual Seder will be held in the social hall on Friday, April 19th (the first night of Passover), and everyone in the community is invited to attend. A short, meaningful, lay-led Seder service, appealing to all ages, will begin at 6:00pm, followed by a delicious kosher- style dinner including matzah ball soup, appetizers, entrée (choice of rotisserie chicken or fish), herbed vegetables, Pesach desserts, ritual wine, juice and soft drinks. Attendees may also bring their own table wines. **Space is limited, so please reserve early.** Fees have been set to cover expenses:

- Adult \$40;
- Age 5-13 \$12;
- Under age 5 free.

If you cannot afford the fee, support funds are available.

The RSVP deadline is April 8th; your payment is considered your reservation. Make checks payable to Vassar Temple; in the memo area please note 'Seder' and the number of adults and children. Include your e-mail address and indicate your entrée selection(s) of chicken or fish. From the Rabbi's Desk



During Passover 2006, while the US was still heavily involved in the Iraq war and any resolution seemed impossible, *New York Times* columnist, David Brooks, wrote a column

reflecting on the power of the Exodus story and what he termed “*an Exodus frame of mind*.” In the article, Brooks created an imaginary conversation between Mr. Past, the pessimist who believes societies never change and Mr. Future, the optimist, who has hope for tomorrow. Reflecting upon the Passover Seder he attended, Brooks wrote, “*The Exodus story reminds us that human beings can transform themselves and their situations.*”

The Israelites emerged from the experience of slavery and became a people bound in covenant with a God who demanded that they act towards others with justice and righteousness. One might expect a people who suffered such oppression to turn inward, but that is not our inheritance. Rather, thirty-six times, more than any other commandment, we

are reminded of our obligation to care for the stranger. And each year, through the foods and rituals of the Passover Seder, we fulfill the commandment “*And you shall explain to your child on that day, ‘it is because of what the Eternal did for me when I went free from Egypt.’*” (Exodus 13:8) We relive the experience as if we, ourselves, went out of slavery in order that we might sensitize ourselves to the plight of those who are oppressed today.

The Exodus, Brooks reminds us, “... *is not the story of liberation, but of the long, troubled march to freedom.*” The promise of redemption was never a promise of an easy journey; in fact, the journey ended up taking 40 years until the people were ready to face the real challenges of freedom.

As we gather around our Seder tables in a few weeks (and, so, too, around the Seder table at Vassar Temple), I would imagine that many of your families and guests, like mine, will discuss issues of current concern. Sadly, examples of those who are oppressed and hungry seem to grow every year. With rising anti-semitism in this country and around the world, we have begun, once again, to feel the plight of the stranger. As we celebrate spring by dipping our parsley in salt water, we can speak of the tears of mother earth,

suffering from the devastations of climate change. We pray “*next year in Jerusalem*” knowing that our beloved Jerusalem is in crisis and far from the ideal for which we pray.*

In these frightening times, let us remember “*the Exodus frame of mind*.” After all, it was the rabbinic sages who, 2000 years ago, had the audacity to create the Passover Seder, to celebrate and dream of freedom, while living under the cruel oppression of Rome.

Ours is a legacy of hope. Thus, Brooks wrote: “*There are times amid the journey when the Promised Land can seem a long way off, when the words ‘Next year in Jerusalem’ seem unrealistic. But those are the times when the words mean the most.*” (David Brooks, “The Past Meets the Future,” *New York Times*, 4/13/06)

Wishing you and your loved ones a *zissen Pesach*, a joyous Passover holiday that inspires you to live and act with “*an Exodus frame of mind*.”

From Our President: An Organ Called the Rodgers Model 205

If you have recently been to service, you surely noticed that the Rodgers organ, Model 205, which has served the congregation since about 1982, is no longer against the wall in the Sanctuary. It was purchased by the NY Theater Organ Society (NYTOS) in December 2018 and removed by them in February 2019.



It turned out that the cost of repairing the organ and maintaining it annually was not worth it. NYSTOS gave us a modest amount of money to remove it and they enjoy repairing organs, so it made sense. I cannot thank Joe Bertolozzi enough for his time, expertise and energy, along with the Music Committee’s careful consideration and decision, on the necessary removal of our Temple Organ.

A service call from a professional organ tuner costs VT \$500-\$650 per visit. The Temple had just had it serviced before the High Holy Days in 2018 when it failed. We had the technician return to work on it after

that and then later while organist Joseph Bertolozzi was practicing, all went wrong with the regulation of the organ sound. At that moment, we knew it was time to move forward.

The Rodger’s organ company has been sold a few times since it was installed (c.1982), and replacement parts for this analog instrument were going to become harder and harder to find, if not altogether unavailable, in the near future. We were literally on borrowed time. Joe Bertolozzi shared that three major things went wrong with the organ:

- When sustaining a note on the keyboard, the pitch fluctuated up and down or dropped out altogether. This was intermittent, and he could not anticipate when it would happen.
- The “Tuner” no longer worked - the organ has some pipes but the rest of its sounds, most of it, is electronic. When the temperature in the room goes up or down, the pipes expand or contract while the electronic sounds remain steady. The Tuner allows one to adjust the electronics to the pipes.
- Less important, the *Tremulant*, which can be added or retired as needed to give an undulating effect, was no longer working (good thing Joe knows what this is).

So the long and short of this situation is that retaining the organ and using just the pipes was not feasible because the bottom and top notes of

the keyboard are electronic notes not pipes, hence now wildly out of tune with the rest of the keyboard, and achieving a full sound on the organ requires the use the bass pedals which...you guessed it...are electronic.

All that said we will continue to have musical accompaniment in our worship. We have moved to a model, voted on by the Music Committee, where we will use the piano keyboard and percussion (thank you Elaine Lipschutz).

As an aside, the donors of the organ, Dr. & Mrs. Feinbloom, hired Joseph Bertolozzi as a consultant when VT was shopping for an organ 14 years before he was hired at VT. Joe and Dr. Feinbloom visited a few different local houses of worship to hear their organs. Joe counseled against getting this organ, as did Neil Gould, Joe’s predecessor but Dr. Feinbloom chose this organ anyway, and that is how we ended up with the Rodger’s model 205 which served VT well for 36 years (thank you to the Feinbloom family) Thank you, Joe Bertolozzi, for the history of the organ... it was great to collaborate with you on this article.

Religious School Update

And in the future when your child asks, saying, "What is this?" You should say to them: "With a strong hand the Eternal brought us out of Egypt from the house of slavery." (Exodus 13:14) It is in response to this (and three other similar ones) commandment in the Torah that the rituals of the Seder were created.

Through recounting the story in the Haggadah (which means "the telling"), we fulfill this obligation to tell our children of the Exodus from Egypt, the fundamental origin story of the Jewish people as a people. The special foods

and rituals of the Seder serve as a time machine of sorts, recreating that experience as if we ourselves went out of Egypt. Most important, we recall the Exodus to remember our obligation to care for the stranger having been strangers ourselves, to redeem those who are oppressed today.

In these weeks leading up to Passover, our children will prepare for this important holiday through study, songs and hands-on experience. Our *madrachim* (teaching assistants) will create and lead a special school-wide program on Sunday, April 14th.

We begin the Passover Seder with the invita-

tion, "*Let all who are hungry come and eat.*" On Sunday, April 7th, the Religious School will sponsor LunchBox, and the older classes, together with their parents and some of our *madrachim*, will have the opportunity to respond to this fundamental lesson of the exodus experience by helping to provide a hot meal to hungry people. I look forward to joining with them at LunchBox. Donations of franks and beans will be greatly appreciated.

HEROES AMONG US: Saving the World One Family at a Time

The subject of this month's 'Heroes Among Us' presented me with my biggest challenge yet: how can I do justice in a 350-word article to someone who has dedicated her entire career to achieving justice?

Hers is a career characterized by integrity and impact. Drawn to law as a tool for effecting positive social change, that objective remained central to her endeavors, first at Mid-Hudson Legal Services, then at Prisoners' Legal Services and ultimately serving Dutchess County Family Court as the Principal Court Attorney to the Hon. Damian Amodeo for twenty years and then a decade as an elected Family Court Judge before retiring in December. As you probably know by

now, this month's 'Hero' is the Honorable Joan Posner!

Joan's passionate dedication to her work is key to her impact. During her thirty years in Family Court, she addressed Dutchess County's once-notoriously slow adoption process, driving initiatives and legislation to radically expedite adoptions of children in foster care. She also helped to establish an integrated domestic violence model court over which she presided as Acting Supreme Court Justice, bringing continuity and coordination to domestic violence cases, especially those involving families with recurring patterns of domestic violence. Known among colleagues for her openness with a particular penchant for working with juveniles, Joan worked tirelessly to insure effective Court response to cases that typically involved multiple offenses.

Though now retired, Joan plans to continue volunteering on a committee addressing family law legislation, something that is extremely important to her. She is proud of the team she assembled while on the bench and has confidence in their ability to support her successor, Jeffrey Martin, and sustain her goal of "one family, one judge" and "saving the world one family at a time." Joan did all of this as a working mom raising a son and a daughter with her husband, David. They are now the proud grandparents of four grandsons, whom she plans to visit often. Joan Posner, you are a true hero – case closed!

The "Cabaret Rabbi" to Perform at Vassar Temple: May 19th

On Sunday, May 19th at 7:30pm, Rabbi Deborah Zecher, also known as "The Cabaret Rabbi," will perform her critically successful "Broadway Bible" show in the Vassar Temple social hall.

Rabbi Zecher had been a lifelong singer, but as an adult, she sang primarily in the synagogue. In 1995, she was invited to do a presentation at another local temple, and asked if she could do a musical program. This opportunity led to a new passion, and she created "Broadway Bible," a program linking familiar Bible stories with beloved Broadway show tunes, which she presented across the Northeast for synagogues, Elder-hostels, and other community organizations. She became a member of the Cabaret Workshop at the Berkshire Music School in 2002, in 2006 was accepted to the National Cabaret Conference at Yale University, and in 2017 was accepted as a Cabaret Fellow at the Eugene O'Neill Cabaret Conference. She has performed for various synagogues and community organizations throughout the country, several times at Don't Tell Mama's in NYC, and as an invitee, at a concert of Jewish women composers in Berlin, Germany.

As we celebrate National Donate Life Month in April, we celebrate the great strides being made in organ donation and transplantation in New York. 2018 saw a record number of lives saved through transplantation in New York. 879 organs were transplanted thanks to 313 selfless donors. 604,000 New Yorkers registered as lifesaving organ donors, the most ever for the state. With increased focus on organ donation from hospitals, legislators, the press and our community, great progress is happening.

But there is still work to be done. There are approximately 114,000 people waiting for a lifesaving transplant and nearly 10,000 of those are right here in New York. One organ donor can save up to eight lives and improve the lives of up to 75 people through tissue donation.
