Polly Lewis Receives Founders' Award

The Vassar Temple Board honored Polly Lewis with the 2020 Founders' Service Award in recognition of her extensive exemplary contributions to Vassar Temple. You have likely attended and enjoyed some of the annual events Polly has organized, such as the Vassar Temple Community Seder and the post-Yom Kippur Break-the-Fast Meal (featuring her famous kugel). And in an entirely different area of Temple life, Polly has developed and carried out successful fundraisers, including the Fall Mum and Passover Wine Sales, and is currently Fundraising Chairperson for the Temple Sisterhood. She has served on the Temple Board, made the arrangements for an automatic defibrillator (AED) to be installed at the temple, and she continues to ensure that it's maintained in good order. She even found time to redecorate all the Temple bulletin boards! For all the special things she does to make Vassar Temple a better place, we were pleased to present Polly Lewis this coveted award.

Civic Engagement Committee Project

As Reform Jews, we believe that democracy functions best when everyone participates. In conjunction with the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, we are engaging in a non-partisan campaign to help ensure that American citizens of color are fully able to participate in the voting process. We have joined with the Reclaim Our Vote campaign, which encourages voting by people of color in seven states (North Carolina, Arizona, Texas, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama, and Georgia) that have erected significant barriers to voting and also have a high percentage of people of color. The NAACP and Mi Familia Vota are some of the national partners.

Our committee has purchased postcards and obtained labels and addresses for a postcard campaign. As of this writing (end of July) we have already distributed almost 1,000 postcards. We are looking for more volunteers to join us. All you need are stamps (35 cents) and the willingness to neatly write postcards. Voters are also being reached by phone and text.

From the Rabbi's Desk



Connection ... the need for connection. According to social worker and author Brené Brown, "Connection is why we are here; it is what gives purpose and meaning to our lives." *

The lack of connection, the isolation from one another, is a significant factor that makes dealing with this pandemic so very challenging. We yearn for connections but protecting our health and well-being -- and that of others -- has necessitated that we remain in relative isolation from one another. For some this time has been especially challenging, whether they have faced illness or loss or have not been able to help care for or visit loved ones. We know how hard this has been on children and their families.

Thanks to the internet and its different platforms, we have been able to make virtual connections and visit with family and friends long distance. We have worshipped, studied and socialized virtually as a Vassar Temple community. Still, it is not the same as being there; we long to hug and kiss one another.

As vaccines are still in development, we are forced to accept the reality that our virtual and safe distance connections must remain in place and that we are not yet at the time to return to a "new normal." Normally, the *Yamim Noraim*, the Days of Awe, are a time in which we seek to strengthen various connections in our lives: with family, with our Jewish heritage, with our Vassar Temple community, within our deepest selves, and, through all of the above, with God. How can we make all of these connections when we cannot be physically together?

We have reached the scenario that every rabbi, cantor, Temple president and ritual chair have dreaded since the start of the pandemic: High Holy Days when we cannot safely be together for worship in our sanctuaries. Having chosen virtual worship to ensure the safety of all, our next concern became maintaining those important connections. On behalf of our entire congregation, I want to express my deepest appreciation to our High Holy Day Task Force and High Holy Day Visioning Team for their many, many hours of hard work and unwavering devotion to this synagogue in creating what will certainly be meaningful virtual worship experiences.

By virtue of being virtual, worship will feel very different these Holy Days. Some Vassar Temple traditions, while lovingly maintained, will of necessity be altered. At the same time, we will take advantage of this

technology to enhance our worship experiences in new ways. Instructions will be given throughout services so that everyone will be able to follow along. Since our attention span is not the same online as it is in person, the worship will be shorter in length, but I assure you it will be full in meaning. We will also have opportunities for in-person gatherings, following safety protocols -- masks required!! Details were outlined in the annual High Holy Day letter; please read and follow them carefully.

I encourage you to join us with an open mind and sing along, even with muted voices. And by all means, get yourself into the proper mindset by making your home a *mikdash me'at* (a small sanctuary). Set yourself up in a space with limited distractions, put out flowers, turn your phones off, and come to the computer dressed for services! Cantor Goldmann, Joe Bertolozzi and I look forward to connecting with you virtually as we "beam" services from our sanctuary.

Wishing you and your loved ones a sweet, safe and healthy 5781 -- *Shanah tovah!*

President's Message



Dear friends,

This month I begin to expand on the priorities highlighted in my summer message.

Vassar Temple has thrived for 170 years by meeting member and community needs and building partnerships. When I joined, we were 400 households strong with a straightforward budget. Like all faith communities, we have been impacted by shifting demographics and economic pressures and can no longer rely on members to support our operations. We must seek new revenue

streams including the wider world of grants.

We have succeeded in obtaining many grants, especially at our own Community Foundations; I'd be remiss if I didn't acknowledge the phenomenal work done on this front, and we will continue to take advantage of these resources. But when we began recently to examine larger-scale - particularly government - grants (e.g., FEMA's Nonprofit Security Grants provided \$90 million in 2020) we learned that we were unprepared to submit such applications (a first step was the February update of our 1851 Articles to current IRS language). Recently the Board initiated an extensive, professionally-guided project to create a secure electronic "document room." This proactive work will enable us to apply

for competitive grants rapidly and accurately. To this end, we are:

- Collecting administrative documents that establish legal and financial standing: legal, financial and budget records; governance; insurance; affiliation; employment; and contracts.

- Gathering non-administrative documents that tell our story: publications; mission and values statements; oral and written histories; fundraising materials; strategic plans.

- Tackling our historic archives to preserve this unique collection, much of which exists as rapidly aging paper, newsprint, and photographs which will be digitized and moved to archival storage. These materials

Over the years, Bob has served in many leadership positions on Temple committees and on the Board, including Temple President. In all of these capacities he has always warded off conflict and brought people together, exemplifying grace and promoting *shalom bayit* in whatever capacity he is serving the congregation. Heroes Among Us: Helping People is Her Calling

Before researching this month's article, I did not know anything about our Hero, and it has clearly been my loss. If you've never stopped to talk to Jas Russo, I highly recommend it. This is her amazing story:

Jas was raised in a Southern Baptist family by a single military mom whose work required frequent moves, but Jas considers Greensboro, NC to be her home. Her family got by on very little, though she did not know the difference since she never felt deprived. Out of necessity, she was self-reliant from an early age, and that instilled a "can do" spirit that drives her ambition to this day.

When Jas was a young adult, her mom moved to the Hudson Valley for a job with IBM and the prospect of providing a different life for her family. Jas always contributed to her family's income by working various jobs, but eventually she went to community college to study nursing, making her the first generation in her family to go to college. Helping people was her calling and nursing provided the perfect path for her.

But Jas is no ordinary helper. I would classify her as an "extreme helper," as she has applied her nursing skills to helping those in greatest need. Her positions have included Planned Parenthood and the Psychiatric Unit of the former Benedictine Hospital, and she is now a Nursing Supervisor at Cornerstone Rehabilitation Center in Rhinebeck. She compresses a full work week into three days so she can be present for her two

daughters – ages sixteen and six – the majority of the week. She is an extraordinarily dedicated Mom, exemplified by her vigilant care around her daughters' respective serious asthma and food allergies, not to mention nursing them through recent bouts with coronavirus (everyone is okay now).

Moving to the Hudson Valley exposed Jas to a way of life that she didn't previously know existed. She married into a Jewish family and eventually converted, embracing traditions, practices and values that felt very natural to her. Jas engaged in activities at Vassar Temple with which her children were involved, including Tiny Temple and her older daughter's Bat Mitzvah project. The latter blossomed into The Birthday Project, which remains a thriving enterprise that Jas oversees, bringing joy to children whose families cannot afford birthday presents and celebrations. This project connects to Jas's own humble beginnings, and she aims to "live the rest of her life helping people." She seems to be perpetually asking herself what she can do to make a difference in people's lives, and pay forward the opportunities that have shaped her life.

If that's not a Hero, I don't know what is. Jas Russo, you are remarkable and I hope we can meet for real someday soon.

Community Solar at Vassar Temple

The Dutchess County Interfaith Council has a partnership with Nexamp Community Solar. New York State's community solar program allows utility customers to subscribe to a share of a local solar farm and receive credits on their utility bill for 100% of the energy produced by that share, while also paying for that electricity at a 10% discount.

The Vassar Temple Board of Trustees was proud to be the first DCIC member to enroll as an organization. We have been realizing this discount on the temple's electric bill for several months, supporting our bottom line as well as the environment.

Congregants also have the opportunity to sign up for residential community solar. For each household that participates, Nexamp will make a significant donation to the temple. This donation has been increased through September 30 as an incentive. There is no cost to join, no equipment installed on your home, no long-term commitment, guaranteed savings, and no cancellation fee. Beginning this month, we are pleased to include these participants on the donations page of the Bulletin as a way to thank them.

School Supply Collection Deadline Sept. 7

At least 85% of the 600 children at Morse Elementary School in Poughkeepsie live below the poverty level, and the school is in receivership because the population has trouble meeting minimum State standards. But there is something very simple we can do to help! We can help these children reach their full potential by providing them with basic learning tools they will need, whether they are located in the school or doing distance learning at home.

The principal has asked us to assemble for each child an extra-large zip lock bag containing one box of 24 crayons, safety scissors, 1 box of colored pencils, 2 glue sticks, and 2 sturdy plastic pocket folders. Can you make up one or more of these packets, perhaps as your family shops for their own school supplies? Gaily decorating the bag with Sharpie pens, etc. would make a child's first day of school even happier! (Everything will fit in a 1-gallon bag, with the folders sticking out, if you don't have an extra-large bag). Just drop them off at the temple M,T,Th,F between 10am-2pm. (please wear a mask). **Or send a check in any amount made out to Vassar Temple, with School Supplies on the memo line, and we will shop and assemble the bags for you.**

This is a Mitzvah Now project co-sponsored by all area synagogues, the Jewish Social Action Coalition, the JFedDC, PJ Library, and the Harding Club.

Stopping at the drugstore (CVS, Rite Aid) and picking up your Prescriptions? Use Scrip. Buying gas (Mobil, Shell)? Use Scrip. Purchasing home improvement or gardening supplies (Home Depot, Lowes)? Use Scrip. These are just a few of the many Scrip cards that we have. We have a list that's available and we can get you what you need. Order some and keep it on hand to make your regular purchases and try it out. Every Time you use Scrip, you are making money for the Temple. Once you get in the habit of using it, you actually start feeling guilty when you purchase something without it. And honestly, who needs Jewish Guilt on top of a Pandemic? Questions?
