From the Rabbi's Desk:



"Hanukkah begins on December 7, the 25th of Kislev. Thinking about Hanukkah a month in advance as I write this column, I'm saddened to anticipate our mixed emotions at this normally joyous holiday as Israel will most certainly still be at war.

Two aspects of Hanukkah resonate most profoundly for me this year. The first is the real miracle of Hanukkah: not the legend of the oil; rather, the victory of the

small band of fighters led by the Maccabees against the great Assyrian army and the subsequent independence of the Jewish nation for the first time in over 400 years since the Babylonian conquest. That independence only lasted for about 100 years until the Roman conquest and was not achieved again until 1948 when the modern State of Israel was born. Now, Israel finds itself once again fighting for its very existence, as the goal of Hamas and its supporters is not an independent Palestinian state, but the eradication of the State of Israel, "from the river to the sea."

The second aspect of Hanukkah is its message of religious freedom. Antiochus' plan for taking control of ancient Israel was to eradicate Judaism through forced conversions—the classic antisemite! As we make our way through this incredibly challenging time of rising antisemitism in our country and around the world, the victory of the Maccabees can give us hope in our ability to overcome. So, too, can we derive hope from the support of community partners, law enforcement and government officials—on all levels and their commitment to combatting antisemitism and all forms of hate.

We can best express this hope by living proudly as Jews, demonstrated in this holiday through the core *mitzvah* of Hanukkah: *persum hanes*, "publicizing the miracle" by placing our Hanukkiot in our windows so that they can be seen. On each night we add a candle in accordance with the teachings of Hillel that we increase in matters of holiness. Each night we add more light against the darkness; we kindle lights that we cannot allow hate or fear to extinguish.

This year let us kindle lights for Israel as we stand in solidarity during its fight to wipe out the evil that is Hamas, advocate for the release of the hostages, support the efforts to help its people heal and rebuild, and call for continued support from our government, even as we are concerned for the Palestinian civilians caught in the crossfire, held hostage by their own brutal leaders.

I invite you to dedicate each night's candle to solidarity with Israel and with the victims of this war. The following is one suggestion:

For the hostages, that they may be returned safely to their loved ones

For the soldiers of the Israel Defense Forces, risking their lives to defend their country

In memory of the 1400 souls brutally murdered on October 7

For the grieving families who mourn their loved ones, who are displaced from their homes, who are healing from physical and emotional wounds

For leadership of our nation and others who stand by Israel

For the innocent Palestinians whose leaders made them pawns in this war

For the eradication of antisemitism and hate

For the dream of two peoples living side by side in peace and security.

May the words of the Haftarah portion read on the Shabbat of Hanukkah from the prophet Zechariah, "Not by might, not by power but by My spirit, says the Eternal," come true soon in our time that Israel may yet be secure and at peace.





President's Message: NOT Another \$\$Money\$\$ Ask!

It has been brought to my attention lately by various Temple members that it seems that we are always and forever, asking for money. Congregants have complained to me that it's tiresome, annoying and is a major turn-off to all

things Vassar Temple. You complain of "fundraising fatigue" and the drain on your wallets. I am well aware of the multiple "asks." I even encourage them, and I'll tell you why.

Vassar Temple is not just a house of worship, but a business and a home. Think of your own homes... only bigger, with staff and salaries and programs! We certainly have dues for membership. But even though our membership is slowly growing, it is less than half of what it was 30 years ago. Most memberships at houses of worship are down for any number of reasons. We haven't raised or adjusted our dues structure in nearly 20 years. When talk of raising dues comes up, people quickly jump in and state that our dues membership is high enough already. And there are the many members who are on dues accommodation for a number of confidential reasons. I have said many times and will continue to say—No one will be turned away as a member because they cannot afford to be a member!

And so we have multiple and varied "asks" throughout the year to supplement our budget. It has never been the intention that every member donate to every cause (although we will never turn your money away!). Rather these "asks" are multiple, frequent and varied on purpose. What sings or speaks to YOU? What sparks your interest or makes you feel

connected to Vassar Temple? Is it the refurbishment of the new piano? Is it to invest in energy-efficient new sanctuary windows? Is it the luck of the draw in a gift basket fundraiser or raffle? Is it to enjoy a family dinner with Temple friends? Is it to invest in new comfortable tables and chairs in the social hall? Do you want your family's name on a Yahrzeit plaque in the sanctuary or on a leaf for our Tree of Life in our front hallway? Do you prefer to look to the future and invest in growing our endowment? Do you just like to make donations for sustaining the Temple through our various special purpose funds or the High Holiday Appeal? Maybe you are saving up for a fun and fancy night out at our upcoming Gala on April 14, 2024? Maybe you prefer to donate food for Can Jam, Lunch Box or donate clothing or toiletries to various organizations we choose to help. Maybe you choose to donate your time to the many social justice causes in the community and beyond that we support.

I don't like to think of them as a barrage of "asks" and begging for money. I like to think of them as a variety of "opportunities" for you to be engaged and connected in your spiritual, educational, social justice and extended family home at Vassar Temple.

Think of all of these varied and multiple "asks" as fruits on a tree of Temple life. Our expectation is not that you cut down the entire tree. But our hope is that you will pick as many fruits as you need to nourish your mind, body and soul. Thank you for choosing to pick your fruit at Vassar Temple.

Religious School Update ~ December

Hanukkah, the Jewish festival of lights, celebrates the Maccabean Revolt (167-160 BCE), and the narrative that Jewish rebel Judas Maccabeus vanquished the evil Seleucid emperor Antiochus and rededicated the Temple. The eight-day holiday of Hanukkah was promptly created, modeled on the eight-day holiday of Sukkot.



The story of the miraculous oil lasting eight days is apocryphal: It would only appear centuries later in the Talmud (Shabbat 21b). It appears that the oil-miracle story was devised to avoid antagonizing the Romans. Rome had conquered the land of Israel a hundred years after the Maccabee wars, and would not have liked a holiday celebrating victory over a ruling empire.

Today, the popular mind parallels Hanukkah and Christmas, due to their temporal proximity. But this is a misleading mistake. The two are quite different in theme, values, and relative importance within the two religious traditions.

There's a much better parallel, if you're looking for one. Hanukkah is a remembrance of a war of national liberation, the overthrow of an oppressive enemy, an unlikely victory of a smaller military force against a larger, more powerful one. The most similar holiday to Hanukkah? Of course, it's the Fourth of July.

Lunch Box: Join the Fun!

Vassar Temple's support of the Lunch Box goes back almost 30 years when Emily Himelstein realized that no meals were being served at the Lunch Box on Sundays and she worked out a plan with Dutchess Outreach to let Vassar Temple cook a meal one Sunday a month. Since then, Vassar Temple has nourished our community with a delicious and nutritious monthly meal with support from our congregation through volunteers and food donations, allowing us to feed over 100 people (and sometimes as many as 180 people) on Sundays throughout the year. A few years back, we teamed up with MHIA (Mid Hudson Islamic Association) to support this effort. This has been a wonderful collaboration for both of us.

When we cook, we need at least eight people to make it run smoothly. To date we have only had a core group of about five people, making it difficult to keep up with the increased demand for lunches. We need you to join the fun. Do this as a group project with your Temple committees (Board, Finance, Religious School, Sisterhood or Brotherhood). You can use our standard chili recipe, or come up with a meal yourselves. We have lots of suggestions. You can even gather a group of your friends to celebrate a special birthday or anniversary. Make Lunch Box your celebration and have your friends join. We are going to restart this

tradition at Vassar Temple and the Cemetery Committee has graciously agreed to "Captain" Lunch Box for December.

There are two shifts needed: three or four people to cook from 10:15 until 11:30, and two or three people from 11:30 until 1:15 to serve and clean up the kitchen. There will always be a congregant who has done this before or a Dutchess Outreach board member present as "lead" to address any questions and help where needed. In addition, we need committee members to encourage the congregation to donate, keep an inventory of what we have and purchase the remainder of the items.

For our award-winning chili, we need the following donations monthly:

- 30 lbs. of ground beef
- 30 lbs. of canned beans
- 15 lbs. chopped or pureed tomatoes
- 2 lbs. tomato paste
- 5 lbs. onions
- 5 large peppers
- Chili powder

New York has ambitious **goals** to reduce fossil fuel use, but our **laws** encourage using more of them. Existing State laws mandate that utilities build more pipes for delivering natural gas. Currently, nearly half of greenhouse gas emissions in NYS come from the use of gas. To meet NYS landmark climate goals, we must use less gas—not more. The HEAT Act is the major piece of legislation aimed at reducing the use of gas. It will remove state mandates and subsidies for our utilities to provide gas hookups. Governor Hochul is currently crafting her proposal for the state budget, which will be negotiated and voted on early next year. We need to reach her now to ensure that this bill is included in her budget proposal, which will increase the chance of the bill's passage. 
SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Francine Kaplan's Potato Latkes (using less oil)

Ingredients

- 3 large potatoes (russet or Idaho), shredded (Shortcut: you can use already shredded Simply Potatoes)
- 1 medium white onion, shredded
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/4 cup flour (or use 2 tablespoons matzoh meal or cornmeal—this adds an extra crispy texture)
- 2 to 3 tablespoon vegetable oil, divided

Directions

- 1. Using a strainer, squeeze out a bit, not all, of the excess moisture from the shredded veggies.
- 2. Place shredded veggies, eggs, flour (or other suggested ingredient), salt and pepper into a mixing bowlmix well
- Heat 1 tablespoon oil in large skillet over medium heat and drop as many spoonfuls of the potato mixture that will fit into your skillet
- 4. Fry about 3 minutes on each side until golden and crisp around the edges
- 5. Place on paper towel to drain excess oil
- 6. Repeat, replenishing oil as needed, until batter is finished
- 7. Serve warm with applesauce and/or sour cream



Sisterhood Chai Noon Luncheon ~ December 18





Vassar Temple Sisterhood Book Club to Discuss Once We Were Home Wednesday, December 20 at 2pm

Jennifer Rosner's new novel, *Once We Were Home* is a gorgeously written, poignant book about displaced children of the Holocaust. 
