Rabbi Stombaugh will lead this Festival morning worship in an informal setting in the East Chapel. A significant component of the liturgy is *Yizkor* (the memorial service). We take time to remember our loved ones at such seasons of joy and celebration. Yizkor is a time to connect with the souls of our loved ones on a deeper level; tradition has it that during Yizkor the souls of the departed descend from heaven and are joined with those who are close to them. Many find it of comfort to participate in this service among their Temple family. We will also say Kaddish for the victims of the attack in Israel that took place on Simchat Torah in 2023.

## From the Rabbi's Desk: A Fragile House, A New Path



One of the questions I'm often asked is: Why did you become a rabbi? The short version? I crashed.

I was a sophomore in college, majoring in music education—living my childhood dream. I had my sharp pencils, staff paper, music theory books, and a piano in front of me. It was everything I thought I wanted. But instead of joy, I felt frustration. The process felt hard in the wrong ways—more draining than life-giving. I did the math: if I kept going, I might come to resent the very thing I loved most. I couldn't risk that.

So I pivoted.

The rabbinate wasn't an obvious choice. I didn't know what kind of rabbi I wanted to be. But I had this feeling that this path would give me space to bring together the things I loved—teaching, community, performance, music, philosophy, ritual, relationship—and Judaism, which had always been part of me.

As we enter October, we find ourselves at the end of a different path, yet equally fragile—a journey that began in the sorrow of Tisha B'Av, wound through the introspection of Elul, and rose through the intense, communal experiences of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The shofar has sounded. We've fasted and break-fasted, sung *Avinu Malkeinu*, and engaged—each in our own way—in the work of *teshuvah*.

But it's not over yet.

The High Holiday season does not conclude in a grand sanctuary, but in a fragile, makeshift hut: the *sukkah*. This is profound. After all the intensity of inner work and communal gathering, we're invited to sit in impermanence, rather than perfection. Not behind solid walls, but under the stars, starting the next path forward with fragile steps, like the shelter we inhabit.

Now, years later, I sometimes catch myself at 1:00am—books open, scribbling notes, preparing a teaching, writing a drash—and feeling a kind of joy I didn't know how to reach back in college. It took time to learn how to walk the walk—and the truth is I am still learning, but always choosing again and again to build something new.

And that's what Sukkot invites us into.

We've done the work of reflection and repair. Now we ask: What comes next? What path will I take forward? What is fragile enough in me that I can no longer risk ignoring? What cracks in my foundation are actually invitations to grow?

The sukkah is a sacred pause between who we've been and who we're becoming.

If you're not sure how to step into that next chapter, you might find a helpful reminder in your spiritual pledge card—the one included in the High Holiday mailer. (Don't worry—if you lost yours, there's a copy in this bulletin on the last page) Some of you filled it out. Some of you might've returned it. But whether you've engaged with it or not, it's one tool among many to help you articulate where you want to go from here.

I hope you'll take time to pause inside the fragile house we build together—and ask yourself what it means to risk joy, purpose, and connection in the year ahead.

Let's step forward into 5786—side by side—ready to imagine and co-create something beautiful.

# Religious School Update ~ A Guided Mediation to Help Us Forgive

Let me suggest a forgiveness exercise from Glenda Rosenberg:

Picture yourself in very safe, loving setting, in your favorite place. It is a very happy occasion. Surrounding you are those you love the most, your closest family or friends.

Now picture the circle getting wider. Welcome in more extended family, or more casual friends. All of them are here to celebrate you, to rejoice in your happiest occasion. Your heart is so full that you welcome everyone today. You are safe, loved, and secure.

Now imagine welcoming in others to the party—people you don't know as well but have no reason to dislike.

Now you are totally comfortable in this wonderful scene with all of your loved ones there. Can you welcome in just one additional person to your celebration, one person for whom you feel an old grudge? Yes, they have offended you. But can you remember one good thing they ever did for you? Can you think of one "nekudat hatov," one good point about that person, one godly spark? Can you welcome them into the circle?

Try to take that energy and get to the stage of *mechilah*, or letting go. If you can work hard within yourself this Yom Kippur and get to forgiveness Level One, to *mechilah*, and give that person a sincere "Shanah Tovah" at the break-the-fast, you have done good spiritual work. Then you can keep going from there.



The story of four orphans who travel the Mississippi River on a life-changing odyssey during the Great Depression begins in the summer of 1932 when Odie O'Banion, an orphan confined to the Lincoln Indian Training School in Minnesota, is forced to flee after committing a terrible crime. He and his brother, Albert, their best friend, Mose, and a brokenhearted little girl named Emmy steal away in a canoe, heading for the mighty Mississippi and a place to call their own. # Giant Lessons: Learning About Elephant Intelligence on Parashat Noach Friday, October 24 at 6pm



We've all watched our pets and wondered, "Are they thinking what I'm thinking?" Dr. Joshua Plotnik, a comparative psychologist at Hunter College in New York, has spent 20 years studying animal cognition, or how animals think—with a special focus on elephants.

On this Parashat Noach, join Josh as he shares stories from his research on elephant intelligence and conservation in Thailand. He will talk about how elephants recognize themselves in mirrors (and why that matters), how their cooperation parallels our own, and their extraordinary sense of smell. Together, we'll explore how his research on elephant minds is being applied to conservation efforts that promote coexistence between humans and wildlife.

# SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Submitted by Susan Colodner Orange Brownies

### Ingredients for Brownies

- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups granulated white sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, at room temperature
- 4 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons pure orange extract or orange oil (I add an extra teaspoon)
- 1 teaspoon grated orange zest, (I add another teaspoon of zest)

### Ingredients for Glaze

- 1 cup powdered sugar (measure, then sift)
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice
- 1 teaspoon finely grated orange zest; (again, I add an extra teaspoon)

### **Prepare the Brownies**

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a 13x9-inch pan with nonstick spray.
- In a mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar and salt.
- Add the butter, eggs, orange extract and orange zest and beat with hand mixer until well-blended.
- Pour the batter into the prepared pan and bake for 30 minutes, or until light golden brown and set.
- Remove from oven and pierce the top of entire cake with a skewer or a fork.

### **Prepare the Glaze**

- Combine all of the glaze ingredients in a bowl, stirring until smooth.
- Add more juice, if needed to create a pouring consistency.
- Pour the glaze over the cake. Cool the cake and cut into 24 squares.
