## From the Rabbi's Desk: Growing Up with Both ~ My Interfaith Story



When I think about this time of year, I'm reminded how many layers there are in December. The season carries so much meaning for us all, symbolized by light and darkness, joy and pressure, ritual and rest. For me, it always comes back to one memory from childhood that captures what this season is all about.

When I was in fourth or fifth grade, Hanukkah and Christmas overlapped. I grew up in an interfaith home, and as the holidays approached that year, I asked my parents if it might be okay to skip the Christmas tree. It wasn't a rebellion, just my sense that something could be different. Turns out, my question sparked a remarkable conversation about what really mattered most to each of us.

For my dad, it was the smell of pine in the house—the scent that meant

Christmas had arrived. For my mom, it was the gingerbread house she built every year. For my sister and me, it was our stockings and the few ornaments that we loved the most. None of these things, we realized, required a tree to exist. So that year we adapted: a garland of real pine hung over the fireplace filled the room with that beloved scent. We chose a handful of our favorite ornaments to dangle from it. My mom still built her

My mom still built he gingerbread masterpiece, and my dad baked his famous cinnamon rolls for Christmas morning. We lit the *menorah* and the room glowed with both of our holidays sharing the same space and a similar footprint.

This was not a compromise; it was a creation story. We didn't lose anything by blending like this; we really made every element of our family connection to our tradition stronger—and to this day this story teaches a lesson of the resilience of Judaism, and the power of listening, having no end in mind, being creative, and building something together.

Every year since, I've thought about that story and what it represents—not just for interfaith families, but for all of us trying to hold the complexities of our own identities against the complexity of the world with love and nuance. December invites us to see that there isn't only one way to belong. There are many ways to be Jewish, many ways to find holiness, and many ways to express the joy and light of this holiday season.

At Vassar Temple, I know many of us carry overlapping traditions. Some light Hanukkah candles beside a Christmas tree. Others visit family on Christmas Day but find their spiritual home here on Shabbat. Still others celebrate only Hanukkah, cherishing the chance to lean into the difference of what it is to be an American Jewish family and shine Jewish light in the heart of winter. However we come to this season, I hope you do so with pride, compassion, and curiosity.

The beauty of Judaism is that it doesn't ask us to erase our stories; it invites us to bring them forward, to weave them into a tapestry that honors both where we come from and who we are becoming.

So this year, whether your home smells of pine or latkes—or both—may you feel surrounded by warmth. May the light of your *menorah* be reflected in the lights of those you love. And may our community be a place where all stories are welcomed, honored, and celebrated.

Chag urim sameach — may your season be filled with light, laughter, and love.

#### President's Message:



It's December! Soon Hanukkah will be here and that means don't forget your menorah and candles for the service on Friday, December 19 at 7:30pm. If you are running short of candles or gelt or socks (yes socks!), don't forget to stop by the Sisterhood Hanukkah pop-up shop and stock up. Say hello to Polly Lewis and her helpers, too!

Vassar Temple is again hosting the community Hanukkah party for families on December 14 at 11am. Area synagogues, the Jewish Federation of Dutchess County, and PJ library will be here to be part of the celebration and entertainment, activities and food. It is always a fun time!

In this country right now, we are going through some hard times, and I'd like to thank the members of Vassar Temple for stepping up to help, as we seem to always do. We have knitted scarves and hats, collected gently-used coats, collected toiletries, and the Can Jam box keeps filling up. Those who are in need will be very pleased and relieved to have these items. If you can, be part of keeping the Can Jam box full! A reminder though, all non-perishable food items must be within the date stamped on the item.

Also, members of Vassar Temple, do ask when making an extra end of the calendar year financial donation to Temple, what program needs funding, where is the need? First, I would say thank you! The most obvious answer is the Sustaining Fund as this supports the Temple's operations. But there are more specific funds for specific uses that do need to be replenished after money is used. I'll highlight some of the funds that are cited to be replenished. The Capital Fund is used to cover expenses for the care of our building. The Cemetery Fund covers upkeep of the cemeteries on an ongoing basis. The Endowment Fund is near its goal and donations to reach that goal will keep Vassar Temple in a good financial position for the future. These year-end donations are most appreciated. Our Simchat Torah service and dinner were extra special due to just this type of extra help!

There are other funds that we will highlight from time to time covering Adult Education, Music, Torahs, Religious School, Technology, and so on. Please feel free to ask a board member or contact the office and we will get information for you.

I would be remiss if I didn't say that a donation of your time is also so appreciated, and often necessary, for Temple activities. What would Religious School be without the assistance of our parents? And thank you to our weekly Friday night Oneg hosts! Our congregation would not be what it is without the many people who donate their time in smaller and larger ways. Thank you all!

\*As I write this column, the ceasefire for Israel and Gaza holds. Many countries and organizations are aiding in the process of making this permanent, may it only get better. Peace is a fragile thing and no one I know wants to go back to war and violence. I, like you, also want those who would use the war to foment antisemitism to stop. In a season of holidays and talk of peace, let peace and tolerance be our number one priority!

#### A Note from the Treasurer

As I reported frequently during the past year or so, Fiscal Year 2025, which ended June 30, 2025, was a challenging year for Vasser Temple. We started the FY with a budget anticipating expenses of \$496,000 and revenues of \$500,000. The assumptions about revenues included some aspirational goals for fundraising, and the assumptions about expenses included a straightforward set of operating activities. A budget, however, is a guide for managing, and the real world always includes a few surprises.

All in all, we dealt with the surprises of FY 2025 and are ready to face the surprises that FY 2026 will bring.

We ended the FY with expenses of \$625,359 and revenues of \$494,857. Our expense overrun was attributable to several unanticipated projects that needed to be done, the largest of which was the sanctuary cooling system. Revenues were close to the budgeted number; we did not achieve our fundraising goals for the year, but earnings on our investments exceeded expectations and supported operations.

We are now through the first quarter of FY 2026. Revenues through September were \$262,813, about 48% of the total anticipated for the year. This is attributed to the great response from our membership in sending in membership dues, and in early support for High Holidays fundraising. Expenses were \$117,790, 22% of the full year's budget. The summer months are slightly lower than remaining quarters, as school is not in session and fewer temple activities are programmed. So far in the fiscal year, no surprises!

In the final quarter of the calendar year, temple activities are in high gear. A Development Committee has been established and charged with planning a strategy for fundraising and outreach. Much work is being done on building improvements, to update and enhance our facilities, and maintain systems. School is in session and very well attended. The Board continues to focus on security. For those members who are looking to support the temple with additional donations as the calendar year ends, you are encouraged to consider the special funds, such as the capital fund, or the sustaining fund that supports ongoing operations, among others. The list of all special funds is on the website for you to consider supporting.

The Finance and Investment Committees will be revisiting our investment strategies as well. We have done well to date with the Investment and Endowment accounts. We want to continue to monitor our performance in the context of a changing and volatile economy and stay strong.



## SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Submitted by Kimberly Karitis Lemon Ricotta Fritters for Hanukkah

#### Ingredients

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons freshly grated lemon zest
- 4 eggs
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2 cups whole milk
- 2 cups whole milk ricotta cheese
- 2 ½ teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 4-6 cups canola oil, for frying
- ½ cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup jam or jelly (I love pomegranate, peach and blackberry, but use whatever jam you like)

#### Instructions

- Heat oil in large pot on medium heat, until it reaches 365°F.
- In the meantime, in a large bowl combine eggs, ricotta, milk, granulated sugar and vanilla. Whisk thoroughly to combine.
- In medium bowl, combine the flour, salt, baking powder and lemon zest. Whisk to thoroughly combine.
- Pour dry ingredients into wet and stir with spoon until batter just comes together and there are no lumps of flour.
- When the oil has come up to temperature, use a #40 cookie scoop (2 tablespoons) to carefully scoop batter into hot oil without crowding the pan. NOTE: if you don't have a candy thermometer, you can check oil temperature by placing a wooden spoon in the hot oil. If small bubbles form around the spoon immediately, the oil is hot enough.
- Cook for 2-3 minutes per side, until deep golden brown. Check first fritter for doneness on the inside.
- Use a slotted spoon or metal spider to remove the fritters and any excess oil, then transfer to paper towels to drain.
- Dust with powdered sugar.
- In a small pan, heat the jam or jelly until it becomes liquid, then transfer to a serving bowl. Serve immediately for best results.
