From the Rabbi's Desk:



I know that I'm really on vacation when I have to ask, "What day is today?" Losing track of time, breaking out of the structures of my daily routine, is a sign for me of real relaxation. The one marker of time to which I always look forward, however, is Shabbat.

Shabbat was one of earliest means of marking time and, even more important, as Heschel taught, of making time holy. Shabbat is not the

only way in which Judaism marks the passage of time. We celebrate the beginning of each new month with Rosh Hodesh and the festivals note the seasons. And, of course, it is the New Year that we will mark with the greatest fanfare in just a few weeks.

The start of a new year is so significant in Judaism that its essence cannot be contained in one day of celebration; rather, we take ten days to inaugurate the year. We mark the passage of a year with a period of deep introspection. The traditions of the holy days urge us to undergo a process of *heshbon hanefesh*, an accounting of our souls, an annual exploration of who we are, who we have been and who we want to be. We take these ten days to pause, think about the past, reflect especially on the year that has drawn to an end, and consider what we did well, where we missed the mark and what we can do better.

The Ten Days of Repentance are, in fact, a time of transition, helping us shift from considering the past to looking ahead toward the promise of the new year. The image of the Divine opening the Book of Life and writing our names for blessing, we pray, calls us to focus our attention forward. The *Unetanatokef* with its haunting, powerful imagery, reminds us that through our actions we can affect our destiny, even if not all that impacts our lives is in our control.

During 5784 we will be marking time in a most special way as we celebrate the 175th anniversary of the founding of Vassar Temple. A planning committee is overseeing the numerous ways in which we will mark this special anniversary throughout the year ahead. We will have many opportunities to reflect upon the grand history of this congregation and all that has evolved since five men had a vision to build a synagogue in Poughkeepsie. Just as we, as individuals, reflect upon our pasts while looking ahead towards our futures, I hope that we, Vassar Temple, will also use this celebratory year to think forward, to envision what we hope to celebrate at our 200th anniversary and beyond.

This year we are initiating a new program of reflection during the Yom Kippur afternoon service: "Sharing our Jewish Journeys." Three members of the congregation, Fredrica (Fritzi) Goodman, Howard Susser and Melissa Wall, will speak about the role that Judaism has played and plays in their lives. They have each been on very different paths, each one expressing their Judaism in different ways. It is our hope that their stories will inspire others to consider their own "Jewish Journey" as part of their introspection at this season. Please join us!

A leap year in Hebrew is called "shanah meuberet", literally, a pregnant year. In so many ways, every year is a "pregnant year," pregnant with new possibilities, with hope. May 5784 be a year of new possibilities and blessings for Vassar Temple and for you and your loved ones. L'shanah Tovah Tikateivu!

It's hard to believe that it's that time of year already. Even though I write this in the middle of summer (a necessity for meeting the print deadline and accommodating my vacation), the Jewish New Year and, what

seems like back-to-back holidays are around the corner. It feels like a full circle moment. Didn't I just write about High Holidays preparation? Didn't I just update our Temple High Holiday Information packet? It sure feels like it, even though that was a full year ago. Time marches on and ahead, but it often feels like it goes in circles. Sometimes I feel comforted by the circle: "Here we are again" and "This is familiar." Other times, the circle of life feels like a merry-go-round gone wrong, making me dizzy, and I desperately would like to get off.

The Circle of Life as a philosophical concept has us starting at the end and ending at the beginning. Our lives, from beginning to end, resemble a full circle. No matter how big or small the circle, it ends the same way for everyone.

In Jewish tradition, a bride often circles a groom several times, symbolizing the creation of a new family circle.

On Simchat Torah, there is an opportunity for a Circular Hakafot (taking the Torah scrolls out of the ark and encircling the reader and sanctuary with dancing, singing and joy) as a symbol of unity and communal cooperation.

Even at the High Holidays we recognize the circle, in the round challahs we bake and consume. These round challahs symbolize the circle of life and hope that our new year continues to give us sweetness and blessings without interruption throughout the upcoming year.

So I guess it's best to embrace these circles and continue moving along and forward.

I will close this message by quoting the refrain of Joni Mitchell's song the *Circle Game*, because who doesn't love Joni Mitchell?



And the seasons, they go round and round

And the painted ponies go up and down

We're captive on the carousel of time

We can't return, we can only look

Behind, from where we came

And go round and round, in the circle game

From our family to yours, I wish you Shanah Tovah and Chag Sameach!

4pm: The Afternoon Service will focus on the Torah reading (Holiness Code) and Haftarah (Jonah) and will include a program called "Exploring Jewish Journeys."

Come one, Come all! Celebrate our fall harvest festival with a family friendly service at 6pm. Everyone will have the opportunity to fulfill the mitzvot of waving the lulav and "dwelling" in the Sukkah immediately following the service. Then enjoy a "Bring Your Own" dinner in the sukkah (in case of inclement weather, we will eat indoors). Drinks and dessert will be provided.



Sukkot/Shabbat Morning Service, Saturday, September 30 at 10:15am

Following the 9am Torah Study, when we will study the special portions for Sukkot, we'll hold a short Sukkot morning service in the East Chapel (and on Zoom) beginning at 10:15am.

Tashlich at Sunset Lake ~ Saturday, September 16

For many generations, Jewish communities have gathered at bodies of water on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and recited the *Tashlich* prayer to symbolize our wish to rid ourselves of our sins and errors, and to be forgiven by God. *Tashlich* has now become an increasingly popular and meaningful Jewish practice for people of all ages, enabling them to feel that they're starting out the new year with a clean slate. As part of our own High Holy Day observances, we will be able to "cast our sins" (in the form of bread crumbs) into the water immediately after the Family Service for Rosh Hashanah. Plan to join us with your family on Saturday, September 16 at 4pm at Sunset Lake on the Vassar College campus.

Try to BYO breadcrumbs to cast into the lake. Light refreshments will be served, courtesy of

the Ritual Committee. In case of inclement weather, this event will take place the following day (Sunday, September 17) at the same location and time. If you've never done this before, make this the year you come to *Tashlich*, and start the year 5784 with a clean slate!



Two (Relatively) Painless Ways to Give to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund

Some Temple members have asked, "Is it possible to both give to the Endowment Fund and save on taxes?" The answer is "yes." Below are two ways to get a bigger bang for your buck.

Contributing "appreciated" stock held for more than one year is one of the most tax-efficient ways that one can make a gift to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund. A donor can transfer stock with a relatively low basis (i.e. cost) which can be sold at a higher price without having to pay any capital gains tax on the gain. The donor should notify his/her/their broker to transfer the stock to Fidelity, whose institutional "DTC" number is 0226. Call the Temple office, (845) 454-2570 for the account number of the Endowment Fund. Your broker should instruct Fidelity to notify the Temple office of the name of the donor(s) and the proceeds. The gift will then be recorded and the donor credited for it. As the donor, you should keep a record of the stock's cost basis and the amount of proceeds. By making a gift this way, you can make a more impactful gift than either giving cash or selling stock and then transferring the proceeds (which would require you to report a capital gain on your income tax return).

Another tax-favorable mechanism is a direct transfer of funds from the financial institution hosting a donor's IRA or other retirement account to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund. You, as donor, should direct the plan administrator via letter or email to pay the amount(s) that would normally be transferred to your account DIRECTLY to Vassar Temple, 140 Hooker Avenue, Poughkeepsie, NY 12601 payable to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund. This could involve one lump-sum payment or a series of monthly payments. By not passing through you, the payments are not part of your income for income tax purposes, yet the Endowment Fund receives the full benefit. In this way, donors can painlessly give more without an income tax bite.

Climate Corner ~ an update from our Dayenu Circle

Our Dayenu Circle has expanded to include like-minded folks at Temple Beth-El under the leadership of Rabbi Miriam Hyman. We'll be working together on our Green Teams and, in the near future, a peer-to-peer decarbonization workshop.

We are thrilled to have supported, through the NYS Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, the successful passage of a state ban on fossil fuel use in new buildings (the All-Electric Buildings Act), which is the first bill of its kind in the country, and to have made substantial progress in passing a second important bill (the HEAT Act).

NEW! We are now working with the Environmental Voter Project, a non-partisan organization that uses research-based methods to turn out infrequent, but registered voters who are likely to factor environmental concerns heavily into voting decisions. Postcards for EVP are available for the Virginia election and must be returned to us before October 3 for mailing in accordance with EVP's strictly controlled process. We will have only a limited number of EVP postcards available for this round, but expect to continue with additional elections.

We will distribute EVP materials in physical form only. EVP also does phone banking to environmental voters around the country.

THE WINDOWS PROJECT AT VASSAR TEMPLE

This Fund, endowed in 2021 by her family, honors the legacy and memory of former member Marjorie Gluck. Designed to support the Temple's relevancy in a changing Jewish community, it enables our outreach through information technology and social and traditional media. It also supports outreach and membership development and has a special focus on sustaining the future of Judaism through engagement with youth, students, and young adults and support for our religious education programs.

The Windows Project at Vassar Temple

Vassar Temple will replace the windows in the Sanctuary (including the East Chapel and the balcony) as part of energy saving efforts recommended in the recently completed (2022) Energy Audit. This does not include the stained-glass windows. The replacement of these 75-year-old windows is expected to occur in the Fall, after the High Holidays.

Vassar Temple completed its first Energy Audit in 2008 and updated in 2022. In both studies, the windows were highlighted as a major loss of energy because of the heating and cooling directed at the Sanctuary. The Temple formed a working group in 2022 to review and consider a wide array of options (including complete closure of the Sanctuary windows). The working group (Paul Ciminello, Eve Gendron, Margery Groten, and David Lampell) met with potential contractors, investigated various replacement options and materials, and solicited and reviewed proposals.

The culmination of the working group's efforts was the selection of BASEC Corporation of Milton, NY. The proposal totals \$82,110 and includes the following:

- The removal and proper disposal of the six north-facing windows in the Sanctuary, the five windows in the East Chapel, and the six windows in the balcony, including repair work necessary to one balcony window (the windowsill has fallen out) and the disposal of all debris.
- The installation of windows comprised of high-efficiency Kalwall translucent panels which will allow the same amount of light into the Sanctuary at significant savings of energy. All Sanctuary windows will open at the base to permit fresh air.

This project will begin after the High Holidays and is expected to take a total of 10 working days. The windows will be fabricated sometime in the late summer so that they will be ready for installation when the old windows are removed. The contractor is intending to use scaffolding in the rear of the building (both the north and the east side) to facilitate window replacement.

Vassar Temple has received leadership gifts from Paul and Andi Ciminello and Vassar Temple Sisterhood that total \$45,000. With these funds in hand, the Board has approved the contract to move forward. Vassar Temple is offering naming opportunities to complete the project funding. Gift opportunities are as follows:

\$8,000 to name a full window and \$4,000 to name a half window. We have already secured \$14,500 towards the goal of \$37,000 for named windows!

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

Susan Colodner's Quinoa and Kale Salad

Ingredients

- 4 cups baby kale
- 3/4 cup uncooked quinoa—cook quinoa as per the package instructions
- 1 veggie bouillon cube
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 small garlic clove minced or put through a press
- 8 twists of black pepper from a pepper mill
- 1 squeeze of honey, about 1 teaspoon
- 2 tablespoons red onion, minced
- 1/3 cup dried cranberries
- 1/3 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
- 2 ounces of feta, cubed (not non-fat)
- 1 can of chick peas, rinsed and drained
- Edamame (optional)

Directions

- Roughly chop the baby kale and place in a large bowl (make sure the stems are removed).
- Whisk together olive oil, white wine vinegar, Dijon mustard, minced garlic, black pepper and honey. Pour half of the dressing over the chopped kale.
- Cook dry quinoa according to package instructions. Add 1 veggie bouillon cube to the water before cooking.
- Add minced red onion, cranberries, chopped pecans or walnuts, feta and chick peas (and edamame if using) to the kale and toss gently.
- When the quinoa is done and cooled slightly, add it to the bowl with the kale mixture.
- Toss with remaining dressing and serve.


