Vassar Temple Bulletin to go Online

After careful deliberation, the Vassar Temple Board of Trustees has decided to stop printing the monthly temple Bulletin to save annual printing and postage costs and to be consistent with the temple's sustainability mission. The last printed issue will be the June issue.

The Bulletin is NOT going away. The Bulletin will have the same look and feel but delivered as a PDF link instead. It will be made available online via a special email, the temple website, and an icon in the weekly newsletter. It will continue to play an important role in publicizing the many events that occur at Vassar Temple.

Starting with the July/August issue, articles will now be due on the 10th of the previous month (June 10 for the July/August issue, August 10 for September, etc.). It will then be emailed (or printed) out about two weeks later on or about the 25th of that month; for example, the July/August issue will be emailed around June 25.

Members can request to have a printed version sent to them by contacting the temple office. Physical copies will also be available at the temple. The same content will be made available as a PDF that can be printed in the comfort of your home.

From the Rabbi's Desk:



As we welcome the month of May, we find ourselves once again in the period known as *Sefirat HaOmer* (counting of the Omer). The tradition is to count each day beginning on the second night of Pesach for seven weeks until Shavuot. The practice dates back to a commandment in Leviticus to make a daily elevation offering of an *omer* (measure) of barley for each of the

49 days between Pesach, the barley harvest, and the harvest of new grain, wheat. Following the destruction of the temple, this period took on a different meaning in remembrance of Rabbi Akiva's students who died during this time. Tradition attributes their death to a plague; or, they may have died in an unsuccessful revolt against the Romans. No matter, succeeding generations turned *Sephirat HaOmer* into a time of semi-mourning to honor their memory. More

contemporary interpretations regard this time of counting as a watchful time, given anxiety about the success of the harvest.

When the destruction of the second temple brought an end to sacrifice as a means of drawing near to God, holiday observances, with their focus on offerings from the harvest, had to be transformed and given new layers of meaning. Passover was already observed in the Torah as the celebration of the redemption from Egypt in addition to being the barley harvest.

Shavuot, which isn't even named in the Torah, was only observed as the wheat harvest. It was the rabbinic sages in the Talmud who connected Shavuot with the giving of Torah. In the chronology of Torah stories that makes sense; Sinai was the next major event following the exodus from Egypt. The connection between Pesach and Shavuot is much deeper than chronology, however. It was not for freedom's sake alone that God redeemed the ancient Israelites; it was so that as a free people they could

enter into the covenant with God who called upon them to become "a kingdom of priests and a holy nation." Shavuot celebrates the affirmation of that covenant. Thus, *sephirat haomer* takes on deeper resonance as we count the days between recalling our redemption from slavery and re-enacting that moment of revelation; it is a time of personal and spiritual preparation, of reviewing and renewing one's commitment to Torah, the values it teaches and the obligations it calls upon us to fulfill.

It is not an easy task to which we recommit ourselves every year on Shavuot. Ours is not a faith that allows us to escape from the challenges of daily life; rather, we are called upon to immerse ourselves in striving to repair our world, to bring us towards that Sinaitic vision of a just society, to heed the cry of the prophet Amos: "Let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like a mighty stream."

In these most trying times, both here and in Israel, Torah continues to be our guide. It is with this focus in mind that the rabbis have chosen as the theme for

study for our communal *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*, "Torah in Turbulent Times: Exploring Jewish Teachings that Give Us Guidance, Strength and Inspiration." Hosted by Temple Beth-El, and in partnership also with Congregation Shir Chadash, the evening will begin with the delicious Shavuot tradition of cheesecake, followed by study, and concluding with prayer.

A Reform Jewish innovation for Shavuot is the ceremony of Confirmation, where young adults confirm their acceptance of Torah. The congregation is invited to celebrate with the Carr family on Friday,

May 30 as Thomas follows that tradition; confirmation is a statement of hope for our future. Please see details about all Shavuot observances in this bulletin and in the weekly e-newsletter.

May 1 will be the 18th day of the Omer. Let us make each day count!



Temple fees to be updated for the new Fiscal Year

A Finance Committee task force reviewed Temple fees (other than membership dues), which have not been updated in some time. This is one of many Finance Committee initiatives to improve financial health. Following a thorough review, which included reaching out to other synagogues for comparisons and conferring with committee chairs, the task force made recommendations to the Board of Trustees, which adopted the modest fee increases effective July 1. Areas addressed include Religious and Hebrew School tuition, Bar/Bat Mitzvah fees, cemetery Perpetual Care Fees, and facility rental. Recommended donations for High Holy Day guests, memorial plaques, and Tree of Life were not increased, but simplified and information added to encourage giving beyond these minimums.

While membership dues were not included in this process, the task force did make suggestions for increasing the clarity of dues information presented on our fee schedule as well as educating our members on the true cost of services that we provide, which are only partially covered by dues and fees.

This information will be reviewed in greater detail during the annual Treasurer's Report/Budget Presentation at the June 4 Annual Congregational Meeting. Please plan to attend.

This year will mark the 50th anniversary of Rabbi Golomb's rabbinic ordination. That is an incredible milestone: half a century of service to the Jewish people, of which half has been with Vassar Temple, first as rabbi and then as our senior scholar. On Friday, May 2 we will celebrate this milestone with Rabbi and Debbie Golomb. Bob Abrams, Linda Cantor, Lou Lewis, and Lisa-Sue Quackenbush will share some of their memories from Rabbi Golomb's leadership and reflections on his impact upon them.

Rabbi Golomb and his classmates were honored for reaching this significant milestone at the recent annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Thanks to the generosity

of many congregants, we were able to provide a Convention Sponsorship in his honor. Rabbi Golomb has served in numerous capacities within the CCAR during his rabbinate, including a term as editor of the quarterly *Journal of Reform Judaism*, where he continues to submit scholarly articles.

SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Submitted by Arlene Seligman Italian Pasta Salad

Yield: 8 servings

Ingredients

- 8 ounces rotini or penne pasta
- 1 medium tomato, chopped
- 1/4 cup sliced scallions
- 1/4 cup sliced black olives
- 1/3 cup bottled nonfat Italian dressing
- 1/4 cup grated nonfat or reduced-fat Parmesan cheese

Instructions

- Cook the pasta al dente according to package directions. Drain, rinse with cold water and drain again.
- Place the pasta in a large bowl. Add the tomato, scallions and olives and toss to mix well. Add the Italian dressing and cheese and toss to mix well.
- Cover the salad and chill for at least 2 hours or overnight before serving.

Variations

- 1/2 cup chopped seeded cucumber and 1/2 cup chopped red bell pepper
- 1 cup lightly steamed broccoli florets
- 1 cup chopped artichoke hearts
- 1/2 cup zucchini cut into matchstick-sized pieces and ½ cup grated carrot
- 1 cup cooked or canned kidney, garbanzo or white beans

Even as Bar and Bat Mitzvah are now integral to Reform Judaism, so do we continue to celebrate the

Confirmation of those young adults who have chosen to maintain a strong connection to Judaism and to the synagogue. Appropriately, Confirmation takes place on or close to the Festival of Shavuot when we celebrate the revelation of Torah at Mt. Sinai.
