### November Election Information

All registered voters in NY state have three ways to choose to vote in the November 2020 election:

1) By mail – because of COVID-19, New York State now allows "temporary illness" be used as a reason for voting by absentee ballot.


Download the application for an absentee ballot on the website for the county you live in: For Dutchess, <a href="www.elections.dutchess.gov">www.elections.dutchess.gov</a>. or, for Ulster County residents, <a href="https://elections.ulstercountyny.gov/">https://elections.ulstercountyny.gov/</a>.

Mail deadline for applications is October 26, but because of possible delays in the mail, it is suggested applications and voting ballots be mailed earlier. (Please double-check with your county Board of Elections office about application and voting deadlines. Each county may be different and things may change.)

- 2) In person during Early Voting between October 24 and November 1, you may vote in person at any of five sites in Dutchess County: Rhinebeck Town Hall, Millbrook Fire House, Dutchess County Board of Elections in the City of Poughkeepsie, Boardman Road Library or Fishkill Town Hall. Ulster County residents, please check the Ulster BOE website (above) for sites. For hours, check your county's website.
- 3) By in-person voting on Election Day, November 3 at your usual polling place from 6am to 9pm. Note: Final day for voter registration is October 9.

#### From the Rabbi's Desk

The Zionist philosopher Ahad Ha'am



famously said: "More than the Jewish people has kept Shabbat, Shabbat has kept the Jewish people." One can say a similar thing about Shabbat services and Vassar Temple; Shabbat services are

an integral part of what binds our congregation together. Erev Shabbat services are central to the life of Vassar Temple. Certainly, they are a time for prayer; even more, they are an important time for communal gathering. How uplifting it is when we join together in song (and we will sing together in person again soon). In our services we strengthen our bonds to one another, to our synagogue and to our faith. And how we miss our Oneg Shabbats! One cannot deny the lure of those delicious baked goods (and talking about them just isn't the same), but it is really the draw of the people that attracts us. We yearn to sit at a table with others over coffee and cake and hear about each other's lives.

Over the years the nature of our worship services has changed in accordance with the needs and style of the times.

So, too, as Reform Jews we have the flexibility to schedule services at times that enable most people to attend. For some years now we have followed the pattern of holding services at 7:30pm from March through Thanksgiving and at 6:00pm from Thanksgiving weekend through February. As has been done periodically, last year the ritual committee undertook an evaluation of our services times, including taking a survey of the congregation. Thanks to so many of you who responded. We learned some important things from that survey. While respondents were almost evenly split regarding preferences for the time, there was strong agreement that people didn't like the current pattern of changing times.

At the same time, it is becoming apparent that our services are not experienced as being "family friendly," in part because of the later time but also because of their length and format. A prior model to have separate "family" services on a regular basis is not desirable for many reasons, including not wanting to divide up further our already small congregation.

After speaking with members of our religious school committee and reviewing the survey results, the ritual committee has developed a new plan for services, one that we hope will meet the various desires and needs of our congregants.

Most of our services will be at 7:30pm. Once a month we will have a "Simchat (Joy of) Shabbat Service" at 6:00pm that will last approximately one hour, include a lot of singing and will often feature a story in lieu of a *d'var Torah*. We hope that such a service will be attractive to young and older alike! Typically, it will be the 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month, depending upon scheduling. Our first Simchat Shabbat service will be on Friday, Oct. 23. In honor of *Shabbat Noach* there will be a special focus on our animals (watch the weekly emails for more details.)

We will **experiment** with this plan this year and re-evaluate in the spring. We recognize that this change will take some adjustment and we will ensure that the schedule receives ample publicity. As always, the weekly newsletter will list service times; please do pay attention to these and other announcements. As the year progresses, we will welcome your feedback and suggestions. Please be in touch directly with me or with our ritual chair, David Hecht (vitritchair@gmail.com).

And, if you haven't attended Shabbat services in a while, I urge you to join us. I look forward to seeing you there!

This fall, in a stroke of luck, three of our holiday celebrations (*Erev Rosh Hashanah*, *Sukkot*, and *Simchat Torah*) coincide with Shabbat, making our Friday evenings even more special. Consequently, this month I want to share how important Shabbat has

become for me as I navigate our challenging world and my term as President.

Over time, in parallel with my increasingly deep dive into temple affairs, I have delved into our most central and beautiful tradition. Shabbat is what we each make of it; it is available to all of us for renewal.

On Fridays, I turn habitually to the following passage from the Amidah, in the section that we peruse silently: "...when doubt troubles us, when anxiety makes us tremble, when pain clouds the mind, we look inward for the answer to our prayers. There may we find You, and there find courage, insight and endurance." These lines express the essence of Judaism's role in prompting me to find inner strength to

continue fighting for my family and my community. If you aren't a "regular" at services I hope you'll consider joining us for comfort and community (and one of these days, for oneg!), to discover your own wellspring of strength within the liturgy.

On Saturdays, I eagerly anticipate Torah Study, where I absorb our history, receive intellectual stimulation, and participate in the debate that is central to our tradition. I'm always searching for today's lesson in the ancient passages. Retirement gave me the wherewithal to get up early on Saturday and, this year, I'm gratified that I've been at it long enough to come back around to the same portions and find something new. I'm elated to understand as an adult — because I was not given this opportunity growing up — that I can engage with the Five Books as literature, a wonderful story with characters, plot lines, cliffhangers, extreme violence and incredible selflessness. It's fascinating to see how the personalities and life experiences of my temple friends are reflected in their commentary. If you've never tried. I hope you'll contemplate it. It's a welcoming group.

One of the first requests I made of this year's Board of Trustees was to join me, barring emergencies, in suspending temple business on Shabbat. If you email the president's account, you'll receive an acknowledgment asking that temple leadership be afforded this opportunity for rest and renewal. I respectfully ask and invite you to join us in making a conscious effort to elevate this tradition. We look forward, when we return to the sanctuary, to greeting you warmly, celebrating your happy occasions, supporting your sad times, and immersing ourselves in the music, liturgy, words of wisdom from our Rabbi, and the community.

Following V'Shamru, our prayer book offers the following words from Ahad Ha-Am, a Hebrew essayist known as the founder of cultural Zionism: "More than the Jewish People has kept Shabbat, Shabbat has kept the Jewish People." It is certainly keeping me. I look forward to seeing you.

#### Temple Receives Gift of "Grand" Piano

Thanks to the generosity of Barbara Lemberger, a long-time member of Vassar Temple, the Temple will soon receive a classic 1923 Mason & Hamlin AA Grand piano. The piano originally belonged to Barbara's grandmother, a concert pianist and piano teacher who was active in numerous Jewish organizations. For many years, it graced Barbara's living room, providing beautiful music to her and her family.

The piano was examined by Jon Vincitore, of Vincitore's Piano Center, who found it to be in good working order. Joe Bertolozzi played it and noted its "full sound and even response," concluding "[I]t is eminently playable and satisfying to hear." The piano will be housed next to the bimah, where the organ previously stood.

Although Barbara is moving to New Jersey, she wanted to find a home for the piano at Vassar Temple. She stressed how thrilled her grandmother would be to know that her beloved piano will provide concert-level inspiration to the congregation and the wider community for years to come. The Board of Trustees accepted the gift with gratitude.

With donations from the Lemberger family and various members of the Music Committee, the piano is being tuned, its finish restored, and moved to the Temple at no cost. It will be incorporated into our newly upgraded sound system. When the Temple reopens for in-person congregational worship and events, the Mason & Hamlin will fill the sanctuary with its "Grand" sound. We look forward to a formal dedication of this incredible gift.

## Grocery Store Humanity During a Pandemic



At the grocery store today, I was at a very crowded check-

out line watching an energetic, chatty, young cashier add up my groceries and put them from one belt to the other. Even with her mask on I could tell she must have been in her mid-twenties and was surprisingly enjoying her job. It actually made me smile inside my mask.

I turned to begin bagging my groceries in the reusable bags that I had brought with me and noticed a man standing next to the plastic bags that are hung on the rack at the end of the conveyor belt. I watched as he, with difficulty, in front of all of us standing there, methodically pulled an entire three-inch thick pile of bags off the rack and continued to walk out of the store with them.

"Is he with you?" the cashier asked me. "No", I replied. "Did you see that?", she asked, incredulously. "How could I miss it?" I replied. She told me the total for my groceries and sighed heavily.

While I was making my credit card payment, this is what she said. "I could call my manager, but it's so busy here right now. Clearly that man could have stolen far more valuable things from this store, but he only stole plastic bags. He must be in very dire straits to stand right in front of us in a crowded store and struggle like that to steal a pile of three-cent bags. It's between him and his maker now. I hope whatever he is doing with those bags is something useful and good. Truly he needs those bags more than we do. I'm not going to report him. Is that ok with you?" she asked me.

"It's fine with me," I told her.

She thanked me for packing my groceries, wished me a blessed day and moved on to her next customer with the same happy energy that she had greeted me with at the beginning of our encounter. Despite my having witnessed a crime, I also witnessed humanity, and I left her with a smile under my mask.

#### **Religious School Update**

The Seth A. Erlebacher Religious School of Vassar Temple began the year with two outdoor sessions so that faculty, students and parents could be together in person, at safe distances with all precautions in place. We will move to virtually learning on Oct. 18. The Hebrew school began with virtual sessions on Wednesday, September 16.

I'm so pleased to welcome Vassar Temple member Shira Teich to our Hebrew faculty. She joins a great team of teachers: Gail D'Alessio (6<sup>th</sup> grade), Fern Greenberg-Wolf (2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> grade) and Marcia Tanzman (7<sup>th</sup> grade). Olivia DiIorio will continue to teach music virtually. *Madrichim* will continue to assist in the in-person sessions as well as online.

We are very excited to begin using a new curriculum this year through Shalomlearning. They are an independent educational program that has produced a very engaging values-based Judaic curriculum that spirals through each grade level, building upon a core set of Jewish values with age-appropriate lessons. Bible stories, holidays and Jewish history are integrated around those core values. The program is designed for both online and in-person classes, so it provides a great resource for virtual learning (and they have expanded their online resources to accommodate teaching during this pandemic).

Despite the challenges of teaching and learning in this pandemic, our religious and Hebrew school programs continue to educate and engage our children with Judaism and with Vassar Temple.
