175th Anniversary Dinner and Shabbat Service ~ Friday, April 19 Guest Speaker, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President, URJ



Rabbi Jacobs is President of the Union for Reform Judaism, leading more than two million people through 825 congregations, 14 overnight camps, the teen youth movement NFTY, and the Religious Action Center in Washington, DC. As rabbi of the Brooklyn Heights Synagogue, he created the first homeless shelter in a NYC synagogue. He later spent 20 years as the visionary spiritual leader of Westchester Reform Temple in Scarsdale. Rabbi Jacobs studied for two decades at Jerusalem's Shalom Hartman Institute, where he is now a

senior rabbinic fellow.

We will include prayers and musical selections that reflect the evolution in style of worship at Vassar Temple, from its origins as an Orthodox synagogue through the Reform siddurs we have used over the years: *Union Prayer Book, Gates of Prayer, and Mishkan Tefillah.* The service will be led by Rabbi Altman and Cantor Goldmann and will be hybrid.

From the Rabbi's Desk:



"What a festive month this will be!

Our congregation will celebrate the culminating events of our 175th anniversary year: a birthday party in the religious school, our amazing gala with keynote speaker Professor Deborah Dash Moore and the Anniversary Shabbat dinner and service with guest speaker Rabbi Rick Jacobs, president of the Union for Reform Judaism.

Then, on April 29 we will join with Jews worldwide in celebrating a highlight of the Jewish calendar: Passover.

Knowing that I wanted to write about both of these significant events, I pondered what Vassar Temple and Passover might have in common. Happily, I discovered quite a few shared traits:

Good food: One cannot imagine either Vassar Temple or the seder without food. After all, what is a service at Vassar Temple without the delicious baked goods of the Oneg! How wonderful it has been once again to share meals together, a true bonding experience. Food is essential at the seder, beginning with the items on the seder plate that tell the story of the Exodus. But it is the meal that nourishes our bodies and our souls, especially with recipes handed down through the generations. Those foods and the stories we tell connect us to our loved ones, past and present.

Prayer: Rituals and prayers make the seder more than a meal; through them we "relive" the Exodus from Egypt in fulfillment of the commandment: "And you shall tell your child on that day, saying, This is what God did for **me**, when I came out of Egypt." (Exodus 13:8). Worship at Vassar Temple is central to making us a sacred community; it is the glue that binds us to one another and to our traditions.

Singing: The songs of the seder, though designed to keep the children engaged, are a beloved part of the seder for all, whether we hang onto old favorites and/

or seek out new creations. Worship at Vassar Temple is unimaginable without singing. Song uplifts our spirits and enriches the prayer experience (regardless of how well we sing).

Social Justice: The seder takes us back to slavery in Egypt and looks ahead towards the future redemption. By remembering the experience of oppression, the seder aims to instill within us empathy for the stranger and the commitment to work for freedom for the oppressed today. Social justice has always been at the heart of Vassar Temple. Through our efforts locally and civic engagement activities, Vassar Temple is constantly engaged in the work of *tikun olam*.

Education: The seder was created to teach our children about the Exodus, but all engage with its lessons annually. At Vassar Temple our commitment to learning for all ages extends from toddlers to seniors.

Vision and the courage to change: The Passover Seder is one of the greatest innovations of Jewish history. The rabbis were revolutionary in reinventing Judaism after the destruction of the second temple, audaciously adapting a practice of the Romans to create our beloved Passover seder.

Each generation of leaders of Vassar Temple has had the vision and courage to change to ensure our future. A half a minyan came together to form a congregation; eighteen families raised money to buy a building. Worship changed from Orthodox to Reform and continues to evolve within Reform Judaism. Technology enabled us to survive a pandemic and now connects us near and far. We reach out and welcome the diversity that is the Jewish people.

Indeed, there is great joy this April as we honor Vassar Temple and the Jewish people's past, celebrate our present and envision our future. May we go from strength to strength.



Vassar Temple's 175th Anniversary, The Endowment Fund and YOU

In a few weeks, many of us will gather for Vassar Temple's 175th Anniversary Gala. It will be a remarkable event. Survival is not the point. *Survival for a reason is.*

Vassar Temple is a special place because it has nurtured generations of Reform Jews, providing religious sustenance, guidance, a sense of community and camaraderie, a connection with a heritage that stretches back thousands of years and yet reflects our modern views of how we, as Jews, relate to each other and to the broader, non-Jewish community. We are not an island. Rather, we are a peninsula, attached to the mainland of contemporary America, moored and guided by the ethical teachings of our ancient religion.

The trauma of October 7, 2023 has affected each of us in different ways. It has reinforced in us an awareness of the fragility of life. Regardless of how we feel about Israel's response to that attack, our lives as American Jews have changed: how we view ourselves and our relationship to Israel, and how we are viewed by our non-Jewish fellow citizens.

While our impact on the actions of our government or Israel's regarding the conduct of the war or relations between Israel and Palestinians is likely to be slight, in the near term we can have an immediate and major impact on the future of Vassar Temple by making a commitment to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund. Many of you reading this article will have already answered by saying "hineni" – here I am. But others of you have held back. The time for action is NOW – when your pledge will get us to our goal of \$500,000. Help us to reach or exceed that goal, so that the Temple's financial future will be secure. Your decision can really "move the needle" to provide continuity for future generations of Temple members. All of us who value Vassar Temple and all it has meant for 175 years will thank you.

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

Apple Cake for Passover ~ Susan Fink

Ingredients

- 2-1/4 cups matzo cake meal, divided
- 4 large apples, peeled and sliced
- 2-1/4 cups sugar, divided
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 6 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon potato starch
- whipped cream, optional



Preheat oven to 350°. Dust a greased 13x9-in. baking dish with 1/4 cup matzo meal; set aside. In a large bowl, combine apples, 1/4 cup sugar and cinnamon; set aside. In another large bowl, beat eggs until slightly thickened. Gradually add remaining sugar, beating until thick and lemon-colored. Beat in oil and water. Combine potato starch and remaining matzo meal; add to egg mixture and mix well. Pour half of batter into prepared pan. Top with apples and remaining batter. Bake until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean, 40-45 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. If desired, top with whipped cream.

Celebrate the last day of Pesach at our Festival Morning service, commemorating the moment of redemption at the crossing at the Sea of Reeds. Yizkor (memorial prayers) will be included. Vassar Temple Awarded Decarbonizer Grant

I am elated to announce that Vassar Temple has been awarded a \$36,000 Building Decarbonizer Grant from Partners for Climate Action (climateactionhv.org). PCA provides financial, program, and educational support in our bio-region (the Hudson River Estuary watershed). Heating, cooling, and building energy use are the largest contributors to greenhouse gas emissions in New York State, and this new grant directly reduces emissions by funding projects to reduce fossil fuel use. From a total of 70 applicants, we were among 20 selected for funding. The grant does not require any match from our budget and will be disbursed in advance of the proposed work, facilitating cash flow.

This money will be used to complete actions recommended by our energy audit (wi-fi thermostats, insulation of hot water pipes, and more) and to install mini-splits (air-source heat pumps) on our main floor office/classroom wing, eliminating use of gas to heat that section and improving upon the old window air conditioners that are in a few of those rooms. These measures will further result in savings on our utility bills.

This new program is not only intended to fund projects. An equally crucial goal is to catalyze action in our region by setting an example and functioning as a learning cohort. Awardees will have opportunities to share ideas through meetings and field trips. Public storytelling and demonstration will raise the project's profile, ideally supporting additional grant rounds.

We are in incredible company with municipal, educational, cultural, and faith organizations selected for this first cohort who will be completing energy audits, efficiency measures, retrofits, and other actions. Our robust history of social action and justice, efforts towards diversity and inclusion, and commitment to environmental advocacy all influenced our being selected. Our location in a defined disadvantaged community was also important to the granting organization.

I am indebted to Margery Groten for her expert assistance as I completed our application for this funding. It is incredibly gratifying to merge my key pursuits – Vassar Temple and climate advocacy – and I am tremendously proud that we can demonstrate this leadership.
