

From the Rabbi's Desk:

We are in the midst of *Sephirat HaOmer* when we count the days between Passover and Shavuot. This counting tradition heightens our awareness of the passage of time as we mark each day that passes in anticipation of the moment of revelation. Marking the passage of time is not limited to traditions such as *Sephirat HaOmer*, however; it seems to be built into our psyche. Beyond celebrating birthdays and anniversaries annually, we tend to call special attention to "milestone" years.

It is not only individuals who celebrate milestone anniversaries; institutions and nations do as well. This year we are marking two significant milestone anniversaries that literally changed the course of Jewish history: the 100th anniversary of the first Bat Mitzvah and the 50th anniversary of the first woman to be ordained by a seminary.

Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan, the father of Reconstructionist Judaism, decided that his daughters should not be excluded from the privilege of bar mitzvah. Thus, on March 18, 1922, his eldest daughter, Judith, read Torah publicly at services. While she didn't read from a scroll or even ascend the bema, she did chant from a *chumash* in front of the congregation. By the 1950s, Bat Mitzvah had taken hold in liberal congregations, though the nature of that experience varied across the denominations. Today girls and boys are treated equally in this coming-of-age rite in all but Orthodox synagogues (and in the more liberal end of Orthodoxy, new opportunities are being created for girls).

Fifty years after Judith Kaplan became a Bat Mitzvah, Sally Priesand became the first woman ordained by a seminary. For nearly two thousand years, women were not allowed to be full participants in Jewish life. Limited to presiding over the home, with rare exception, women were closed off from the true places of power and leadership in the Jewish community: study and prayer.

When Judith Kaplan became Bat Mitzvah, she opened the doorway to Torah for women. When Sally Priesand was ordained by HUC-JIR, she opened the doorway to professional Jewish leadership for women. Thanks to their courage and that of other trailblazers, women have sought to reclaim their voices within Jewish tradition: reading our stories back into sacred texts; creating new rituals, such as welcoming our daughters into the covenant; reclaiming our heritage and language through study and adult Bat Mitzvah; reshaping the language of prayer to be more inclusive; assuming positions of leadership in the congregation at large, in addition to that of Sisterhood.

The dramatic changes that have taken place over the past 100 years are truly astounding. In liberal Judaism today it is unthinkable that girls should be treated any differently from boys. And since Sally Priesand was ordained, more than 1,500 women have been ordained across the Jewish world, including at a liberal Orthodox seminary. To be sure, the rabbinate is not so different from other professions in terms of advancement for women, wage gap and other forms of discrimination; there are mountains yet to climb, but there is so much to celebrate as we approach this milestone on June 3.

It is so exciting that we will have the opportunity to celebrate with and learn from Rabbi Priesand herself at the 2022 Fannie and Doris Berlin Lecture on Sunday, May 15. I hope that women AND men will attend. Participation in the adult education series leading up to her talk is absolutely NOT a pre-requisite! You are sure to be inspired by this remarkable woman, who simply wanted to be a rabbi and had the courage and determination to pursue her passion – and changed the course of Jewish history. President's Message

The New Vassar Temple Endowment: If Not Now, When?

At its March meeting, our Board formally established a new Vassar Temple Endowment. Simultaneously, it established a new Endowment

Committee which will be chaired by Martin Charwat, a long-time member who—among many other roles—served as congregational president. Martin's enthusiastic partner in this new initiative is Lou Lewis, also a long-time member with a great deal of fundraising experience. I interviewed Martin to capture essential information about this work.

What is the new endowment?

Our mission is to promote fundraising goals to members, and others, to achieve short- and long-term financial stability by the creation of a reserve fund for such purposes as the Board may direct. The endowment differs from fundraising, which manages one-time and cyclical events to support our current budget. It isn't a discrete event or temporary campaign; it is a permanent, sustained effort which begins with educating our members about its importance to our future. The fund will be invested, with the income managed carefully to support operations, including the opportunity to assist members who have difficulty paying dues in a way that retains their dignity.

Why is it important?

Vassar Temple has been a spiritual home for Reform Jews in the Hudson Valley for nearly 175 years. It has nourished generations of residents for whom Judaism was important or essential in their lives. As we look forward to what lies in store for Jewish life in America and our community, we should ask ourselves: "What if our founders had decided that they had more important things to do with their time and money? What if those who followed them had not supported the Temple and made it a home for themselves, their families, and us?" It is up to us to rise to the challenge and build on this legacy. If not us, who?

When will the campaign start?

We'll begin one-on-one conversations this spring. We've been planning for some time, but our desire to speak with potential donors face-to-face was stymied by the pandemic. We've also decided that the Temple's approaching 175th anniversary celebration could not be a more perfect time for this effort.

How will it be structured?

We'll suggest giving levels honoring the 175th anniversary. Of course, donations of other amounts will be welcome. We hope that everyone will support this effort at whatever level they are able. Pledges will occur over a five-year period. The fund will be invested in accordance with the Temple's new Investment Policy for long-term growth, but kept separate from existing monies in order to track financial milestones that will allow proceeds to be used.

What else is important to know?

The Committee and Temple leadership recognize that we make multiple asks of our members, and that they need the opportunity to consider a range of giving opportunities in order to decide what is the best fit. We also support efforts to extend fundraising to new avenues outside of the membership.

We are infinitely grateful for Martin, Lou, and the Committee's willingness to take on this crucially important endeavor. Thank you to all of them for saying "Hineni", "Here I am."

CROP WALK REPORT

YAY, US! Thanks to your support, our 2021 Dutchess Interfaith CROPWalk had 39 teams of walkers and raised approximately \$57,100 to combat hunger locally and globally. We came in 13th in the nation, third in the Northeast, and second in NYS (only behind Albany, which we all know is much bigger than us!) 25% of the proceeds from the walk help support seven meal sites or food pantries located throughout Dutchess County. Globally the funds help farmers access resources, dig wells, and learn new ideas to

improve their yields. CWS is also involved in disaster relief. And in an unprecedented decision, proceeds from all the walks held this spring will be dedicated to assist the people of Ukraine.



Our next local walk will be held in October, 2022, and while we plan to

return to having a big community walk, we'll encourage satellite walks as well. The local planning committee is made up of a wonderful group of dedicated volunteers from various houses of worship, and they are in desperate need of more volunteers to join them, especially (but certainly not limited to) the tech savvy. Please help the U.N., CROP, and other major NGOs fulfill their pledge to end world hunger by 2030! It has been my privilege and pleasure to have been a member of the Dutchess Interfaith CROPWalk Committee for quite a few years, and if you are interested, I would love to hear from you and answer any questions about the work we do.
