Judaism and the Mysteries of Life, Death and the World Beyond

March 25-26 on Zoom



Congregation Shir Chadash, Temple Beth El, and Vassar Temple invite the community to worship with us, and join in fascinating discussion of *The Mysteries of Life, Death and the World Beyond* with guest scholar Reb Simcha Raphael, Ph.D. The Shabbat evening service and program will be hosted by Vassar Temple on Friday, March 25 at 7:30pm on Zoom, and the Shabbat morning service and program will be hosted by Temple Beth El on Zoom Saturday, March 26 at 10am. The clergy of all three sponsoring congregations will be participating. A series of colorful graphics will be utilized to highlight the texts we will be studying with Reb Raphael.

Friday night, Reb Raphael will lead us in *Exploring Jewish Views of the Afterlife: Contemporary Perspectives.* Through study, story-telling and discussion, we'll enter the worlds of Kabbalah and Hasidism and discover what the Jewish mystics had to say about the journey of the soul after death. We'll also discover the practical connection between afterlife teachings and our contemporary Jewish death rituals.

On Saturday we will study *Jacob's Legacy: End-of-Life Wisdom for Our Times*. In the spirit of Torah study, we'll investigate deathbed narratives at the end of the Book of Genesis, which provide profound wisdom for dealing with end-of-life issues, and learn from Jacob and Joseph ways of dealing with the reality of death and mourning in this most challenging pandemic time.

Reb Simcha Raphael, founding director of the DA'AT Institute for Death Awareness, Advocacy and Training, was ordained by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, and is a Fellow of the Rabbis Without Borders Network. He has taught Religion at LaSalle and Temple Universities, and is the author of numerous publications. His website can be found at www.daatinstitute.net. From the Rabbi's Desk:

"Remember what Amalek did to you to on your journey ... how... he surprised you on the march, when you were famished and weary, and cut

down all the stragglers in the rear. Therefore... you shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget!" (Deut. 25:17-19)

We read this Torah passage on the Shabbat immediately preceding Purim as a reminder of the approaching holiday. What's the connection? Haman is a descendant of Amalek. When we boo Haman, it's as if we are blotting out the memory of Amalek.

I've always been puzzled by this Deuteronomy passage: how can we remember Amalek if we are to blot out his memory? The 15th century commentator, Don Isaac Abarbanel offers a helpful explanation: When you are scattered throughout the world in exile, you will have no opportunity to "remember what Amalek did to you... and blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven." But you must not forget to tell the story of what they did to you even if you have no physical power to blot out their memory.

As we approach this year's Purim celebration with memories of Colleyville still fresh in our hearts, we are reminded, yet again, of the insidious nature of antisemitism which we have yet to blot out.

According to the Secure Community Network, while Jews are just 2% of the US population, 60% of religiously-based hate crimes are against Jews. There are still too many people who carry the hatred against Jews expressed by Haman in a story written

over 2,500 years ago. When seeking the King's permission for his plan to annihilate the Jews, Haman offers a classic statement of antisemitism: "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your Majesty's interest to tolerate them." (Esther 3:8) This and 10,000 talents of silver convinces the king to agree. In this fantasy, Esther rises to defend her people, Haman is hanged on the gallows he built for Mordecai and the Jews are victorious in attacking tens of thousands of Persians.

Yes, we must continue to tell the stories of the Amaleks and the Hamans, to speak out against all acts of antisemitism, take steps to protect ourselves and strive to educate and build bridges of understanding. We also know that antisemitism never stands alone, that where antisemitism exists so do other forms of hatred and vice versa. It is only when good people stand united to combat the forces of hate that we will come nearer the day when the memory of Amalek will be blotted out.

We blot out the memory of Amalek by living proudly and joyfully as Jews. Please join us for this year's Purim festivities as we travel to a galaxy far, far away where, as with the Book of Esther, good conquers evil. Whether in person or on Zoom join in this one day of absolute fun and silliness—costumes do not have to be Star Wars, but extra points will be awarded!

Purim is still our fantasy, our hope that one day antisemitism will be no more and all forms of hate will be banished from our world. We hold onto the hope expressed in the Talmud that the time of the Messiah will be one of only joy, when "all the festivals will cease, but the days of Purim will not cease."

President's Message: A letter from January 16, 2022

Dear friends.

Today, 24 hours out from the frightening events in Colleyville, I want to share personal reactions. In our note to the

congregation we alluded to vulnerability being desirable for personal prayer, not for personal safety. At the risk of making myself vulnerable by sharing, I'm finally taking this opportunity to vent about what has gone on in our world since my term began. A recurring thought yesterday was just how incredibly tired I am of composing crisis messages to the membership. I also have to keep thanking all of you for the incredibly supportive responses that are sustaining me and us through the craziness.

With the news yesterday I began to hear from you, a tide of messages on every communication channel. It was important to count to ten and consider next steps carefully after the obvious one of reaching out to local law enforcement. Just because so many organizations were making statements of solidarity on social media did not mean that we had to follow suit; frankly I wasn't sure what good it would do considering that the situation was unresolved. After taking a breath I was able to recognize that, whether statements or inquiries, it all spoke to the need for reassurance that we were paying attention and double-checking our own precautions. I am indebted to our leadership team for setting aside everything else to help process and respond. We don't always agree on details, but we always come to the right consensus. Through every challenge, I have endeavored to make decisions this way to make sure that they do not reflect only my personal lens.

Many of you commented on similarities between Beth Israel and Vassar: a small, progressive Reform congregation, a caring community, an emphasis on social action, interfaith cooperation. On how it can happen anywhere. Yes. With each of these awful situations I've pictured it being Vassar Temple and have had to imagine how I would respond as President, whether inside or waiting outside. I like to think that I would find the strength to model bravery, resist evil, comfort others, project the right message. Bottom line, I have no idea if I'd be able to do so and feel fortunate not to have been tested. I do know with certainty that our leadership and community partners would be there for us, as we would for them.

Last night a few of us attended a hastily-planned URJ leadership vigil. With one hour's notice, over 1,000 clergy and lay leaders gathered on Zoom to amplify a single prayer. I have come to believe in the power of prayer as a means of connection to each other and to our shared heritage, regardless of personal content. The many extreme challenges we face make it more important than ever to build on the strength of our congregation and wider Jewish family. Whether it's prayer or other action that works for you, this can be your safe harbor.

We will continue to review our safety precautions, to increase them where appropriate, and to do what we do best: be the incredible community that is Vassar Temple.



Please bring a batch of dough (and your favorite rolling pin if you like). Remaining ingredients will be provided. Not able to come and help? Please make a batch of dough and leave it in the Temple freezer in a Ziploc bag during temple office hours Monday-Friday from 10am to 2pm—just let Judy know. In case we need to limit attendance or make any other changes, please let Judy know you plan on coming and/or making dough. Be sure to check your email as it gets closer for any updates.

Hamantaschen Dough Recipe

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter, softened*
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 4 tablespoons milk or orange juice

*Please use real butter—the pastries are superior, and all batches cook evenly regardless of dough source.

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar in separate larger bowl. Add egg and vanilla and beat well. Add dry ingredients alternating with juice to the butter and sugar mixture, mixing until well blended. The dough will seem a little soft (not like bread dough). Refrigerate. This dough freezes well and can be made ahead of Hamantaschen Baking Day. Leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight.

Urgent Need for Shelter Meals!

For many years, the local Jewish community and friends, under the wonderful volunteer leadership of our own Judy Harkavy, has provided a meal on the 4th Thursday of every month for the homeless staying at the overnight adult shelter run by Hudson River Housing. Currently, due to the pandemic, Judy drops off already-prepared food at the shelter, to be served by their staff. The number of homeless served each night has more than doubled, currently averaging about 130 guests. Hence many more volunteers are urgently needed right now to prepare menu items for the meal!

Usually the menu consists of a casserole, salad and bread. Each volunteer is generally asked to make either the hot dish or a salad, enough for 25 people. The food should preferably be dropped off at Judy's house, and she and a helper will transport it to the shelter, which currently consists of housing PODs located behind the Dutchess County Jail. If you can help even just once a year, please contact Judy at shelter@vassartemple.org to get more details and to be put on the schedule.

"Scouts, Trailblazers, Pathfinders, Explorers: A History of Women Rabbis"


Adult Education Course taught by Rabbi Altman on Zoom Every other Wednesday, March 23 through May 4 at 7:30pm

The year 2022 marks the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Sally J. Priesand, the first woman publicly ordained as a rabbi. Yet, her groundbreaking ordination, which opened the door for subsequent generations of women, was preceded by the impactful lives of other, lesser-known female scholars and community leaders. In commemoration and celebration of this auspicious anniversary, we are presenting a four-session adult education series which spotlights some significant women from the 1500's to the early modern period who held quasi-rabbinic status in their communities, compares and contrasts the ordinations of Rabbis Sally Priesand and Regina Jonas (Who? Come find out!), explores the challenges faced by the first generation of women in the rabbinate, and reflects on how women's leadership has changed both the rabbinate and the Jewish

community as a whole. We'll be utilizing a curriculum created by the Women's Rabbinic Network, integrating short video presentations. It is recommended, but not required, to attend all four sessions.
