

From the Rabbi's Desk:



The cold, dark days of winter are bookmarked in Jewish tradition by two holidays that bring light and joy: Hanukkah and Purim. Hanukkah adds light as we descend into the darkest, shortest days of the year and Purim, with its feasting, drinking and raucous behavior, brings winter to an end with a bang! At first glance, the two holidays seem

completely disconnected, but there are, in fact, many common threads that bind them together even as both serve to lift our spirits through the doldrums of winter.

Both of these holidays are of later biblical origin and were initiated by people (Judah Maccabee and Mordecai) as opposed to being ordained in Torah. Both holidays involve gift giving: *Shalach Manot*, the sending of gifts to one another, is one of the three required observances of the holiday. Hanukkah gifts originated with gelt, chocolate or real coins, which may have been given to children in remembrance of the Maccabees minting their own coins and are often used to play dreidel.

As minor holidays, both are normal workdays and share a common addition to the daily liturgy: the AI Hanissim, a prayer thanking God for the miracle of the Jews' deliverance. In neither case is God an active player in the story, however. The miraculous victory of the Jews is due to human agency, though God is assumed to be "behind the scenes."

Hanukkah celebrates the victory of the Maccabees who dared to defy the Assyrians and who broke ranks with the traditionalists, defending themselves on Shabbat, surprising the great Assyrian army and overpowering them. The miraculous victory of the Jews against the evil Haman is hardly a miracle at all; the Purim story is aspirational, a fictional expression of the deepest hopes of a people living

under foreign rule, with no basis in history. Within the story, however, the victory is attributed to Esther's courage and ingenuity in gaining the king's support and trapping the evil Haman.

Biblical scholars disagree as to the dating of the Book of Esther. One school of thought is that it was written at the time of the Maccabees to inspire hope among the Jews in their battle against the Assyrians, thus tying to the two holidays more closely together.

Hanukkah and Purim both tell stories of good conquering evil, Jews acting to defeat antisemites: Antiochus wanted to wipe out Judaism; Haman wanted to wipe out Jews. While Haman was defeated, unfortunately his words to King Ahasuerus have continued to resound throughout the ages: "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all of the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your Majesty's interest to tolerate them." (Esther 3:8)

Sadly, antisemitism has reared its ugly head again in the hate that is manifesting itself in attacks against Jews and others who are perceived of as "different" in our country. Like the Maccabees and Esther, we must rise to defend ourselves—not by violence, but by speaking out wherever we see hate, by joining with allies, by educating and building bridges of understanding, by living proudly as Jews.

Each year as winter approaches, we kindle lights against the darkness. And we celebrate the end of the dark days with a fantasy holiday that envisions a time of great joy when hate will truly be defeated. The rabbis taught that when the Messiah arrives, the only holiday celebrated will be Purim—a time of pure joy. Let us continue to kindle lights of hope and act to bring this day about. *Chag Purim Sameach!*

I am well aware that waving to cars is just his thing, his routine. It's what he does. It's such a simple, friendly and anonymous act that while on the surface, seems insignificant, is truly so much more. This small act has a ripple effect. His good mood puts me in a good mood and I know these days I am inclined to share my good mood with others. I'd like to hope that it doesn't stop there, but that random acts of kindness just keep building from person to person all day long.

There is a small stretch of road in Livingston or Greenport - near Hudson, that I encounter my man walking on the shoulder, nearly every morning, rain or shine. I can tell he is older by the gray hair and the

gray hair and the way his back is a bit hunched over as he walks. He has nothing to aid him; no walker or cane, just his own strong legs. He walks at a very good clip and waves at every single vehicle that passes him. This is not just a half-hearted, sort of extend-the-arm-in-the-air wave. This is a very enthusiastic, full-on-energy, "I love life" kind of a wave. He does this to every car that passes him by, in either direction.

I look forward to seeing him each morning on my drive to work. His enthusiasm for life and his gift of hello, quite honestly makes my morning. After seeing

their car. Some can be larger, like paying for the groceries of someone behind you in the grocery store. Welcome to Climate Corner, a monthly update from our Dayenu Circle

In keeping with our commitment to the NYS Religious Action Center's Climate Covenant, we will advocate for two bills in the current legislative session in Albany: the "All Electric Buildings Act" (prohibits the use of emitting fuels in new construction) and the "Gas Transition and Affordable Energy Act" (gives NYS government the power to gradually transition our energy systems off natural gas). Both bills would make a substantial impact on the state's green transition without negatively impacting underserved communities. Both offer the opportunity to strengthen our relationships with allies who are making these bills a priority. And, both need a push over the legislative finish line, since they face opposition from well-funded special interest groups that are resisting the energy transition. Despite support from many state leaders (including the governor), they will not be passed without significant support. Advocacy from faith-based organizations contrasts with traditional climate groups and helps to demonstrate a wider coalition. Watch your temple publicity for more information about how you can support these efforts.

We are also planning a community "decarbonizer" workshop to help you make changes at home (learn about solar, electric vehicles, and heat pumps from those who have taken the plunge). Finally, contact us to be on Vassar Temple's building Green Team. We are at dayenu@vassartemple.org.

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: The Esterito Mojito

Ingredients

- 1 ½ fluid ounces white rum (can use ginger ale or flavored sparkling water for non-alcoholic drink)
- 12-15 mint leaves
- 1/2 lime
- ¾ ounce simple syrup
- Club soda
- · Sprig of mint

Directions

- Add the mint leaves, the juice of half a lime and simple syrup to a highball glass
- · Muddle the ingredients in the glass
- Fill the glass halfway with ice, add rum, and stir
- · Fill the rest of the glass with ice, top with club soda, garnish with spring of mint and stir
