Seventh Day Shabbat Service ~ Saturday, April 19, 10:15am

Celebrate the last day of Pesach at our Festival morning service, commemorating the moment of redemption at the crossing at the Sea of Reeds. Yizkor (a brief memorial service) will also be observed. During these seasons of joy, we pause to remember our loved ones; no doubt, we will have felt their absence around the seder table. It can be comforting to remember one's loved ones in the context of community.

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From the Rabbi's Desk:



I'm writing this column on my way back to Poughkeepsie from a **Rabbinic Intensive Yeshiva** sponsored by Hadar, an egalitarian yeshiva that promotes Jewish learning for everyone—from those with little to no knowledge to rabbis (who certainly have more knowledge, but always need to continue to learn)! The basic premise of the RIY is that rabbis are

so busy, they don't have time for serious study. At the orientation, Rabbi Shai Held, Director of Hadar, encouraged us to close off the side of our brains that automatically thinks, "How can I use this in a sermon, in a class, etc.?" and just learn, as the rabbis called it, "Torah L'shma" -- Torah study for its own sake. While I was able to do that for 99.9% of the time, one of Rabbi Held's teachings stayed with me, as I thought about what I would write in this column as we prepare to celebrate Pesach.

His teaching came in a session entitled, "When What We Believe and What We Go Through Just Doesn't Match: The Riddle of Psalm 77." The psalmist is clearly in distress. He remembers God's actions in the past and refers to the Exodus and the wonders, the miracles, the leadership of the people. The psalmist challenges God-have You forgotten pity and compassion? In other words, if You could do all of that you can to be part of making redemption happen in the past, what about me? Remembering the past seems to make things worse for the psalmist. I suspect many of us resonate with feelings of the psalmist when we read Biblical stories of God's wonders or sing Michamocha while we may be in distress, whether about personal, societal or global issues.

Through an in-depth analysis of the psalm, Held concludes with the following: while remembering the past might make things worse, "the past made present can bring us hope." We move the past into the present through re-enactment. This is exactly what we do at the Pesach Seder as is written in the Haggadah, "In each generation, a person must see themselves as if they personally went out of Egypt." Through the

special foods and rituals, we "relive" the bitterness of slavery and we "experience" the wonders of deliverance. The Seder moves from degradation to praise as we re-enact the journey from Egypt to freedom.

Bringing the past into the present can make us more hopeful for redemption today, especially when it inspires us to be "God's hands" and take action. Sadly, those in need of redemption today are too many to enumerate here, but we can find causes and opportunities for action on all levels: local, state, national, international. Our social action and civic engagement committees are two sources for our efforts; you can learn about their activities in this bulletin and our weekly e-newsletter.

More hostages have been released and that is good, but some of the hostages we were specifically mentioning, the Bibas children and their mother, did not come home alive. Our prayers continue for their father/husband who had been released. The cease fire holds for now, but we await the rest of the hostages to be **brought home**.

Religious School Update

Abraham Lincoln was assassinated during Passover. According to the American Jewish Historical Society, many Jewish people were in synagogue for the holiday when news of the assassination spread. The society's website states that "synagogue altars were quickly draped in black and, instead of Passover melodies, the congregations chanted Yom Kippur hymns. Rabbis set aside their sermons and wept openly at their pulpits, as did their congregants."

Coca-Cola makes kosher Coca-Cola for Passover. Regular Coke products include

high-fructose corn syrup, but since many observant Jews do not use corn products during Passover, the kosher Coke uses real sugar. Kosher Coke products have a yellow cap.

The world's largest matzo ball was unveiled in 2010 at the Jewish Food Festival in Tucson, AZ, weighing 488 pounds. Ingredients included more than 1,000 eggs, 25 pounds of chicken fat and 125 pounds of matzo meal.

In 18th-century Salonika, people added crushed stone to their charoset, presumably to link the food to the bricks it represents. This custom was also followed by Moroccan Jews. If you plan to try it, first consider how you would explain it to your dentist.

When the Hebrews were leaving Egypt, the Egyptians showered them with gold and silver as they fled (Shemot 12:35). Recalling these gifts, Jews in Hungary decorated their seder tables with all their valuable jewelry and silver.

Israel Shabbat ~ Friday, April 25, 7:30pm


Several years ago, Rabbi Mordecai of Kehilat Har-El in Jerusalem, the oldest Reform congregation in Israel, initiated a new special Shabbat marking the Shabbat between Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) and Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israel Independence Day). Called *Shabbat Tekumah* (Shabbat of Rising Up), it is now observed by the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism and many Reform congregations around the world. As Rabbi Josh Weinberg, URJ Vice President and Executive Director of ARZA, explains, "The process of revival that we commemorate expresses our people's revival from the ashes of the Holocaust, through the heroism and grief of Israeli wars, to the joy over the miracle of Jewish independence and sovereignty." This year *Shabbat Tekumah* falls during the voting period for the 39th World Zionist Congress, which will close on May 4. During the service, members from Vassar Temple's World Zionist Congress team and others will speak about why this vote—and Israel—matters to them. The service will be hybrid, so if you wish to attend on Zoom,

When Maine's Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice, Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As a midwife and healer, she keeps a record of every birth and death, crime and debacle that unfolds in the close-knit community. Doggedly pursuing the truth, despite lies and undermining, Martha's diary soon lands at the center of the scandal, implicating those she loves, and compelling her to decide where her own loyalties lie in a time when women were considered best seen, not heard.

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Submitted by Sandra Mamis Chocolate Chip Passover Cookies

Ingredients

- 1 and 1/2 cups Passover cake flour
- 1/4 cup matzoh meal
- two eggs
- 1 and 3/4 cups brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 and 1/2 cups unsalted butter
- 2 and 1/2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips

Instructions

• Preheat oven to 350°. Grease two baking sheets or line with parchment paper. Mix the butter with



brown sugar, vanilla extract, salt, and eggs. Blend in cake flour and matzoh meal. Stir in chocolate chips.
Scoop large tablespoons of dough onto baking sheets. Flatten with spoon. Bake until slightly golden, approximately 13 to 15 minutes. Makes approximately four dozen cookies.

There are so many different tasks that need to happen so that we can all enjoy the delicious hamantaschen. Many people made dough from the recipe given to us many years ago by Cecile

Arnold, wife of our Rabbi Emeritus, Rabbi Arnold. On Baking Day people were busy in the kitchen and Social Hall rolling, filling, sorting and plating lots and lots of hamantaschen—some of which we enjoyed on Purim and the rest delivered as outreach to some of our temple members.

There were lots of children in the Social Hall happily rolling and filling hamantaschen along with adults enjoying their enthusiasm while sitting at tables filling and shaping the dough as others sorted all the baked hamantaschen and made plates for our outreach deliveries. In the kitchen a dedicated crew rolled out all the doughs and cut them into

over 1,000 circles so that they could be filled and shaped. Trays were constantly going in and out of the new oven, and somehow Marcia Tanzman, our oven master extraordinaire, kept on top of everything and made sure that


