From the Rabbi's Desk:



Music is central to Jewish culture, especially to worship. Since the days when the Temple stood in Jerusalem and the Levites sang the psalms and played instruments, music has elevated the spirit and enriched Jewish prayer. Song gives us hope in times of darkness and increases our joy in moments of celebration.

Of the many joys of being back to in-person

worship, prime among them is our ability to sing together once again. It is with the power of song that we will return to an in-person Community Shabbaton later this month, May 19-20, in partnership with Congregation Shir Chadash and Temple Beth-El. We are thrilled that Noah Aronson, one of the leading composers of contemporary Jewish music today, will be our composer-in-residence.

The Shabbaton will be an extraordinary opportunity for our three congregations to be exposed to new Jewish music. While we often think of certain settings of prayers as having "come from Sinai," in truth Jewish liturgical music has always been very fluid as composers, influenced by music trends of their times, bring those influences into their compositions for prayers. Through maintaining a balance between traditional and new settings, Jewish worship has remained vibrant and relevant across the centuries.

Noah Aronson is among those musicians who are changing the landscape of Jewish music. Many of his pieces have been integrated into worship services in progressive synagogues across the country, including ours. His beautiful setting for *Let There Be Love*, an interpretation of the *Hashkivenu* prayer written by the late Rabbi Chaim Stern, is a mainstay of our Shabbat worship experience. A graduate of the Berklee College of Music, Noah has released four full-length solo albums of his own Jewish music and has embarked upon numerous creative projects, partnering with communities across the country to create new songs. In addition to performing at congregations throughout North America and abroad, Noah pursues his love of teaching by serving on the faculty of HUC-JIR's Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music and at music, ritual and worship conferences. A most exciting element of the Shabbaton will be the participation of a choir composed of members of the three congregations. Cantor Goldmann and Joe Bertolozzi have been rehearsing with the choir who will be privileged to perform Noah's music under his direction.

Noah will enrich our worship through his participation in both Friday evening and Saturday morning services and will then offer a concert Saturday night, one that will be participatory in nature with both choir and audience joining in. As is our custom, each service will include the participation of clergy from the three congregations. We will host the service Friday night which will feature the choir; Temple Beth-El will host Shabbat morning services, to be followed by a kiddush lunch and a "song circle" led by Noah; and Congregation Shir Chadash will host the concert that will conclude with Havdalah and refreshments.

Planning for this Shabbaton actually began about three years ago and was originally scheduled for March, 2021. As with so many events of the "COVID era," however, safety concerns forced its postponement until this spring. Thus, it is with real excitement and anticipation that we look forward to this Shabbaton coming to fruition in a few weeks.

Please see the front-page article and announcements in the weekly for details about each of the events. I hope that you will join Cantor Goldmann and me for what will certainly be an uplifting and joyful Shabbat in song with a gifted composer and musician.

President's Message:

Keshet is a Hebrew word meaning both "rainbow," a symbol of LGBTQ pride, and "bow," an instrument for action. It is also a national organization that works for LGBTQ equality in all facets of Jewish life. Keshet equips Jewish organizations with the skills and knowledge to build LGBTQ-affirming communities, creating spaces in which all queer Jewish youth feel seen

and valued; and advances LGBTQ rights nationwide.

Being seen and valued seems like something that is simple, natural and accepted. In the LGBTQ community, unfortunately, this is often not the case. This community is often ignored, bullied or marginalized in both subtle and not-so-subtle ways. Keshet has developed the leadership of LGBTQ Jewish teens and trained Jewish educators to prevent anti-LGBTQ bullying and celebrate LGBTQ identity as well as mobilizing Jewish communities to protect marriage equality and transgender rights.

Keshet is an amazing organization that envisions a world in which all LGBTQ Jews and families can live with full equity, justice, and dignity. The URJ, JGN (the Jewish Grandparents Network) and Keshet share a commitment to an inclusive Jewish community that reflects and affirms marginalized identities.

We at Vassar Temple have an LGBTQ Safe Zone sign (marketed by Keshet) out in front of our building and on our front door. We like to think this makes all people feel welcome, acknowledged and safe. I am not always sure that it does. I believe we need to feel a bit more comfortable as a congregation and as individuals as to what this means and entails. In order for us to exude the feeling of "Audacious Hospitality" (Reform Jewish movement's focused effort on Racial Equality, Diversity and Inclusion) I

believe we need to educate and familiarize ourselves with some of the terminology and issues surrounding LGBTQ members of our community.

Some of us are comfortable with correct terminology, gender identity and use of preferred pronouns. Many in our congregation and of a certain generation are not. I am a firm believer in the adage "Without knowledge, action is useless, and knowledge without action is futile." - Abu Bakr. Knowledge is a tool and the more comfortable we are in using these tools, the more authentic we can be in participating in Audacious Hospitality and truly welcoming members of the LGBTQ community into our congregation.

Every year, during the month of June, Pride month is celebrated by the LGBTQ community and beyond. June was chosen because it is when the Stonewall Riots took place back in 1969. And while we have certainly come a long way since the riots of 1969, it is imperative that we continue to do what we can to raise awareness, improve attitudes of society and encourage inclusiveness in our own congregation. Friday, June 2 at 7:30, Vassar Temple will celebrate Pride Month with a Pride Shabbat. Wear your Rainbow colors. Learn something new. Imbibe yourself with inspirational words and stories of those who continue to pave the way for better understanding and acceptance of those who feel misunderstood and marginalized.

Welcome to the new Religious School Director: Rabbi Hantman



We are so very pleased to welcome back Rabbi Shoshana Hantman as our Religious School Director. Rabbi Hantman served in this capacity at Vassar Temple from 2009-2011 and left to pursue full-time work and to write. She received her B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania, her M.Ed. from Temple University, and rabbinical ordination by the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. She founded the independent Halutsim Hebrew School in 1992. In 2014 she published the award-winning "Passover Parodies: Short Plays for the Seder Table;" this was followed by "Choose Your Path" and "Hanukkah Parodies." Her career has included a decade in the pulpit and over thirty years as a Jewish educator. She lives in northern Westchester County with her husband, Richard Weill, and their children Mollie and Isaac.

Rabbi Hantman stepped into her role here immediately following Spring break. As Religious School Director, Rabbi Hantman will oversee that program on Sunday mornings while Rabbi Altman will

continue to oversee the mid-week Hebrew program.

Rabbi Hantman has very fond memories of her years at Vassar Temple and is excited to return to us and we look forward to her leadership, her creativity and all that she will bring to our teachers and students.


Your Pledge to the Vassar Temple Endowment Will be a Game Changer



. SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Moroccan Eggplant with Garbanzo Beans This recipe is from Vassar Temple member Marcia Tanzman

Ingredients

- 1 large onion, cut in half and sliced thin
- 5 medium cloves garlic, pressed
- 1 medium red bell pepper, cut in 1-inch squares
- 1 medium eggplant, cut into 1-inch pieces
- pinch of red pepper flakes
- 2 teaspoons turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon garam masala
- 2 cups or 1 15 oz can garbanzo beans (BPA Free)
- 1 15 oz can lentils, drained
- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- 1-1/4 cups + 1 tablespoon vegetable broth
- 1/2 cup raisins or currants
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro
- salt and black pepper to taste

Directions

- Slice onion and press garlic.
- Heat 1 tablespoon broth in a 10–12-inch skillet.
- Sauté onion in broth over medium heat for 5 minutes, stirring frequently.
- Add garlic, red bell pepper, eggplant, garam masala, and turmeric. Stir to mix well for a minute and add broth and tomato sauce. Stir again to mix, cover, and cook over medium low heat for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally, or until peppers and eggplant are tender.
- Add garbanzo beans, lentils, red chili flakes, and raisins (or currants). Simmer for another 5 minutes.

- Season with salt and pepper.
- Top with chopped cilantro.
