Israel Shabbat Service Israel at 75: A Milestone with Mixed Emotions Friday, April 21 at 7:30pm

Seventy-five years ago, the State of Israel was founded. Born out of the ashes of the Holocaust, fulfilling a two-thousand-year-old dream, the new State held great promise for the Jewish people. Immediately, Israel was attacked on all sides. Multiple wars and eruptions of violence have followed, while peace treaties and alliances have been formed with some of her Arab neighbors. Israel literally made the desert bloom and has built a thriving democracy, a literal "start-up nation," leading the world in technology and scientific discoveries. A safe haven for Jews worldwide, Israel airlifted Jews from Yemen and Ethiopia and welcomed thousands from the former Soviet Union.

At the same time, the challenges this still young nation faces are overwhelming. For more than half a century now, the horrific situation for Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza remains unresolved; hopes that were so high after Oslo for peace have been dashed time and again, support for a two-state solution, for two peoples finding a way to live in peace and security, has all but vanished.

Our Reform movement has planted deep roots with more than 50 synagogues and communities throughout the country, yet we continue to fight for recognition and equal treatment by the government. A negotiated agreement to guarantee full equal access to the Western Wall as a sacred site for ALL of the Jewish people has yet to be implemented.

Following the most recent election, Prime Minister Netanyahu has formed the most right-wing government in Israel's 75-year history, bringing its very democracy into question. Advocates for increased Jewish settlement in the West Bank, and a further diminution of rights for Palestinians, now hold positions of power in the government. Open homophobes and anti-pluralists have the power to control many areas governing Israeli society.

As we reach this milestone anniversary, what should be a time of great joy and celebration, our hearts are torn.



There is so much in Israel of which we can be proud; yet the current leadership and proposed changes to Israeli law that will impact so much of Israeli society—including our sister congregations—are cause for great concern.

Rabbi Lisa D. Grant, PhD will help us navigate this mix of emotions as our guest speaker as we mark *Yom Ha'Atzmaut*, Israel Independence Day (5 Iyar, April 26) on Israel Shabbat, Friday, April 21 at 7:30pm. Rabbi Grant is the New York Rabbinical School Program Director, Eleanor Sinsheimer Distinguished Service Professor in Jewish Education and Coordinator of Special Seminary Projects at the Hebrew Union College—Jewish Institute of Religion. A primary area of her research and teaching is the place of Israel in American Jewish life. The service will have an Israel focus in our prayers and songs.

From the Rabbi's Desk:



I'm writing this column having just returned from Israel, where I spent eight days in intense programming, first with the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR), then with the Women's Rabbinic Network (WRN). As an expression of its support for Israel, the CCAR holds its annual convention there every seven years. This was no typical convention, sitting in meetings rooms for hours on end. Rather, we participated in a variety of field trips to experience

first-hand the challenges and accomplishments of current life in Israel. I visited Lod, a mixed Jewish-Arab city, one of the poorest in the country, and site of riots in May 2021. I traveled to Sderot and nearby kibbutzim and was inspired by the resilience of their residents living eight kilometers from Gaza where, despite rocket attacks, (of which there were three in the early hours of that morning), life continues and the mayor of the regional council has received initial government funding for a project that will employ Gazans to try to improve their lives. We met with political leaders, including Labor party Knesset member Reform Rabbi Gilad Kariv, for conversations about the current political situation, especially, the legislative attempt to overhaul the



Supreme Court, taking away an essential check to executive and legislative powers. On Saturday night we joined 160,000 Israelis in protest in Tel Aviv, where Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the Union for Reform Judaism, was the first non-Israeli to speak at a rally.

On Rosh Chodesh Adar, we

participated with Women of the Wall in their monthly service of protest for equal access, where we were heckled, spat upon and, in some cases, shoved by those who view our worship as a desecration.

The Reform movement has made great strides in Israel,

now with 54 synagogues and communities, introducing native Israelis to an alternative expression of Jewish religious life. Two years ago, we won a 30-year battle in the Israeli Supreme Court for partial recognition of our conversions, which have attracted thousands over the years. Agreements of the current government will undermine our movement's work, not only cutting back on the less-than-equal funding our synagogues receive from the government, but impacting the important work the Israeli Movement for Progressive Judaism (IMPJ) spearheads in areas of civil rights, support for immigrants, pluralistic Jewish education in public schools, women's rights and LGBTQ rights.

In his remarks at the rally, Rabbi Jacobs promised that we, North American Reform Jews, will continue to stand with Israel, that we are family and we will not turn our backs. How can you help our Reform movement in Israel? Here are some ways:

President's Message:

February 25, 2023 was advertised by many as a Day of Hate, with Jewish houses of worship being clearly targeted as sites to disperse anti-Semitic flyers and propaganda. It was in the news and trending on multiple social media sites for weeks ahead of this day. Many were horrified. Many were scared. Many wanted to believe it just wasn't so, but were

planning on being careful just the same.

Our local law enforcement took this very seriously. They increased patrols the day before, the day of, and the day after. They assured us they had our backs. Many community and political leaders, both Jewish and non-Jewish stood side-by-side to denounce this disgusting show of intolerance.

I have to confess that I had very mixed feelings on how to handle this day as it approached. There was a piece of me that wanted to cancel all Temple activities that day and to stay as clear and far away from our Temple building as possible. I wanted to not antagonize anyone and I wanted to be safe. There was also a piece of me that wanted to camp out on our Temple front lawn all day and hold a large crowd-drawing, very visible event; communicating our strength as a congregation.


In consultation with our leadership, we chose to have our scheduled Torah study that day remote only. This was a conscious attempt at maintaining the safety of our congregants on a day that honestly made me act somewhat out of fear. I saw later that evening on the news that some congregations like Temple Emanu-El in NYC, stood literally out in front of their building and

openly had programs and services for all to see. I was honestly envious of the strength and conviction of that leadership and their congregants. When I saw them singing in unity, openly in front of their building, I felt like I had failed our congregation in my leadership or lack thereof. I thought that if I was a stronger leader, I would have insisted on changing nothing that we typically do on Shabbat. I would have said, "This is who we are and this is what we do! We will not be intimidated by the likes of you!" Hindsight... Would have, should have, could have...

I will never apologize for taking the health and well-being of our congregation seriously and ultimately putting your safety needs first. We live in a world where we have to balance being loud and proud with being careful and vigilant. I honestly hate that we actually have to do this, but as I've said to my grown children on numerous occasions, "Adulting is hard."

I want to share that as well as our law enforcement, there were individual Temple members who did drive by our Temple that day and reported to me that all was ok. Our front doorway camera was checked periodically by members for anything out of the ordinary. I see and respect the humanity, dedication and leadership of our congregants and our community and I promise you that I will continue to work proudly side-by-side in safety and strength, ever in pursuit of just the right balance.

units include learning about Passover and about Yom Ha'Atzmaut.

Lunch Box

Dutchess Outreach is continuing to see an increase in the number of people receiving free meals at the Lunch Box. Over the past few months, over 200 weekday meals have been served and over 150 meals on the weekend (up from less than 100 a year ago).

Vassar Temple is currently making a chili meal serving over 200 people on the first Sunday of every month. Congregants have provided the ingredients and volunteers from the Temple have both prepared the meal at the Dutchess Outreach kitchen and have distributed that meal. Thank you to all Temple members who have taken the time on these Sundays to do this. And thank you to members of the Mid-Hudson Islamic Association who have, every month, helped us with this important project.

Here are specific ways for you to help:

- Purchase a small portion of the ingredients needed for the meal. Buy extra ground turkey and/or canned beans and bring them to the Temple (turkey goes in the freezer; the canned beans should be placed in a marked box on the counter). Every month we need 30 pounds of turkey and 30 pounds of canned beans to make our chili meal.
- Volunteer on the first Sunday of the month to either prepare the meal (a 1-1/2-hour commitment) or distribute the meal (a 2-hour commitment).
- Make financial contributions to the Temple earmarked for the Lunch Box program so that other ingredients (onions, peppers, tomato paste, etc.) can be purchased.

Climate Corner ~ April update from our Dayenu Circle

Celebrate Earth Day (April 22) and Month by asking your state legislators to support two important pieces of legislation.

Ask your Senator to support the Home Energy Affordable Transition Act (HEAT) (Senate Bill S2016). Burning natural gas is a major source of greenhouse gas emissions. NYS must reduce the role of natural gas in providing energy. Currently, the Public Service Law requires and subsidizes the continued expansion of natural gas infrastructure. The HEAT Act would change New York law to help reduce natural gas infrastructure in an orderly, affordable, and just manner.

Ask both your Senator and Assembly Member to support the All-Electric Building Act (AEBA) (Senate Bill S562-A, Assembly Bill A920-A). The use of fossil fuels in buildings accounts for one-third of NYS greenhouse gas emissions and is a leading cause of air pollution, resulting in increased childhood asthma, heart disease, and other negative outcomes. The majority of NYS electricity already comes from zero-emission sources, and the State has committed to continue increases. The AEBA will prohibit new construction from using fossil fuel power on a gradual basis. The grid can support the additional capacity. Electric buildings have less impact on demand in the summer and more impact in the winter, due to the current role of fossil fuels in heating. NYS has the time and resources to continue expanding electricity generation to accommodate this change. AEBA also commits the State to ensure that electricity does not exceed 6% of a residential customer's income. Currently incentives make low-carbon buildings financially competitive for developers. Prices will continue to fall as new technologies become more common. Electrification of heating and hot water systems has one of the largest projected impacts on greenhouse gas emissions, even more than that of moving toward electric vehicles.



Book Club to Discuss "The Poisoner's Handbook"

Vassar Temple Sisterhood's Book Club will discuss "The Poisoner's Handbook" by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Deborah Blum. The book has been described by critics as a fascinating Jazz Age tale of chemistry, detection, poison, and murder. In early 20th century New York, poisons offered an easy path to the perfect crime. The author explores how scientists Charles Norris and Alexander Gettler laid the foundation for the modern field of forensic science. They set the justice system on fire with their trailblazing scientific detective work, becoming the pioneers of forensic chemistry.



The "Poisoner's Handbook," equal parts true crime, twentieth-century history, and science thriller, is available in paperback through local book stores, as well as in various formats through the library system. 
Easy Festive Chicken & Rice

This recipe was submitted by Amy Horn Oclatis, who originally obtained it from Helen Klein, of blessed memory, long-time Vassar Temple and Sisterhood member some years ago. She described it as "A wonderful combination. The family will love it, and so will your guests. Can be doubled or tripled easily."

Ingredients

1 6 ¼-ounce package fast-cooking long grain and wild rice mix with herbs and seasonings

- 1 3-pound chicken, cut into serving size pieces
- 1 16-ounce can whole-berry cranberry sauce
- 3 Tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 Tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced almonds



Directions

- Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.
- Sprinkle rice in buttered 13" x 9" oven-proof casserole.
- Spread package of seasonings over rice.
- Arrange chicken, skin side up, on top.
- In a saucepan, combine cranberry sauce, butter, soy sauce, and lemon juice. Heat, stirring until melted.
- Pour over chicken.
- Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes.
- Uncover, sprinkle with almonds, and bake 10 minutes more.
- The casserole will keep warm for 30 minutes.

We have a significant amount of Temple materials (particularly obsolete prayer books) that will be buried, with space for member needs as feasible.
