From the Rabbi's Desk:



After almost two months of holiday drought, we look forward with great anticipation to Hanukkah later this month. Though one of our minor festivals, the message of Hanukkah is profound: the right of religious freedom.

That promise, enshrined in the First Amendment of the Constitution which states that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting its free exercise," has drawn Jews to these shores for 370 years. Judaism, along with Christianity, Islam and other religions, are promised the opportunity to flourish in this nation because of the "wall" that separates church and state. The prohibitions against prayer in public schools, public funds supporting religious schools, religious institutions endorsing political candidates, discrimination in hiring based on religious belief—all of these regulations serve to support this "wall" and prevent government endorsement of any religion. Attempts to

break down this wall have been building for many years but have gained considerable strength in more recent times with the rise of the Christian Nationalist movement, a political and cultural ideology that seeks to fuse American and Christian identities. We have seen their influence in calls to ban books in schools and libraries, in the passage in Louisiana of a law requiring that the Ten Commandments be displayed in public school classrooms and in Oklahoma's top education officials ordering public schools to incorporate the Bible into lessons. While such actions are being pursued in the courts, these and other such efforts are gaining momentum and the leanings of the Supreme Court in decisions such as Dobbs or supporting the right of a high school football coach to offer a prayer at the end of games and invite students to join him, raise serious concerns about first amendment protections.

This is a cautionary time when we must be vigilant to protect our first amendment rights against this movement (which does NOT represent the majority of Christians in this country) in their efforts to pass legislation on the federal, state and local levels and influence educational programs in public schools. Organizations such as the ACLU and Americans United for the Separation of Church and State are engaged in law suits to protect religious freedom. May we do all that we can to ensure it as well.

While the struggle of the Maccabees has been achieved with an independent Jewish state, reborn in 1948, religious freedom in Israel does not yet exist for non-Orthodox Jews and promises of the Israeli Declaration of Independence of a democratic state with equal rights for all its citizens has yet to be realized. We have a voice in shaping Israel's future through the World Zionist Congress elections that will take place this spring. The WZC and World Zionist Organization are central nongovernmental institutions in Israel that impact policies, such as land allocation, and influence the allocation of about \$1 billion annually, which has direct impact on Reform Judaism in Israel. Every Jew age 18 and older can vote in the WZC elections which take place every 5 years. The Reform movement is represented by our Zionist arm, ARZA. Especially in the midst of this on-going war our voice is even more important.

At this darkest time of the year, may the lights of Hanukkah burn brightly with hope for America and for Israel.

Sisterhood Chai Noon Luncheon ~ December 18

Vassar Temple Sisterhood's Chai Noon Luncheon, which meets at noon on the 18th of most months (when the date does not conflict with holidays or weekends), will meet on Wednesday, December 18. As always, guests get separate checks, and the restaurant is wheelchair accessible.

Temple Awarded Federal Homeland Security Grant

We are very excited to announce that Vassar Temple has been selected as a recipient in the 2024 Federal Non-Profit Security Grant Program (NSGP). The \$150,000 grant includes the following upgrades: new exterior forced-entry doors with modern push bars; new interior forced-entry doors for sanctuary and chapel; key card access control system to replace physical keys; additional exterior and interior security cameras and upgraded system to support them; additional exterior lighting; and safety shield window film.

The three-year grant period will entail detailed management, and the award includes funds for professional assistance. This is a reimbursement grant, and we will implement the projects in sequence with periodic reimbursement as they are completed. The VT Board, Finance, House, and Security Committees will collaborate to bring this major effort to fruition.

This year increased funds were allotted by Congress to the NSGP, with many more applicants due to the worsening threat environment. In New York, a significant portion was earmarked for New York City organizations with a limited number of upstate applicants funded. This is a huge accomplishment for Vassar Temple which could not have been achieved without the hard work of Susan Karnes Hecht and Marcia Tanzman. A stipend for professional grant writer assistance was secured from Community Security Initiative and support received from the Dutchess County Sheriff and City/Town of Poughkeepsie Police. While the grant application was a months-long effort, the preparatory work for this and other grants was initiated several years ago with the establishment of our electronic document archives and acquisition of our formal 501(c)(3) determination letter from the IRS.

I thank everyone involved for such a fantastic job and result. Though this is happening during my term as President, the effort has occurred through a number of executive terms, and I commend our past presidents and trustees for their support.

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

Blue Crinkle Cookies for Hanukkah ~ Lisa-Sue Quackenbush

Total Time: 25 minutes Yield: 20 cookies

Ingredients

- 1 stick (8 tablespoons) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1½ cups granulated sugar, divided
- Zest and juice from one large lemon, separated
- 1 large egg, room temperature
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon kosher salt
- Blue gel food coloring
- ½ cup confectioner's sugar



Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 350°F. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper.
- Beat the butter, 1 cup of the granulated sugar and lemon zest in your mixer till light and fluffy; scrape down the sides. Add the lemon juice, egg and vanilla and beat again; scrape down the sides. Add the flour, baking powder and salt and beat again till ingredients are well combined.
- Add a bit of food coloring to the dough and beat until the color is completely incorporated. Add more color, a bit at a time, till the desired shade is reached.
- Place the remaining ½ cup of granulated sugar in a small bowl, and the confectioner's sugar in another bowl.
- Use a tablespoon or cookie scoop to scoop the batter right into the granulated sugar. Gently turn so that the scoop is completely covered in the sugar, then roll into a ball. Place the ball into the confectioner's sugar, turn to coat and roll into a ball again. Place on your prepared baking sheet. Repeat with the remaining batter.
- Bake for 8-10 minutes, or till the cookies are puffed up and the edges are just set. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Shelter Meals News

For many years, Vassar Temple has been volunteering once a month in various capacities at the local overnight homeless shelter. We refer to the night we go as "Jewish Night," because eventually we were joined by other members of the local Jewish community, and actually now we have been joined in doing this mitzvah by friends and neighbors of other faiths. Over the years the shelter's population grew from 14 to 120, and during the pandemic the location moved from Hillcrest to the PODs. At first we had to stay at the shelter overnight ourselves, provide supper and serve supper and breakfast, do laundry, etc., until funding was realized for fully staffing the shelter by professionals. At that time our role became "simply" contributing and serving homemade food for supper, and donating cereal, fruit, juice, etc. for breakfast the following morning. After the move to the PODs, due to COVID concerns, we simply dropped off the food each month for the now 120 or more guests.

Our local overnight shelter was founded and run by Hudson River Housing, but the most recent change is that Dutchess County has now taken over administering the shelter. The County's policies do not allow for homemade food to be brought in and served, so guests at that shelter are now getting their meals through Dutchess Outreach. Therefore, we have shifted our efforts to providing a monthly dinner for the 27 residents of Liberty Station on N. Hamilton Street. Liberty Station is a shelter run by Hudson River Housing for unhoused US military veterans.

Judy Harkavy continues to very ably coordinate our participation on shelter night throughout all these changing situations. If you have any questions, you can contact her at shelter@vassartemple.org.

How to Make a Big Impact with Little Discomfort

Our endowment campaign is within a hair's breadth of reaching its goal of \$500,000 in pledges. We expect that a few generous individuals who have indicated that they *will* pledge over the next few weeks will indeed do so—bringing us to our goal.

A number of you have hesitated to make a pledge—not because of lack of commitment to the Temple but because doing so would put you in a financial bind. Is there a way that you can help and still not compromise current assets and income? The answer is a clear "yes." One Temple member has already done so.

Here's how:

If you do not already have a will, you can make one and designate the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund as a beneficiary. The amount you wish to leave to the Temple is up to you. If after providing for loved ones there are assets that you would like to allocate to causes and organizations that have meant a lot to you, we sincerely hope that Vassar Temple is among them. If so, please designate a specific dollar amount to the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund, with the Temple's address at 140 Hooker Avenue, Poughkeepsie, NY 12601.

If you already have a will that does not include the Endowment Fund, you will have to **amend** your will by means of a codicil to add the Vassar Temple Endowment Fund as a beneficiary. Again, list the specific dollar amount you wish to designate, and add the address of the Temple.

For both those making a will and those adding a codicil to an existing will, you will have to contact a lawyer to make your wishes legally binding. The cost should be relatively modest—yet you can have a very big impact on securing the Temple's financial future *without* having to sacrifice current income. We hope that you will consider this option!

VTS Book Club to Read Hello Beautiful by Ann Napolitano

"William Waters grew up in a house silenced by tragedy, where his parents could hardly bear to look at him, much less love him—so when he meets the spirited and ambitious Julia Padavano in his freshman year of college, it's as if the world has lit up around him.
