## From the Rabbi's Desk



YOU can help promote rights for Reform Judaism in Israel in as little as five minutes with just a few clicks of the keys on your computer or mobile device. From now through March 11 you can have a voice in setting policies that will impact life in Israel – by voting in the World Zionist Congress Elections.

Since 1897 when Theodor Herzl convened the first Zionist Congress in Basel, Switzerland and birthed the Zionist movement, representatives from Jewish communities worldwide have met every five years to make decisions regarding key institutions in Israel and the allocation of significant funding to their programs in Israel and around the world.

The World Zionist Congress (WZC), also known the Parliament of the Jewish People, sets priorities for the World Zionist Organization (WZO), fills leadership positions in national institutions in Israel such as the Jewish Agency for Israel, and *Keren Kayemeth LeIsrael* – Jewish National Fund and allocates nearly \$1 billion annually to support Israel and world Jewry. Currently, the United States is the largest single delegation outside of Israel with 145 (29%) of the 500 delegates.

Due to the extraordinary turnout of Reform Jews in the 2015 WZC elections, the Reform movement (represented by ARZA) won 56 of those 145 delegates, enabling our movement to take significant steps forward in implementing our vision for a pluralistic, just, and democratic Jewish state. Most significantly, through our representation at the WZC, we were able to ensure that over \$4,000,000 a year goes to the Israeli Movement for Progressive Judaism. (By comparison, the Israeli government annually provides nearly 4 billion NIS (\$1.1 billion) to Orthodox and Haredi institutions in Israel.) Beyond funding, our strong representation at the WZC also enabled our movement to gain a stronger voice in Israeli national institutions and in the WZO to further policies that support Reform Jewish values and through which we can strive to gain influence in matters such as conversion, marriage and divorce, religious pluralism, and gender rights.

The 38<sup>th</sup> World Zionist Congress (WZC) will meet in Jerusalem in October 2020. The elections for delegates began on January 21 and will run through March 11. There are 13 slates representing American Jewish organizations. The American Zionist Movement (AZM) as the official American representative of the WZO coordinates the voting process. This year the Reform and Reconstructionist Movements are joining together in the slate “Vote Reform/ARZA.” You can read the platform and see the slate at [www.arza.org](http://www.arza.org).

Any self-identified Jew who is at least 18 years old (as of June 30, 2020) and is a permanent resident of the US is eligible to vote, as long as you will not vote in the March Knesset election and you affirm the Jerusalem Program. (The Jerusalem Program is the platform of the World Zionist Organization; it does not favor any specific organizational or political platform. In essence it states: *Zionism, the national liberation movement of the Jewish people, brought about the establishment of the State of Israel and views a Jewish, Zionist, democratic and secure State of Israel to be the expression of the common responsibility of the Jewish people for its continuity and future.* For full text go to <https://azm.org/elections>).

Voting is done online at <https://azm.org/elections>. There is an administrative fee of \$7.50 (those 25 and under pay \$5.00) to cover costs of the election.

Theodor Herzl famously said regarding establishing a Jewish homeland, “If you will it, it is no dream.” By voting in the WZC elections we can all help to make our dream for Israel one step closer to a reality. I urge you to join me -- [“Vote Reform/ARZA.”](#)

This flexible mindset is a gift that allows everyone the opportunity to be successful with a sense of dignity. Where else can Jews by choice, the LGBT community and interfaith families, to give some examples, have the right to pray without

question – connecting seamlessly to the Reform Jewish community at Vassar Temple.

Being a Reform Jew for me works for me. I do recognize that every Reform temple has its own culture and texture to it. The social fabric of who we are at Vassar Temple is made up of all of the congregants and their collective experiences. Having a voice as a congregant makes our journey more special when we all engage in dialogue about important issues that we can rally around.

Reform Judaism plays a huge role in my identity. Vassar Temple provides me with the community to be a part of a Reform Congregation and positively influences my connection to others Jews that have similar or the same views as myself.

## Religious School Update

Though we are still in the heart of winter, in Israel the weather is just beginning to turn towards spring. On the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the Hebrew month Shevat, which falls on the evening of February 9, we will celebrate *Tu B'Shevat*, the Jewish New Year for trees. The rabbinic sages set this date as one of four new years in order to mark the ages of trees so that they would know when their fruit could be eaten, as the Torah proscribes the eating of fruits until the 4<sup>th</sup> year of growth (Leviticus 19:23-25). In the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the Kabbalists (mystics) of Tzefat created a *Tu B'shevat* Seder to celebrate trees and their fruits, especially the "seven species" of Israel. Today our celebration of *Tu B'shevat* draws our attention to trees, the environment and our connection to Israel. The entire

congregation is invited to our *Tu B'shevat* Seder on Sunday, Feb. 9 from 9am-12 when all will join together in interactive learning, songs, eating the fruits of the holiday, a light lunch and fun activities for young and adult as we celebrate trees and their many gifts to us. All are welcome to come and join in all the classes--no previous training required! No charge to attend.

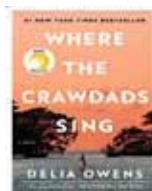

## Book Club to Discuss *Where the Crawdads Sing* on February 19

Vassar Temple’s Sisterhood Book Club will discuss *Where the Crawdads Sing* by Delia Owens, a book that not only has a mystery at its core, but is immersed in the natural world as well.

The story is set in the 1950’s and revolves around a young girl, named Kya Clark, known by others as the “Marsh Girl.” The author describes the desolate marshlands of the North Carolina coast through the eyes of Kya, an abandoned child. ## HIAS Welcome Campaign Leadership Teams Meeting

On Sunday, March 15, Vassar Temple will host a meeting of leadership teams from a coalition of Jewish congregations in Dutchess, Orange and Ulster Counties to learn about the work of The Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS), a 136-year-old refugee organization, originally founded to help Jewish immigrants from Europe. Later, they expanded their work to Jewish refugees and now to all refugees.

At the meeting, staff members from the HIAS Welcome Campaign program, a new initiative, will discuss the network of congregations across the United States who advocate for refugees, raising awareness about the crisis, and welcoming refugees into their local communities and how we can support this critical work.

Vassar Temple has a history of such outreach and we are proud to support HIAS to add our voices to a growing national movement. A report of this preliminary meeting and opportunities for wider congregational participation will follow.

## Sisterhood Recipe- Hamantaschen

4 cups sifted flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup softened butter (not margarine) ... please use real butter as this allows even baking of all batches  
2 cups sugar  
2 eggs  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
4 tablespoons orange juice or milk  
\*Filling of your choice – apricot, raspberry, poppy, prune etc.

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar in separate larger bowl. Add egg and vanilla and beat well.

Add dry ingredients alternating with juice or milk to the butter and sugar mixture, mixing until well blended. The dough will seem a little soft (not like bread dough).

This dough freezes well and rolls out best when it's chilled. Refrigerate or make ahead and leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight. Stop here if you are bringing dough to Hamantaschen Baking Day.

*If making Hamantaschen at home...*

Roll out dough on lightly floured surface to ¼ inch thick and cut circles out with a drinking glass. Fill with ½-1 teaspoon filling in center of circle. Shape into triangles.

To bake: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place filled hamantaschen on parchment paper or foil, then on a cookie sheet 1-2 inches apart (they spread a little). Bake 12-15 minutes or until dough is cooked.

\*Can use cans of Solo pie filling or jam or preserves. Chocolate candy melts from Michaels or AC Moore work better than chocolate chips (chips make the hamantaschen lose their shape).

### HEROES AMONG US: A Quiet Source of Life

The immediate response from this month's hero when asked to be featured was that she doesn't do enough for the Temple. Indeed, she said her involvement modestly reflects the gratitude she feels for the support she and her son received during some challenging times in their lives. But in speaking with her, it became clear that she is paying it forward more than she knows.

Anyone who has enjoyed Temple events in recent years such as Yom Kippur Break the Fast, Passover Seder, Hamantaschen baking or a Shabbaton meal, has likely been the beneficiary of Polly Lewis's efforts. Her enduring presence with her son, Kamil, has contributed meaningfully to the life of our Temple

community. Lucky for us, there does not appear to be any task too daunting for Polly (she admits that saying "no" does not come easily to her) and Kamil has readily shared his culinary talents.

Raised in an Orthodox Jewish family in Kingston, NY, Polly found Vassar Temple through Perla Kaufman while seeking a Temple community in which to raise Kamil, whom she adopted from Poland. Rabbi Golomb ultimately proved to be an important presence in her and Kamil's lives, as Rabbi Golomb and the wider Temple community helped them overcome formidable personal challenges in those early years.

A former board member and an increasingly active Sisterhood member, Polly's story is one of dedication, courage, survival and positivity. She has worked for Laerdal Medical for the past two decades, providing New York hospitals and teach-

ing institutions with manikins for medical training programs. She bravely confronted – and defeated – breast cancer while also establishing a new life for Kamil in the U.S. and, through her work at Laerdal, giving life-saving care to countless people she will never know.

Polly is known at work as a creative thinker when raising funds for the expensive equipment she markets, and she is now applying that same creativity to fund raising for the Temple. She does everything in a quiet way, even sharing her very moving story. Her life is characterized by unselfish perseverance and gratitude, worthy of this month's hero recognition.
