Feb. 14 Ariel Burger: Witness to Elic Wiesel. Dr. Burger reflects on his personal relationship with Wiesel as mentor, friend and teacher.

Feb. 21 Eli Wiesel: Witness to the Shoah. Emerging from the horrors of the Shoah, Wiesel taught the lessons of activism against hate and injustice; his message was one of both particularism in his commitment to Israel and to the Jewish people, and universalism, as expressed by his concern for suffering anywhere.

Feb. 28 Elie Wiesel's Lessons from Jewish Tradition. In addition to his activism, Wiesel had a passion for Judaism, especially for the biblical personalities and the teachings from the Hassidic tradition.

March 7 Elie Wiesel: What messages would he have for us today? What would Wiesel say about the challenges we are facing today, such as living through a pandemic, America's current confrontation with racial injustice and the polarization that plagues our nation?

Lunch Box

Vassar Temple, in conjunction with the Mid-Hudson Islamic Association has taken on the responsibility of providing two meals per month at the Community Lunch Box. For one of those meals, the MHIA has taken the lead on the main course, and VT has provided supplementary food (generally, desserts and fruit). For the other meal, roles are reversed, and VT provides the main course with MHIA providing a dessert and fruit. We have recently been informed by the Lunch Box staff that they would prefer that we NOT provide desserts.

Volunteer service opportunities are limited but very much appreciated. If you can volunteer for any of the upcoming Sundays, please let me know by emailing me at <u>Lunchbox@vassartemple.org.</u>

We are also looking for someone to purchase the fruit for these Sunday meals. The Lunch Box fund at the Temple has funds available so our need is really for someone to get the fruit (bags of apples or oranges or bunches of bananas; that is, fruit that you can walk with) and bring it to the Lunch Box for distribution.

Finally, we will need chili and cornbread every third Thursday of the month. You can make it any time ahead of that date and leave it in the VT freezer. We will bring it to the Lunch Box that Thursday morning.

And, of course, money for this effort is always welcome and most appreciated.

From the Rabbi's Desk



"When [the month] Adar begins, joy increases!" Why? Because the 14th of Adar is the raucous holiday of Purim. And if there was ever a winter where we needed a little silliness, it is

this one! Like the story of Esther, we need an opportunity to envision vanquishing our enemy and imagine the joy we will feel when we reach that moment.

Purim will be different this year, not only because we will celebrate via Zoom. Purim is about masquerading; that may not feel so special, as we've been wearing masks for a whole year already! And one of the many challenges of doing so is the difficulty we have recognizing people.

Masking – and unmasking – is actually key to the Purim story. Events turn on the concealing and revealing of characters' true identities.

When Esther enters the beauty contest and marries the King without telling him that she is a Jew, she is, in fact, wearing a mask. Mordecai must convince her to take it off, as it is only by revealing her true identity that Esther can save her people. In doing so, Esther is transformed from a timid woman into one of courage who devises a clever plan so that when she reveals her true identity, she is assured of the King's support. In doing so she reveals not

only her identity as a Jew, but the strength of the woman who was there all along, concealed from the King and, indeed, from herself.

On the other hand, we (the readers) see Haman's true self when he devises the plot to kill the Jews. However, he wears a mask when he asks for the King's permission, while offering money for the treasury but not revealing the identity of these dangerous people. In the end, Haman is unmasked by Esther when she tells the King of his plan to kill her people. Haman's true identity as a person of evil, filled with hate and arrogance, cannot stay hidden.

The very survival of the Jews depended on Esther's courage to unmask herself and her ability to unmask the evil Haman. The courage that we need to fight our enemy, COVID-19, however, demands that we remain masked. It is only when we wear our masks that we are most protective of ourselves and others. Esther's courage is a model for us to continue to be strong in our efforts, despite COVID fatigue, so that we can all get through this difficult time and celebrate conquering this virus.

It is notable that the book of Esther is the one book in the Bible where the name of God is omitted. Tradition ascribes the miraculous survival of the Jews to God, working behind the scenes, as it were. In his book, *Masking and Unmasking Ourselves: Interpreting Biblical Texts on Clothing & Identity*, Dr. Norman Cohen writes of this concealed presence of God: "... the Purim story demands that we come to recognize the Presence of the Divine through the ability to hear the hidden voice of God. The

redemptive paradigm of Esther is to see the camouflaged Divine in the darkness of our lives."

Purim, this holiday of light and hope, arrives during the heart of winter this year, as the world struggles to emerge from the darkness of the Coronavirus. By continuing to wear our masks and adhering to health and safety guidelines, by taking steps to protect life, we reveal that hidden Divine presence.

Please join us and add to the joy of our Purim celebration, as together we follow the yellow brick road to Oz.

My early memories of temple and religious school are a jumble of grape juice and glitter, observing the bimah from afar in a suburban Los Angeles sanctuary, seeing only

male clergy (assuming all

and getting dressed up for services (white gloves required). My brother attended a Reform summer camp and became Bar Mitzvah with the requisite blowout party; my siblings were confirmed; my sister was engaged in youth group folkdance. But my own Jewish education came to a crashing halt by age 12 when, following my father's death, my mother - embittered by the lack of support she received from the synagogue - separated from the temple.

Fast forward and, like many of you, I began to reexamine my Jewish connections when I had children. The rest is my Vassar Temple history. I learned everything – still

a drop in the Jewish bucket - as an adult.

I have spoken often about my temple involvement but haven't shared much about my Jewish education, or lack thereof. I struggled with feeling inadequately prepared to participate in temple leadership. This impression was corrected over time as I learned that I was hardly alone, that it was not a requirement, and to be comfortable participating in distinctively Jewish dialogue.

My first foray was a class with Rabbi Arnold covering wide-ranging topics. He suggested that we roll the Torahs for a periodic airing out. This was my first physical contact with the Torah. Understanding that it belonged to me too, being trusted to carry it, was emotional and empowering. I joined the adult Hebrew class, which morphed into an adult B'nai Mitzvah when I was 45. Most recently I became a regular at Torah study. I look forward to it for the learning, stimulation, and camaraderie as well as the unique break from the routine.

Vassar Temple has provided superb Adult Education over the years. Our Rabbis, including Rabbi Altman, have been incredible teachers. Talented members have given generously of their time and expertise to teach courses. We have a new Adult Ed team with a determination to see

our offerings reach more people, now more feasible thanks to virtual technology. The committee is aiming for a broad range of topics and interactive experiences. In addition to our regular Torah Study, and Talmud class with Rabbi Golomb, recent highlights include a review of Sacred Eating (eventually supporting a discussion of our Kashrut policy – this course was interrupted by COVID but we hope to complete it), "Back to the Sources" (about our sacred texts), and a racism reading group. Beginning on February 14, please join us for a Sunday afternoon virtual series featuring Rabbi Dr. Ariel Burger, a student of Elie Wiesel who was originally scheduled as scholar-in-residence for the 2020 Community Shabbaton.

Most of all, don't ever feel that you lack prerequisites; all are welcome to our great tradition of study, discussion, and debate where individual growth is honored. If you have ideas or would like to support this committee, please contact adulted@vassartemple.org.

Sisterhood Recipe Hamantaschen

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup softened butter (not margarine)
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 4 tablespoons orange juice or milk

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar in a separate larger bowl. Add egg and vanilla and beat well.

Add dry ingredients alternately with juice or milk to the butter and sugar mixture, mixing until well blended. The dough will seem a little soft (not like bread dough).

This dough freezes well and rolls out best when it's chilled.

Refrigerate or make ahead and leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight. Roll out dough on lightly floured surface to ¼ inch thick and cut circles out with a drinking glass. Fill with ½-1 teaspoon filling in center of circle. Shape into triangles.

To bake: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place filled hamantaschen on parchment paper or foil then on a cookie sheet 1-2 inches apart (they spread a little). Bake 12-15 minutes or until dough is cooked.

Makes about 6 dozen.

Brotherhood News


As you may know, a project to create and utilize a virtual document room has been ongoing at temple. Among the documents found was the Vassar Temple Men's Club Constitution, dated 10/31/78. The document begins; "With a view to enlisting the support of the men of American Jewry in the cause of Judaism, we do hereby band ourselves together and declare this to be our Constitution and By-laws." It goes on to say there shall be four officers and four more directors to form a Board. The rest of the by-laws are very simple and describe membership and basic operations.

When I accepted the position of Men's Club President, there was only one other paid member. While the men support the activities like erecting the Sukkah or cooking pasta dinner for Purim, it is not enough. Without the commitment to membership, we aren't reaching our potential as an effective arm of the temple, while providing comradery and mutual support. This what I hope that we can be. I would like to rejoin the MRJ Men of Reform Judaism, formerly the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods. This takes members and as of today, we have 3 paid members. Dues are \$36 for the year and checks should be made out to Vassar Temple Men's Club or to Vassar Temple with the notation Brotherhood Dues on the memo line.

I was persuaded to change our name to the Brotherhood but legally it remains Men's Club and Brotherhood is an acceptable alias. Now is the time to fill our board and to become more active or else we will go the way of many things in 2020. It is the time to "build back better". Who is ready to join me?

Book Club to Discuss *The Rent Collector* on February 17



Vassar Temple's Sisterhood Book Club will discuss award winning novel *The Rent Collector* by Camron Wright. Taking place in Cambodia, *The Rent Collector* has been described by critics as a story

of hope, of one women's journey to save her son, and another woman's chance at redemption.

Survival of Ki Lim and Sang Ly is a daily battle at Stung Meanchey, the largest municipal waste dump in Cambodia. They make their living scavenging recyclables from the trash. Life would be hard enough without the added worry for their chronically ill child, Nisay, and the expense of medicines that are not working. Just when things seem worst, Sang Ly learns a secret about the bad-tempered rent collector who comes demanding money – a secret that sets in motion a tide that will change the life of everyone it sweeps past.

Although a work of fiction, *The Rent Collector* was inspired by real people living at the Stung Meanchey dump in Cambodia. The book is available in paperback through Amazon as well as the local library system. The meeting will take place through Zoom, on Wednesday, February 17, at 2:00pm. Eisendrath Legislative Assistants Sought for the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism

The Legislative Assistant Program is a year-long fellowship for recent college graduates or individuals with equivalent academic and professional experience, who are interested in Judaism, social justice, and policy. Especially sought this year are applicants who come from underrepresented and marginalized backgrounds, including People of Color, people with disabilities, those coming from disadvantaged socioeconomic backgrounds, members of the LGBTQ+community, etc.

Legislative Assistants (LAs) have primary responsibility for monitoring legislation and ensuring that the voice of the Reform Movement's nearly 850 congregations, 2,000 rabbis, and 1.5 million Reform Jews is heard on Capitol

Hill. Each LA takes on a different policy portfolio, bringing a Reform Jewish perspective to the crucial social justice issues of the day, playing a key role developing strategy, drafting materials, and driving our work forward. They help guide our website, social media, and other communications. LAs may also have the opportunity to serve as the faculty of our weekend social justice seminars for high school students, assist congregations in bringing social justice closer to the forefront, and support the Commission on Social Action of Reform Judaism.

Base salary is \$36,000 and the program dates are August 24, 2021 - August 12, 2022. Applications are due Sunday, February 28.
