

From the Rabbi's Desk:

As one whose life has almost always revolved around an academic calendar, summer means freedom! As kid I was fortunate to

attend sleep-away camp and enjoy the freedom of that bubble. My rabbinic work in the congregation and while I was at HUC-JIR revolves around both the academic and Jewish calendars, where summer brings a lull in activity. For me summer is a time for disconnection and rejuvenation, as well as for doing the important work of reflecting upon the past year and planning for the year ahead.

Freedom will take on new meaning for many of us this summer. By the time you read this column, those who are vaccinated will, hopefully, have taken their first steps into the new normal; taking off their masks, connecting with friends and family, and venturing out for what used to be familiar activities such as dining in restaurants and attending sporting events and other forms of entertainment. It is odd how much of an adjustment it is to return to activities that were once part of our daily lives. After 15 months of quarantine, we will no longer take these freedoms for granted!

Thinking about this process of re-emerging reminds me of the story of Noah (after all, the ark is an apt metaphor for quarantine). Once the rains stopped, Noah needed to make sure that it was safe before emerging. He waited 40 days and then sent the raven in search of dry land. Noah waited some more and then sent the dove who returned but with no sign of a dry resting place. After another seven days, Noah sent the dove out again. This time she came back with an olive branch in her beak, indicating that the waters had receded. Still Noah waited. It wasn't until God told

Noah "Go out of the ark..." that Noah emerged.

Like Noah, we may be hesitant to leave our "arks." Even with signs that the waters of COVID have receded around us and it is safe for the vaccinated to emerge, there are still concerns. Nothing is 100% and it is incumbent upon us to proceed with caution, each at his or her own pace depending on one's personal situation. At the synagogue where we take responsibility for all who enter, we are proceeding with appropriate safeguards.

It has become quite clear that we will not know true freedom from this pandemic until more people are vaccinated and we get closer to the target for herd immunity. I hope that those who are able to get vaccinated but have hesitated for various reasons will see their way to doing so. It is an act of *pikuach nefesh* (saving a life) — yours and others.

Leaving the ark, stepping out of our isolation, can be frightening and takes some acclimating. Venturing out is important not only for our well-being, but for that of society at large to help rebuild the businesses that have suffered so. Even as many of us turn to summer for the respite it offers, for others summer is their busy season. Let us do what we can to make summer 2021 successful for them!

"Tzeh min hatev. Go out of the ark." May we each make our way out into the world safely to enjoy all that summer offers. May it be a time of healing and renewal from the challenges of this pandemic. We continue to pray for healing for those who are ill and for comfort and strength for those who mourn.

May we celebrate this Independence Day with a deeper appreciation for all of our freedoms.

President's Message:

Excerpted from remarks to the Annual Congregational Meeting

We should celebrate many, sometimes unexpected, successes this year while simultaneously acknowledging challenges that lie ahead.

We rose to the pandemic occasion, maintained operations – silver lining, added distant people – and kept everyone safe

and informed. After countless webinars, I can attest that we are on track or ahead of the curve. I can't adequately thank those who made it happen and all of you for caring for each other. I want to acknowledge our losses this year, some related to Covid. We learned to conduct Zoom funerals and *shivas*, maintained our connections, and were there for those in need.

Our talented faculty had a good year at our small but mighty school and implemented a new online curriculum. We have an incoming Kindergarten class!

We upped our administrative game thanks to our committed office staff. Please thank them.

Fundraising succeeded with the new Technology Fund, enabling our pivot to virtual engagement, and the High Holiday Appeal. May's online auction and paddle raise were new territory and resounding wins. We recognized the need to access a donor base outside of our membership, beginning with Hudson Valley Gives.

We initiated a culture of philanthropy and placed new importance on gratitude. I set a goal of contacting every member personally to thank you for your support. If you have not yet heard from me, you will.

We progressed with our electronic document room covering administration and governance as well as our story and values. We're preserving our history and preparing for competitive grants.

We're beginning to look at infrastructure upgrades, with donor support.

We recommitted to Jewish Federation with representation at the board and through the new presidents' group. Communication will help all of the temples. We'll house the new Jewish Community Preschool come September. We'll recoup costs, but not charge additional rent, to facilitate the school's existence after several years without this resource for young families.

We renewed engagement with the Interfaith Council. Rabbi is taking leadership with work on breaking down divides; I'm serving on the board to drive a new environmental team.

We are revitalizing committees, starting with Cemetery. I urge you to read the annual committee reports and consider your best fit.

Many successes. But this is not the Vassar Temple of one or five years, a decade, or 30-plus years ago when we joined. I've had numerous interactions with presidents of other synagogues. The challenges are the same everywhere: demographics, decreasing membership, young families not affiliating. Financial stress, closures and mergers.

Yet I believe in the potential of this community. We must rise to the occasion to meet the needs of our members and wider community creatively. It's crucial to be open to new approaches. The past year proves that we are nimble.

As cultural divisions become more frightening, we can serve anew as a moral compass, providing opportunities for individuals to express Jewish values through ritual and action.

We can build on what we were forced to begin by enhancing our virtual and digital presence to increase our profile, engagement and membership.

It is vital to revisit our financial strategy. Finance got next year's budget in place, but we need to think further out to enhance our investments and fundraising. This will require change and commitment across all components of the temple. It will mean openness to greater collaboration with Jewish community to share resources.

Our 175th anniversary will arrive in 2023. By the end of the 2021, we should have a team in place to plan not just a gala, but a year-long celebration of our history across every part of the organization.

Please make or renew your commitment to be an ambassador for Vassar Temple and to lend a hand in some new and different way. Because we need you, now more than ever before.

Congratulations to the Vassar Temple Lunch Box Team


Last month, Dutchess Outreach presented its Community Service Award to Vassar Temple and Mid-Hudson Islamic Association (MHIA). This extraordinary partnership with our friends at MHIA has grown stronger through the pandemic. We thank Banna Rubinow and Chris Baltus for representing Vassar Temple at the Award Ceremony held at the Family Partnership Center. Two years ago, we invited our friends at MHIA to join Vassar Temple's longstanding program of cooking for and serving nutritious meals to our hungry neighbors at Lunch Box. Before COVID, our communities were gathering monthly to plan, cook and serve meals together. There were teaching and learning opportunities with our respective groups through youth programs and religious schools. When the pandemic hit, we had to pivot quickly to address the ongoing and expanding issue of food insecurity and hunger in our community. Our communities wasted no time and agreed to not only continue our existing commitment, but to increase our dedication to providing two meals each month. In the early days of the pandemic, we were purchasing take-out restaurant meals that came from three area restaurants who provided meals at cost to help serve and support the clients at Lunch Box. We thank these restaurants: La Cabanita, Crown Chicken, and Gino's Pizzeria for their dedication and delicious food.

In the fall, Vassar Temple began Chili & Cornbread meals. For this effort, our members lovingly make homemade chili and cornbread that is stored in our freezer at Vassar Temple. Each month, we feed at least 80 individuals, and this chili meal has become a Lunch Box favorite. MHIA continues to provide monthly meals from Crown Chicken, and we support that meal with fruit donations from our communities. We thank our Vassar Temple members for their ongoing dedication.
