## From the Rabbi's Desk: *Planting Seeds in Fragile Soil*



There is a certain confusion in the air these days—a sense that familiar borders between true and false, right and wrong, between safety and chaos, are blurring or even eroding. The world can feel colder. Angrier. And in the midst of it all, the value of our shared humanity sometimes feels as though it's in the balance—or even slipping through our fingers.

In moments like these, it's easy to lose touch with hope. To let the violence, injustice, and disconnection we witness drown out our joy. And yet—to acknowledge only that darkness would be a disservice to our full humanity.

It's paramount that we remember the spiritual practice of holding complexity: *zeh l'umat zeh*—“this and also that.” This helps us achieve balance in

disorienting times, and when we turn inward, it invites us to seek out and hold optimism against cynicism.

In this season of *Tu B'Shevat*, the New Year of the Trees, we're reminded that beauty, nourishment, and resilience are often rooted just beneath the surface. *Tu B'Shevat* invites us to reconnect—with nature, with our family trees, and with our own capacity to nurture and be nurtured. It asks us to spend time among trees and remember that we, too, are part of something organic, rooted, and capable of beautiful growth.

At the same time, in our Torah cycle, we're reading about the receiving of the Ten Commandments and the building of the *Mishkan*—a sacred space for divine presence. We move from revelation to creation. From encountering the holy to making space for it.

Here in our own community, we are doing just that.

Last month, in January, we kicked off the next round of our Civic Engagement series with Dutchess County District Attorney Anthony Parisi. He spoke candidly about public safety and immigration enforcement in our region, including the presence of ICE and his relationship with local law enforcement. It was a powerful conversation—the kind of classroom we must continue to create.

Later this month, on February 22, we will welcome Poughkeepsie Mayor Yvonne Flowers and Poughkeepsie Town Supervisor Rebecca Edwards for the next Civic Engagement event. These gatherings are opportunities to practice covenantal citizenship: to listen, to ask questions, to show up for one another, and to be part of something larger than ourselves.

So what does it mean to find hope and balance in this fragile and fraught moment?

To me, it means looking at where Jewish life is already guiding our attention: to trees, to sacred spaces, to local community, and to the quiet acts of love and care that keep us grounded and connected.

When I lean into our Jewish tradition, I find that my own anxieties begin to ease. I feel more rooted—more aware of where I belong and how I want to help build.

As we move through this season, I hope you'll join me in planting new seeds: of courage, connection, and spiritual resilience. Whether you attend a Civic Engagement event, plant a tree, study a bit of Torah, or reach out to someone who needs it—every act counts. Every seed matters.

Wishing us all a February of health, hope, and joy.

# Join us for Hamantaschen Baking Day!

Please join us for Sisterhood's annual Hamantaschen Baking Day. Make friends while making Hamantaschen for our Purim service and for outreach to congregants. If you can, please bring a batch of dough (follow recipe below) and a rolling pin. Remaining ingredients will be provided by Sisterhood. Not able to come and help? Please make a batch of dough and leave it in the Temple freezer in a Ziploc bag—just let Judy know.

## Hamantaschen Dough Recipe for Baking Day

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter, softened\*
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 4 tablespoons milk or orange juice

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar in separate larger bowl. Add egg and vanilla and beat well.

Add dry ingredients alternating with juice to the butter and sugar mixture, mixing until well blended. The dough will seem a little soft (not like bread dough). Refrigerate.

This dough freezes well and can be made ahead of Hamantaschen Baking Day. Leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight.

\* Please use real butter – the pastries are superior, and all batches cook evenly regardless of dough source. Thank you.

## Cemetery News

Our dedicated Cemetery Committee continues to take amazing care of our property needs, with the properties looking better than they have in years. Recently, repairs were completed in the North section of Lagrange Avenue, where one of the oldest horizontal marble slabs had caved in due to collapse of the ground beneath it, causing a safety hazard and potential liability issue.

The Committee maintains a prioritized “wish list” of improvements—beyond the regular monthly maintenance—and plans projects as finances permit. We hope, in the near future, to install a privacy fence in the back of the Lagrange South section (where a row of dead trees was removed, exposing the chain link fence). We are working with Finance and the Board to envision a permanent structure for cemetery maintenance that will leave the actual Cemetery Fund (one of the Special Purpose Funds) for special projects. Donations to the Fund are welcome and so greatly appreciated.

We’re working with Rabbi Stombaugh to re-institute the practice of including worn, unusable sacred texts in burials. This is an honor and mitzvah available to our families who are laying loved ones to rest, separate from the Ritual Texts area previously created.

The new Remembrance Garden surrounding the eternal flame sculpture in front of the synagogue appears to be weathering its first winter successfully, and we look forward to doing additional work in the spring as well as (re)dedicating this feature. Cemetery is taking the lead with this project in collaboration with House and Dayenu; this pollinator-friendly garden takes a positive environmental action.

The first cemetery volunteer days were successful. Our first event saw a successful Lagrange Avenue cleanup. The second gathering occurred at our Route 44 property, where the team did essential pruning around the entrance and had an opportunity to assess what will be needed to make that property ready for member use in the future.

Our next volunteer day is scheduled for Sunday, May 17 at 1pm in the South section of Lagrange Avenue, when we will add decorative shrubs to fill in spaces along the fence (which will not interfere with maintenance or future burials). Watch for publicity about this event. Many hands make light work!

## RELIGIOUS SCHOOL UPDATE *Jewish Talk!*

Since the first exile of our ancestors 27 centuries ago, we Jews have found ourselves settling, often unwillingly, in many parts of the world. These dislocations brought forth a number of new languages—often based upon the language of the prevailing culture, with Hebrew vocabulary added.

How many Jewish languages besides Hebrew can you name? Probably Yiddish and Ladino, sure. (Except that Ladino is really a dialect of Spanish, not a separate language—because speakers of Spanish and Ladino can understand each other.)

The closest living language to Hebrew is Aramaic, which you use when you say the Kaddish or sing Had Gadya at your seder. Aramaic is also spoken by modern Assyrians, who identify themselves as Syriacs, Chaldeans, or Arameans.

But there are many others. Mostly the parent language provided the structure, and Hebrew words were added. Some are still living languages, spoken by parents to their children. These include Judeo-Arabic, which has numerous sub-variants, Judeo-Persian, Judeo-Italian, and Judeo-Malayalam and Judeo-Marathi from India.

A Jewish language native to the Dutch Caribbean is Judaeo-Papiamento. That endangered language is spoken by the Sephardic Jewish community of Curacao, where Papiamento is a Spanish-based creole.

There are more Jewish languages—check Wikipedia—but my question to you is, which one would you like to help save from extinction by learning it?

## SISTERHOOD RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Submitted by Judy Rosenfeld

**Hamantaschen** (*Please note: this recipe is for bake-at-home Hamantaschen. The recipe for dough for the Hamantaschen Baking Day is on page 4.*)

### Ingredients

- 4 cups sifted all-purpose white flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 4 tablespoons milk or orange juice
- Pastry fillings of your choice i.e. "Solo" brand poppy, prune, apricot, etc.

### Instructions

- Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt.
- Cream butter and sugar, add egg and vanilla and beat well.
- Add dry ingredients alternately with milk or juice, mixing until well-blended. Refrigerate.
- Roll out dough with minimal flouring to 1/8-inch thickness.
- Cut into circles about 3 inches in diameter and place on cookie sheet. Use parchment paper, a non-stick pan or oil the pan lightly. (Used filling cans, opened at both ends and washed, make perfect circles.)
- Put no more than a teaspoon of filling in the center of each circle. (This is deceptive – it doesn't look like much filling, but if you use more than a teaspoon the filling will leak out.)
- Fold up three sides of the circle to create a triangle and gently press together edges. The filling should show in the middle.
- Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 10 minutes or until slightly golden in color.

The dough freezes well and can be made ahead. Leave it in the refrigerator to thaw overnight.



## VTS Book Club to Read *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Farrell



In 1580's England, during the Black Plague a young Latin tutor falls in love with an extraordinary, eccentric young woman. Agnes is a wild creature who walks her family's land with a falcon on her glove and is known throughout the countryside for her unusual gifts as a healer, understanding plants and potions better than she does people. Once she settles with her husband on Henley Street in Stratford-upon-Avon she becomes a fiercely protective mother and a steadfast, centrifugal force in the life of her young husband, whose career on the London stage is taking off when his beloved young son succumbs to sudden fever.

A luminous portrait of a marriage, a shattering evocation of a family ravaged by grief and loss, and a tender and unforgettable re-imagining of a boy whose life has been all but forgotten, and whose name was given to one of the most celebrated plays of all time, *Hamnet* is a mesmerizing, seductive read, impossible to put down.
